14TH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME: At the end, gratitude . . .

"In whatever house you enter, first say, 'peace to this household.""

Luke 10: 1-12, 17-20

The president of one of the nation's leading theological schools and a former church pastor himself visited two pastors. Both ministers had lived long, productive lives and were now in the last stages of terminal illnesses. They all knew this would be the last time they would talk, so they took their time and chose their words carefully.

M. Craig Barnes, the president of Princeton Theological Seminary, recounts the conversation with his two senior colleagues in an essay in The Christian Century [January 4, 2019]:

"As I listened to these two pastors, the most striking thing to me wasn't their fearlessness at dying. Nor was I in awe of their amazingly sturdy faith, which was why they had so little to fear. The thing I keep thinking about is what both of them kept talking about at the end of their lives: gratitude.

"They were grateful for their families and for those who loved them through their days of faithfulness and failure over the years. They expressed gratitude to God for the grace of life. And they were grateful that they got to be pastors.

"Both of them had served several congregations over long ministries before becoming members of our seminary's board of trustees. In their later years they became very close friends. It was almost as though they knew they would be leaving life on earth together. When our board had dinner, they would often sit together and exchange stories from their ministries. I loved listening in.

"There was nothing particularly remarkable about these stories, except the part where holiness broke through. But they were told as a way of saying, Can you believe I got to see that? At the very end these two well-worn pastors were amazed that they got to be used in God's story with the congregations they served. That was their last sermon."

"This is how pastors spend their lives. And at the end, this is what they remember, and why they die with gratitude on their lips. They don't tell the stories of their successful capital campaigns or how many new members they found for the church. Nor are they particularly bothered by their ideas that failed badly and almost drove the congregation into the ditch. They believe in grace too much to care about what went well and what did not . . .

"This is what the old pastors remember, and why they are so grateful at the end of their lives. They got to spend their years functioning essentially as angels who keep saying, Behold! They knew the ground of the church was holy even when it was a holy mess . . .

"That's the real job description of the pastor: revealing the presence of God in the ordinary life of a flawed church. Good pastors give their lives to do it again and again."

That's what Jesus calls the seventy-two — and now all of us – to do: "to reveal the presence of God" in every ordinary life, and to do so not with a sense of superiority or self-righteousness but in a spirit of gratitude and humility that we might be the means for God to illuminate and bless the life of another, And, as we work to make a difference in our "neighbors" lives, we make a difference in our own: the peace we work for embraces us and our own families, the justice we seek changes the way we see ourselves and others, the good we are able to make happen gives our lives a satisfying sense of meaning and purpose. We can bring such joy and peace to our own homes and neighborhoods in our own response to Jesus' call to work for God's harvest of reconciliation and justice in the part of the vineyard God has entrusted to us.

STRESS IN YOUR MARRIAGE!



"The club"

They refer to themselves as "the club."

But no one wants to be a member. No one would seek to join. Most of the individuals in "the club" have little or nothing in common with the others.

Except for one thing: All are parents of children who were killed in school shootings.

In its December 10, 2018 cover story, **TIME** reported on this "invisible network of similar threads [that] connects hundreds of grieving parents across America. The connection is not formal. There is no organizational structure, no listserv, no roster of names. But their bond is strong enough that they often describe themselves — glibly but also in earnest — as 'the club.' There is only one criterion for membership: you sent a child to school one day and then never saw them again because of a bullet, leaving you with pain, loss and perhaps even other shattered children."

A parent of a child killed at Sandy Hook says, "It's a club you spend your whole life hoping you won't become a part of. But once you're in, you're in."

These parents reach out to one another in their efforts to heal and move on from this horrible experience. When Sandy Hook parents launched a foundation in honor of the kids killed there, parents and survivors of other school shootings flew to Connecticut to lend their support. Parents of children killed at Sandy Hook, Parkland, Santa Barbara, Columbine, Virginia Tech, and other places that have experienced such shootings text each other on the anniversaries of their children's deaths. They check in on each other and their families, offering solace during the first overwhelming waves of grief and the wisdom learned from their own painful experiences of trying to move on while struggling to keep marriage and family intact.

Some members of the "club" have found solace in speaking out and becoming activists for changes in gun laws, expanding access to mental health care and tightening school security; other parents give of their time to education programs in their communities' schools; other families seek to avoid the public debates that follow these tragedies and reclaim their privacy. "The club" supports them all.

This web of wounded souls spans America. They come from rural outposts and big cities, from Democratic strongholds and the reddest Republican states. They have different religions, income levels and ethnicities. They are not of one mind on what needs to be done about gun violence. What they share is the agony that comes with losing a child to gun violence in a place where that child was supposed to be safe.

Even family and friends "can never fully understand," says the parent of a student killed at Virginia Tech in 2007. "So you feel a special connection with other parents who have gone through this."

And, tragically, membership in "the club" continues to grow.

Sometimes we're the one "sent" by Jesus to offer support and consolation, and at other times, we're the ones needing to be rescued from the ditch — and there are some situations in which we are both the minister and the ministered to. These parents of the "club," who are both servants and served, mirror the seventy-two in today's Gospel. In sending them ahead, Jesus gives them no magical powers; he invests them with no special authority. They're to go about their work of humbly revealing God's love among them. They're to put aside their own needs to accept gratefully whatever hospitality is offered to them. They're to be God's agents for healing and reconciliation. In peace and humility, may we go forth and take on the "demons" of despair and "serpents" of fear that God's kingdom may be realized in our towns and homes.


