

THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT: "A Christmas Carol"

"Go and tell what John what you hear and see . . ."

Matthew 11: 2-11

It has been called the second greatest Christmas story of all time: Charles Dickens' **A Christmas Carol**.

Most of us know the story. Ebenezer Scrooge is the miserly merchant who despises Christmas as a useless "humbug." He resents the good cheer and generosity of heart that the holiday engenders. "A poor excuse for picking a man's pocket every twenty-fifth of December," he sneers.

On Christmas Eve, Scrooge is visited by the ghost of his old business partner, Jacob Marley. Marley tells Scrooge that he will be visited by three spirits. The first, the Spirit of Christmas past, takes the old miser back to his boyhood home, where he sees his beloved sister Fan, the sole love and joy in their strict, austere household. He returns to the counting house where he apprenticed under old Fezziwig, who treated Scrooge with kindness and respect. And he painfully relives the end of his relationship with Belle, the love of his life, who breaks her engagement with Scrooge because, she says, his love for her has been replaced by a "new idol . . . Gain."

Scrooge's second visitor, the Spirit of Christmas Present, makes Scrooge see the realities that his avarice and greed have made him blind to: a nephew and family who care about Scrooge despite his contempt; the joy and kindness of the Cratchits and the family of Scrooge's ill-treated and poorly-paid clerk. Scrooge is also forced to confront the suffering endured by society's most vulnerable and helpless because of greed — *his* greed.

And the long night of visions end with Scrooge realizing the sad, dark legacy he will leave behind. Abandoned by the Spirit of Christmas to Yet to Come at his own grave, Scrooge cries to heaven: "Are these the shadows of the things that Will be, or are they shadows of the things that May be, only?"

As Christmas morning dawns, Scrooge no longer sees in shadows; he no longer finds comfort in darkness; he no longer dismisses Christmas as a "humbug."

Ebenezer Scrooge is transported to the "desert" of his heart where the three Spirits prophetically open his eyes to the love he has rejected, the mercy he has withheld, the good will he has spurned. This Advent season call us to the wilderness of our own hearts to see the love we take for granted, the love we fail to see, the love that remains despite ourselves. John's call to transform our lives in the justice and mercy of God certainly resonates in our broken hearts and despairing spirits — but are we willing to take on the hard work of converting and re-creating those hearts? May we be "visited" by the Spirit of Christmas in the days ahead, opening our eyes and hearts to see in the light of the Child of Bethlehem what we want our lives to be for and about and, by God's grace, continue that work of re-creation in every season of our lives.

ABOUT OUR ADVENT QUILT
Fr. Bill Mickiewicz, founding Pastor of our parish, purchased this Advent quilt. What did he see in this quilt that said "Advent" to him? Here is the story that might help you see Advent in it as well. Fr. Bill was drawn to the colors and the pattern. The midnight blue represents the darkness before creation as well as the darkness that takes over the earth just before the longest, darkest night of the year. At the center the colors are almost like an aurora borealis moving and swirling in a flowing yet chaotic pattern. How can the colors and pattern be interpreted? The shades from dark to light represent the ever-shortening daylight until the winter solstice when a few days later Christ is born as the light slowly begins to increase and we feel more at peace. The chaotic pattern can be compared with the chaos we feel in our lives during this busy season that will end on December 26. But think back to the chaos surrounding Christ's birth. Mary is pregnant and unmarried; Joseph finds his betrothed expecting a child that is not his; then the chaos of getting to Bethlehem for the census, finding there is no room, and giving birth in a stable. But through all this chaos comes light when this Baby, the Light of the World, is delivered and the Angels sing. To be sure there was continued turmoil in their lives as there is in ours, but we can refresh ourselves in the light of Christ. Meditate upon this quilt and discover your own spiritual symbolism in it.

The word Bethlehem means "House of Bread". The breaking of the bread is a sign of charity, unity, and friendship. Religious family traditions and customs bring the truths of Faith into the home. One of these beautiful Christmas customs is the Christmas Wafer. A Wafer bearing a simple design commemorative of Christ's birth is broken by the head of the family and distributed to each member. With a simple prayer for God's grace and the welfare of the present and absent members of the family, the head family member breaks the Wafer and distributes it, a piece to each one at the table. While doing so each member of the family is kissed and is wished a joyful feast. The other family members then greet one another in the same way.

All this brings to mind charity for one another, to seek salvation together. Family customs remind us that we seek and obtain salvation with the help of others at all times.

ST. JOHN'S MEMORIAL CONCERT



RESTORING THE DESERT, POST ISIS . . .

Five years ago, Christian families were driven from their homes in northern Iraq by ISIS. Homes, businesses, schools and churches were destroyed during the occupation. Now that ISIS has been driven out (at least, for the time being), Christian families are returning to face the long, hard road of rebuilding their vandalized, damaged homes and villages.

But amid the devastation, there are lights of hope.

In the small village of Qaraqosh, the Brothers of Jesus the Redeemer have opened a small house. The brothers see their work as one of presence and hospitality. The Muslim community wants their Christian neighbors to return; the brothers see their mission as trying to make it possible for Christians to rebuild their homes and re-establish their lives. The brothers teach English, math and computer science in an afternoon program to help Christian and Muslim students get their educations derailed by the conflict back on track. They organized a dinner to mark the end of the Muslim fasting season of Ramadan at which 400 people — Christians and Muslims — came together to celebrate their neighbors' return and the restoring of peace and good will in the village.

During the occupation of Nineveh, the Dominican Sisters of Saint Catherine created an ad hoc Catholic school system for refugee children in Erbil, a region safe from ISIS. Now, as Christians return, the sisters are re-establishing schools in Nineveh, as well as maintaining kindergartens and schools to serve refugees who are unable or unwilling to return to their homes. Many of the children the sisters work with are traumatized from the loss of their homes and the grueling flight from Mosul and the villages around Nineveh. Their work is one of healing as well as education. The Dominicans welcome children of all faiths, turning away no one.

Uncertainty about the future remains the "biggest and worst challenge" Christian families are facing, one Dominican sister says. "Personally, I believe that living in the Middle East is really beyond our [individual] powers and our abilities. To keep the cross in the Middle East, I think, is not just our dream; it must be the dream of God as well."

In this Advent season, Christ comes as the light of God that illuminates our vision in new ways, enabling us to see God's grace and compassion in one another. All three readings on this Advent Sunday begin with lifeless, depressing pictures that are transformed into life-giving and enriching images: from death to life, from barrenness to harvest, from illness to wholeness. The Brothers of Jesus and the Dominican Sisters are reflections of that light of hope and re-creation. We are all called to reflect that light, revealing God's presence in the darkest times, enabling miracles of resurrection to take place here and now.
