FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT: *The unrecorded conversation*

Joseph, [Mary's] husband, since he was a righteous man, yet unwilling to expose her to shame, decided to divorce her quietly. **Matthew 1: 18-24**

It must have been a painful conversation.

We know it took place. We've all experienced that kind of devastating encounter: when we were told we were no longer needed, when we discovered that someone we trusted betrayed us, when we heard the most awful words in the English language: *I don't love you anymore.*

The evangelist Matthew leaves that conversation out of his story of Jesus' birth. But we know it took place: when Mary told Joseph she was with child. We know how Joseph felt because we've felt that way: betrayed, foolish, naïve, used. But the difference is that, despite his own pain, Joseph realizes Mary's own confusion and anguish and fear over what has happened. But love enables these two hearts — no matter how broken and scared — to do that.

Joseph could not and would not subject her to the Law of the time; he would not expose her to public humiliation and shame. They would work this out "quietly." Their difficult conversation ended on a note of compassion and mercy.

Matthew picks up the story from there: how Joseph trusts God in the angel's message, and God's Christ enters human history in the person of Jesus.

It was said by many detractors that Jesus was born in scandal.

But we know better.

Jesus was born in mercy and compassion.

Joseph's response is the first light of the Kingdom of God that this little boy — Joseph's little boy — would proclaim.

In today's Gospel — Matthew's version of Jesus' birth — God's plan of humankind's salvation depends on Joseph, whose life has been turned upside by the angel's news. Joseph accepts the son as his own as a matter of love and compassion, of trust and faith. God's birth in our midst depends on human partners — a Mary, a Joseph, you, me — willing to put aside our own fears and hurts to be God's ministers of mercy, prophets of God's justice, mirrors of God's compassion. In this season and in every season, may we imitate the compassion and faith of Joseph: to seek understanding and acceptance within our families even at the cost of our own expectations and hopes, to seek to always be sources of affirmation and support for our spouses and children.

PASTOR'S CORNER

We enter the fourth week of Advent with expectations of celebrating the Lord's birth on Christmas. We will be celebrating the fact that God the Father loved the world so much that he sent his only Son to live, suffer and die for us, and reveal the hope of eternal glory in the resurrection. Christmas invites us to accept the Gift of Jesus Christ in our lives with heart filled with gratitude and praise. May this Christmas be for each of us filled with many graces and joys of God's mighty love!

While doing so each member of the family is kissed and is wished a joyful feast. The other family members then greet one another in the same way.



GET RIGHT WITH EACH OTHER

As magical as the season of Christmas is supposed to be, it can also bring the pain of family divisions into stark relief. Whether it's a large gathering of relatives who don't see each other very often arguments over money, or unreasonable high expectations, divisions that have simmered underground can bubble up and even explode. Sometimes it takes very little for a season dedicated to peace on earth to turn into a time of conflict or bitterness.

It seems that the angel Gabriel had something to this in mind when he told Zechariah that his son, John the Baptist, would "turn the hearts of fathers toward children" (Luke 1:17). It may seem an odd role for John, though, to talk about family reconciliation. Wasn't he supposed to be calling people to repentance so that they could prepare for the Messiah?

That's exactly what John was called to do, and it's exactly why the angel's words were so appropriate. John didn't tell people just to repent to God. He urged them to get right with each other as well. He told those who were well-off to show mercy to the poor by sharing their tunics with them. He told soldiers to stop extorting and falsely accusing the people in their care. And he told tax collectors to stop cheating their fellow citizens. John knew—probably because Zechariah taught him—that our ability to sense God's forgiveness is tied to our willingness to forgive and ask forgiveness of each other.

So who better to ask for help with our families than St. John the Baptist? Ask him for the humility that is at the heart of all repentance and forgiveness. Tell him that you want mercy to flow in your home even more abundantly that in any exchange of Christmas gifts.

"Lord, help me slow down during this special season."

GOD'S HOLIDAY GIFT-GIVING

A wise pastor reflects on the biggest struggle his parishioners experience this time of year:

"We [Americans] have been raised to set our goals high, work hard, and achieve our dreams. Clearly there is merit to this work ethic, but it has limits, and the greatest one is that it seduces us into thinking that we are the creators of our own destinies . . .

"At no time is this more obvious . . . than at Christmas, when [we] are knocking [ourselves] out to achieve the perfect experience for [our] loved ones. It is amazing that the mythology of this dream is able to resurface every December in spite of its repeated failures. When I hear the aspirations of people for their reuniting families, gathered around the piano wearing matching sweaters, joyfully singing carols, I always want to ask, *Is this the same family you had last year?* But no one is interested in reality checks at Christmas. So [we] knock [ourselves] out to achieve what cannot happen. According to the Nativity narratives, God is the only one who is giving at Christmas. The rest of us are doing all we can only to receive the gift of salvation.

"The only members of my parish who seem to understand this are children. In all my years of pastoral ministry, I have never had a child come to see me to talk about the stress of the holidays. They aren't worried about making all the parties, buying the perfect presents, maxing out their credit cards, and travel plans. As every child knows, the only stress of Christmas is how can we possibly wait for it to arrive — the day we receive so much."

Matthew's Christmas story is hardly the stuff of a Hallmark card — but his narrative of Jesus' birth to Mary and Joseph help us appreciate the mystery of God's love that brings his Christ into our world. Over the next few days, disengage (if only for a few minutes) from the role of "giver" and from trying to create the BEST. CHRISTMAS. EVER. Let yourself be the "receiver" of God's gifts of peace, compassion and mercy; embrace the spirit of humility and gratitude at what God has done in his entering our human history. From there, the rest of your Christmas celebration should fall into place beautifully.

ABOUT OUR ADVENT QUILT

Fr. Bill Mickiewicz, founding Pastor of our parish, purchased this Advent quilt. What did he see in this quilt that said "Advent" to him? Here is the story that might help you see Advent in it as well. Fr. Bill was drawn to the colors and the pattern. The midnight blue represents the darkness before creation as well as the darkness that takes over the earth just before the longest, darkest night of the year. At the center the colors are almost like an aurora borealis moving and swirling in a flowing yet chaotic pattern.

How can the colors and pattern be interpreted? The shades from dark to light represent the ever-shortening daylight until the winter solstice when a few days later Christ is born as the light slowly begins to increase and we feel more at peace. The chaotic pattern can be compared with the chaos we feel in our lives during this busy season that will end on December 26. But think back to the chaos surrounding Christ's birth. Mary is pregnant and unmarried; Joseph finds his betrothed expecting a child that is not his; then the chaos of getting to Bethlehem for the census, finding there is no room, and giving birth in a stable. But through all this chaos comes light when this Baby, the Light of the World, is delivered and the Angels sing. To be sure there was continued turmoil in their lives as there is in ours, but we can refresh ourselves in the light of Christ. Meditate upon this quilt and discover your own spiritual symbolism in it.
