

6TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: An Immigrant's gift on Christmas Eve.

"Do not think that I have come to abolish the law and the prophets. I have come not to abolish but to fulfill. Amen, I say to you, until heaven and earth pass away, not the smallest letter or the smallest part of a letter will pass from the law, until all these things have taken place . . .

"... if you bring your gift to the altar and there recall that your brother has anything against you, leave your gift there at the altar, go first and be reconciled with your brother, and then come and offer your gift." Matthew 5: 17-37

In an essay in The New York Times this past Christmas Eve, Tali Farhadian Weinstein tells the story of her coming to America from Iran forty Christmases ago.

In February 1979, three-year-old Tali, her parents and her infant brother were Jews trying to escape Tehran at the height of the Islamic Revolution. The family managed to get to Israel before outgoing flights were halted. Tali's father went ahead to the United States on a tourist visa to find housing and employment. Finally, Tali and her mother and brother were able to fly to the United States, arriving at Kennedy Airport on Christmas Eve. Tali's mother was terrified: the tourist visas she bought from a travel agent in Israel were certainly fake; they had one-way tickets; and they didn't look like "tourists" — they had a large suitcase stuffed with pots and pans, a few items of clothing for the children and photo albums. Tali writes:

"When it was our turn for inspection, the Immigration and Naturalization Service officer — very reasonably — challenged my mother's claim that we had come for a short visit. My mother didn't say that what she wanted was asylum, that we had a well-founded fear of persecution in our country of origin. My mother didn't know that those words had the power to keep us in America, that anyone on American soil had a right to be heard on that claim. Maybe because she had grown up in a county with no such protections, she couldn't imagine such a thing.

"We could have been turned away. But that nameless I.N.S. officer — about whom I know nothing other than how he conducted himself in that moment made a different decision. Before him stood a young mother traveling alone with her babies, visibly in need of refuge. She told him that the children wanted to see their father, that they had spent months apart. And he granted us 'deferred inspection' — meaning that we had permission but not authorization to enter the country — and told us to come back to the airport right after the holiday for deportation."

With the help of New York's Hebrew Immigrant Aid Society, Tali's family applied for and received asylum.

Today, Tali Farhadian Weinstein is the general counsel of the district attorney's office in Brooklyn. One of the most important lessons about law and law enforcement she learned as a three-year-old immigrant from that nameless I.N.S. officer on that Christmas Eve. She writes in her New York Times piece:

"Law enforcement requires us to exercise our humanity and sense of justice, always mindful of the demands of safety, in individual cases. Discretion in law enforcement can be abused, of course, but the alternative — the letter of the law without the spirit of the law — is worse."

In today's Gospel, Jesus speaks of "fulfilling" the Law — not abolishing it. Jesus seeks to restore the spirit of mercy, justice and reconciliation that gives meaning and direction to every just legal code. The border control officer Tali and her family encounter in New York was wise and compassionate enough to see beyond the questionable documents they had to recognize the reality of their situation and respond with the discretion the law permitted. Today's Gospel challenges us to look beyond legalisms and social and cultural yardsticks — and our own narrow interests — to recognize people in need and our responsibility as followers of Jesus to seek them out, to advocate for them, to welcome them.



FREE WILL

Before man are life and death, ... whichever he chooses shall be given him. (Sirach 15:17)

Free will. It's God's greatest gift to us, and it's also our riskiest characteristic. Free will has enabled us to decide for ourselves what kind of people we will be. It has enabled us to create music and art, to build cities and roads, to marry and have children. It has also enabled us to destroy instead of create, to hurt and betray instead of heal and build up. Most important, it's through our free will that we decide whether to follow Jesus or our own thoughts and desires.

Sirach seems keenly aware of how much of a two-edged sword our free will can be. Each of us, he says, is free to choose between "fire and water, life and death, good and evil". And God will respect whatever we choose.

Of course, our heavenly Father longs for us to choose life in him, but he will never force himself on us. He is not like the petty gods dreamed up by the pagans, who use threats and manipulation to keep their people in line.

God also knows that free will has consequences. And so Sirach teaches, "Whichever he chooses shall be given him" (Sirach 15:17). While God honors our choices, he also respects the results those choices bring.

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives us a real-life illustration: Whoever is angry with his brother will be liable to judgment". If you choose to nurture anger, resentment, and condemnation, don't be surprised if other people begin treating you in the same way. But if you build an environment of trust and respect, that's what you will receive.

So choose life today. Use this awesome gift of your free will to choose gentleness, patience, and all the other fruit of the Spirit. Above all, choose Jesus. Welcome him into your life, and let his love soften your heart. It's the best choice you could ever make.

"Jesus, help me to choose you in every situation today."

SADLY, THINGS ARE FINE FOR MICHAEL . . .

In a recent episode of Lynn Johnston's Sunday newspaper comic strip **For Better or For Worse**, 13-year-old Michael complains to his mom, "Mom, there's nothing to wear!"

"Michael," his mother counters, "you won't go shopping with me, and the last time I gave you money to buy your own clothes, you didn't buy anything!!"

A few minutes later, Michael is staring out the window. "There's nothing to do," the teenager whines.

His mother reminds him, "Brian asked you to go swimming, you dad asked you if you'd go downtown with him — and you turned them both down."

Mom next encounters Michael plopped in front of the television, the sound turned down. "There's nothing to watch," Michael gripes.

Mom says pointedly, "There are plenty of channels to choose from and you have video games to play."

In the next-to-last panel, Dad comes home from his errands to find Michael just sitting in a chair, a forlorn expression on his face. "What's with Michael?" Dad asks.

Mom deadpans, "There's nothing to complain about."

Today's Gospel is about attitude and perspective. Jesus asks us to consider not just our failings and sins — the acts themselves — but the selfcenteredness at the heart of our actions. To embrace happiness is a choice we make; we decide whether or not to engage the world with a perspective of hope and possibility. Michael's pessimism is his own making, and his wise mom calls him on it. On a much deeper and more serious level, Jesus challenges us to confront the anger, the bigotry, the self-righteousness that we use to justify our selfish behavior: the attitudes that tear families and communities apart, that destroy our own sense of self-respect as well as diminishing the basic human dignity of others. To follow Jesus is to see the possibilities we have for doing good things and to accept God's grace to make such good a reality.

LETTER TO A SUFFERING CHURCH

If you are troubled with the crisis in the church, you are welcome to pick up Bishop Robert Barron's book *Letter to a Suffering Church* from the Narthex.
