19TH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME: Wear Dad's hard hat with pride

"Who, then, is the faithful and prudent steward whom the master will put in charge of his servants to distribute the food allowance at the proper time? Blessed is that servant whom the master on arrival finds doing so . . .

"Much will be required of the person entrusted with much, and still more will be demanded of the person entrusted with more." **Luke 12: 32-48**

When she was a child, her dad worked in maintenance for the Cleveland Electric Illuminating Company, in plant C, along the shore of Lake Erie. It sucked him in at sunrise and spat him out at dusk.

She never knew what her father did — and he never talked about it. But she saw the toll the work took on him. He had his first heart attack and surgery at the age of 48; he had surgeries on his shoulder, hand and spine. He retired in 1993, right after his last child graduated from college. But the damage was done. A few years later, more coronary surgery. The next heart attack killed him. He was 69.

His daughter saw his dad at the plant only once. He was working overtime and she took him dinner. He always showered at work after his shift, so he always looked clean and sharp when he walked through the door. But that night she saw her father at work, covered in sweat and coal ash. For the first time, she understood why he was so often angry for no apparent reason.

In 2001 the plant closed. The local port authority was renovating the plant into a green energy project. She knew her father had never wanted her to see it — but she also knew her dad would understand why she had to. A former supervisor walked her through the musty mazes of the old, windowless plant, most of it below sea level. The temperature inside often could hit 140 degrees. At every station, he described the job — and the dangers.

"We were working with a continuously controlled explosive: pulverized coal," he explained. "We're the men the public doesn't see. We're in the hole in the dark, and most people don't know we exist."

The supervisor pointed to where her dad worked and what he did. "I had no idea," she said over and over.

At the end of the tour, he said, "Look, you need to understand something. You dad was a maintenance mechanic. He knew every square inch of this plant. If it was broke, he fixed it . . . He worked the most dangerous of jobs. A lot of guys didn't last long doing what he did."

A few days later, her own daughter graduated from college. She gave her the hard hat she was given at the plant, with this note: *Whenever you feel a little shaky, afraid of the next step, put this on, look in the mirror, and remember your roots.*

Despite her father's shame at his humble factory job, his daughter discovers reason for pride in his hard work done with skill and dedication. Her father modeled the "faithful and prudent servant" Jesus exalts in today's Gospel: the dedicated mom and dad who give their all to provide for their families and mirror in their work ethic the Gospel values of compassion, forgiveness and justice. For the Gospel "servant," no service we can render for the good of family or community is beneath us or demeaning to our dignity. The faithful servant/disciple uses whatever he or she possesses to bring to reality God's reign of hope and peace in this time and place of ours.

THE TIRE IRON AND THE TAMALE

Three times that year he had had car trouble on the freeways in and around Portland, Oregon: a blowout on the freeway, a bunch of blown fuses, and running out of gas. Each time he was stuck, he was disgusted with the way people refused to help or how some tried to take advantage of his situation, like the tow trucks that would whizz pass him without stopping and the gas stations that would not lend him a gas can for "safety reasons" but would sell him a cheap, one-gallon container — with no cap — for \$15.

But all three times he was rescued by those least able and expected to help: Mexican migrant workers.

When his tire blew, he was driving a friend's car and discovered he had no jack. He put big signs in the window, NEED A JACK, and offered money. Three hours went by, and no one stopped. Finally, as he was about to begin hitchhiking, a van pulled up and a guy bounded out of the vehicle.

The man was Mexican, with his family of four in tow. He didn't speak English, so he called out his young daughter, who did. As the driver and the Mexican worked to change the tire, the stranded motorist accidentally broke the man's jack. He felt like an idiot. No worries — the wife was gone in a flash and returned 15 minutes later with a new jack and the tire was finally changed. The two were filthy and sweaty. His wife produced a large water jug for them to wash their hands. The grateful driver tried to put a twenty-dollar bill in the man's hand, but he wouldn't take it. He then quietly slipped it to the man's wife. He asked the daughter where they lived, thinking he might send them a gift. The daughter explained that they lived in Mexico; they were in Oregon to pick cherries and peaches over the next few weeks, then go back home.

As they said goodbye, the girl asked the stranded driver if he had lunch yet. When he told her no, she ran up and handed him a tamale. He thanked them again and walked back to his car and opened the tamale (he was starving by now). And inside the foil was his twenty-dollar bill.

He ran back to try to catch the van, waving the twenty. The father waved him off with a smile and, in fractured English, called out, "Today you, tomorrow me."

The stranded driver, Justin Horner, is a graphic designer in Portland. He recounted the story in an essay in *The New York Times* [March 6, 2011]. Justin concludes his story with this:

"This family, undoubtedly poorer than just about everyone else on that stretch of highway, working on a seasonal basis where time is money, took a couple of hours out of their day to help a strange guy on the side of the road where tow trucks were just passing him by . . . Since then, I've changed a couple of tires, given a few rides to gas stations and once drove 50 miles out my way to get a girl to an airport. I won't accept money. But every time I'm able to help, I feel as if I'm putting something in the bank."

We are all called to be "faithful and prudent servants" of the abilities and resources that the "master" has entrusted to us and for which he will hold us accountable — not for the breadth and depth of those gifts but for what we have done with those gifts for the sake of the kingdom of God. Humility is the grace to be grateful for what we have as gifts from God and to realize our responsibility to put those gifts to the service of the whole "household." Jesus promises that such "faithful and prudent servants" who keep the kingdom of God before them in all of their relationships, who lead and influence others by the example of their own humble service, who place the common good before their own interests, will find places of honor at the master's table at the banquet of heaven.

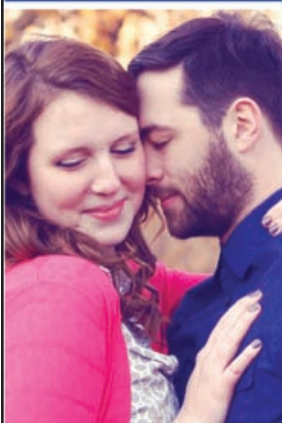
