25TH SUNDAY ORDINARY TIME: The Lazarus Girl

The parable of Lazarus and the rich man.

Luke 16: 19-31

A rabbi remembers the moment he felt that God had called him to be a rabbi:

The summer before he was to begin rabbinical studies he volunteered to work on a building project in Ghana. For two months he lived in a tiny village with no electricity or running water; he spent his days mixing concrete to make bricks for a new elementary school and his evenings reading by gaslight and chatting with his new Ghanaian friends. It was the most constructive and fulfilling summer of his young life.

The day before heading home, his friends planned a going-away dinner in a small restaurant in Ghana's capital city, Accra. When he got out of the taxi, it was raining and the air was thick with fog and smoke from burning trash.

Then he saw her: a young girl, lying by a sewer, red muddy water streaming by her, with her distended stomach and jaundiced eyes, her painful look of despair. Lying quietly in the rain, barely moving, she looked up at him, and they locked eyes.

He froze. After a summer of building and teaching and learning, a summer in which he felt as strong and as powerful as he had ever been in his young life, he felt powerless. He remembers:

"I felt like she saw right through me . . . Seeing this nameless girl dying before me was like seeing the demarcation between God's dreams and our actions. I felt the call not so much as a clear prophecy from God but as a clarion cry of suffering innocence . . .

"My friends grabbed me and pulled me inside. Needless to say, I had no appetite. I was mixed up and confused about what had just happened . . . When I returned outside, I looked for her. She was gone. Maybe someone saved her. Maybe she was swept away. I just don't know. It haunts me still . . .

"When I came home, I knew what I wanted to do with my rabbinate. To bridge the gap. To take pain away. To cross the chasm between oblivion and redemption."

In his encounter with a starving girl, a rabbinical student encountered Lazarus, who opened his heart and spirit to a new awareness of the gap that exists between the rich and the poor, between hope and despair, between emptiness and meaning. Today's Gospel challenges us to look beyond our own self-centeredness to see God in the Lazaruses at our gates: the poor, the forgotten, the isolated, the marginalized; to realize the dignity of every human being as created in the image of God; to possess the humility that enables us to embrace one another as brothers and sisters, sons and daughters of God.

OCTOBER 22 THROUGH DECEMBER 3**

Personal loss can be a challenging time. How we manage is unique to each of us. There will be a series of six (6) non-denominational, interrelated and supportive bereavement seminars at St. John Neumann, Califon, NJ, beginning October 22. John Cole, a professional in the transitioning process, will facilitate the sessions. This short-term program has been considered very helpful by past participants who have experienced personal loss. The conversations extend from understanding loss and normal reactions to steps, guided by faith, towards acceptance and the recreation of hopeful lives. While a primary focus is the death of a significant other, those who have experienced severe loss because of divorce, separation, or other substantial life altering events are welcomed. All sessions start at 7 p.m. The dates of the seminars will be October 22, 29, November 5, 19, 25, and December 3.

Please note that each session builds on the prior one. Attendance at all six sessions would be best to derive optimal benefit. At this time, all sessions will be in the upper floor of the parish office building, unless participant mobility issues arise.

A FATHER'S STORY IN A BOOK INSCRIPTION

He found the book among his mother's things as he helped her move into a smaller apartment. It had belonged to his father, one of the few possessions from his childhood in Vienna.

When he was eight, his father Hans and his family had to flee from German-occupied Austria. Somehow, this book had survived the forced emigration and multiple uprootings to the United States. It was a book of cartoons, given to him by a family friend. Inscribed on the cover: *When you page through this book, my dear little Hansi, think of me, your old dear friend, who loved you very, very much. Clara Schick, Vienna, June 29, 1939.*

The book was all that was left of his father's childhood. Everything disappeared in that dark time: his home, his nationality, his first language, his grandparents, his friends. Even "Hans" disappeared — his name was Anglicized to *John* in 1944. Clara Schick, they later learned, died at a Nazi death camp in 1944.

Now, his son sits with the book on his lap. He writes:

"I tried to put myself in my father's eight-year-old shoes. What was it like when the Gestapo clattered in to arrest his father? To hear glass breaking and neighbors screaming during Kristallnacht? How did it feel to arrive in a strange new land, to go from comfort to indigence, from clear identity to refugee status?"

Hans' forty-year-old son now understands his late father's "impenetrable darkness" that he harbored underneath his great humor and warmth.

"I couldn't imagine, but I felt sure I would also have suffered damage. Who wouldn't have, at eight? It seemed so obvious, and I longed to tell my father I understood now, at least more than I had previously, and the fact that I could not was a frustration that endures to this day . . .

"I'm certain Clara Schick would like knowing what she did for her dear little Hansi and his son. After all, she loved my father very, very much, and if I cannot thank her for her intervention, then the least I can do is to try to remember him as fondly as she did."

Jesus' parable of the beggar Lazarus is a call to empathy: to put aside our criticisms and fears to understand the world of those whose lives are filled with suffering, whose behaviors are a mystery, whose perspectives leave us puzzled and put off. The adult son of a survivor of World War II begins to understand his father and appreciate the extraordinary courage it took to survive those years. We have much to learn from the Lazaruses in our lives — from their "poverty" we can discover the treasures of God.
