Anna and Simeon in our own temple

It had been revealed to [Simeon] by the Holy Spirit that he should not see death before he had seen the Christ of the Lord . . . There was a prophetess, Anna [who] gave thanks to God and spoke about the child to all who were awaiting the redemption of Jerusalem. Luke 2: 22-40

"Blessed are the poor in spirit, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven. . .

"Rejoice and be glad, for your reward is great in heaven . . . " Matthew 5: 1-12

Every parish community has an "Anna." "Advanced in years," she has known every joy and heartache of being a spouse and mother and grandmother. "Anna" lives at the heart of the prayer life of the community. She's always among the first to offer her time to whatever needs to be done; her joy is filling her days with baking cookies for the soup kitchen, volunteering in the parish office, knitting prayer shawls, participating in any of the parish's Scripture study groups or the RCIA team. The most important gift "Anna" brings to the parish is her ability to lift spirits and hearts by her kindness and understanding, her generosity of heart centered in her faith in God's love, her trust in God's presence in the reality of life. "Anna" is a "prophetess" to us of God's hope and joy in our midst.

Every parish has a "Simeon," as well. He has settled into the autumn of life with optimism. He takes joy in his family and friends. A good day is when he's able to offer help, make someone's day a little brighter, relieves a neighbor's stress or anxiety. Though self-effacing, the "Simeons" among us possess the wisdom of experience and we do well to listen to them. They have weathered countless storms in their long lives but have always trusted that the light of God would shatter the darkness — and it always has. Our "Simeons" remind us of all we have to be grateful for. They are signs of the reality of our salvation: that God — Emmanuel - dwells in our midst in our love and care for one another.

Today, 40 days after Christmas, we celebrate the Presentation of the Child Jesus in the temple at Jerusalem, witnessed by the faithful Simeon and the prophetess Anna. May we give thanks for the "Annas" and "Simeons" among us, who are living signs of God's love dwelling in our homes and communities and churches. May we live our lives with Anna's "prophetic" grace and joy, that the light of Christ's peace may illuminate our hearts and homes; may we take up in our own lives and hearts Simeon's song of thanksqiving: May we go in peace, Master, realizing your salvation; may we behold your light revealing your loving presence in our midst.

CONSOLATION

This man was awaiting the consolation of Israel. (Luke 2:22-40)

Who wouldn't like a bit of consolation today? Who wouldn't like to feel the Lord put his arm around their shoulders and tell them, "Everything's going to be okay"?

Simeon was looking for God's consolation. God had promised restoration for his people, Israel. He had promised a Messiah who would sit on the throne of David and draw all the nations to Jerusalem. For many years, Simeon had prayed for these promises to be fulfilled, but nothing had happened. Israel was still an occupied nation, and her people were still divided between rich and poor, Pharisee and Sadducee, Galilean and Judean. So Simeon continued to pray for redemption. And he waited.

Then the day came. Imagine how tender that moment was when Simeon held the child Jesus into his arms. The "consolation of Israel" had finally arrived (Luke 2:25). You can just hear the emotion welling up in his words: "Now, Master, you may let your servant go in peace". At last I have seen him. I can depart now, Lord because you have come to save my people.

Simeon knew right then and there that everything was going to be okay. He didn't know how it would happen or when it would happen, but that didn't matter. He knew *that* it would happen, and that was enough for him to believe.

God knows your anguish; he hears your prayers; he knows your concerns. So let him console you. Today in the house of the Lord, you will meet Jesus in the unlikely form of bread and wineas Simeon met him in the unlikely form of an infant. When you receive him, think of this prayerful man. Just as he did, take Jesus into your hands and into your heart. He has come to bring salvation and consolation. He may not tell you how or when, but it doesn't matter right now. Christ is in you, and everything is going to be okay.

"Master, my eyes have seen your salvation. I surrender myself to you."

<u>"BEATITUDE" PEOPLE</u>

When Jesus saw the folks gathering in the church hall, he invited them to pull up chairs and gather around. When everyone was settled and comfortable, Jesus took a chair himself and began to teach:

"Blessed are those who place the love of family and friends before all else, who possess a spirit of gratitude that compels them to give of their own blessings to others — for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

"Blessed are those who grieve, who struggle to cope and continue on: the single mom or dad trying to raise their children alone, the parents who wait for the lost daughter or son to return — for they will be comforted.

"Blessed are those who find their joy in the happiness of others: the young couple just starting out, the devoted teacher, the dedicated minister — for they will inherit the earth.

"Blessed are they who can see beyond their own interests and needs to the greater common good, who understand and honor their ethical and social responsibility to their community — for they will be filled.

"Blessed are they who treat classmates, co-workers and employees with respect and dignity; who never forget what it was like to struggle to raise a family, to be the "new kid," to start a new job; who keep in mind the many times they have been forgiven and received a second and third change that they didn't deserve — for they will receive mercy.

"Blessed are those who seek justice for the poor and abused, who speak up for the victimized and powerless, who refuse to compromise in matters of ethics and morals — for they will see God.

"Blessed are those who possess that all-too-rare gift for bringing people together when self-interest and prejudice threaten to divide a family or church or community; who possess the humility to always make the first move to forgive and enable reconciliation to take place; who bring healing to those who have been hurt, ignored, or rejected — for they will be called children of God.

"Blessed are those who are ridiculed and criticized for doing what is just and good, who refuse to give into the cynicism around them, who will not rationalize injustice and justify falsehoods — for the reign of God is theirs.

"Rejoice and be glad" Jesus told the group that had met that night in the church hall, "for your reward in heaven is great."

In every time, in every place, there are the people of the Beatitudes. There are "Beatitude" people in our own families, in our own towns, in our own parish who have embraced the "blessedness" of Jesus' sermon on the mountain: Realizing the many blessings they possess, they seek to reveal God's blessings in the lives of others through compassion, generosity, mercy and peace; trusting in the mercy of God they have experienced in their own lives, they seek to be the means for others to realize God's presence in their lives. May God's grace illuminate our hearts that we may embrace the vision of the Beatitudes: to seek the grace and joy of God in all things.

SAINT BLAISE

Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebastea and a doctor. The first known record of the saint's life comes from the medical writings of Aëtius Amidenus, where he is recorded as helping with patients suffering from objects stuck in their throat. Many of the miraculous aspects of St. Blaise's life are written of 400 years after his martyrdom in the "Acts of St. Blaise."

Saint Blaise is believed to begin as a healer then, eventually, became a

"physician of souls." He then retired to a cave, where he remained in prayer. People often turned to Saint Blaise for healing miracles.

In 316, the governor of Cappadocia and of Lesser Armenia, Agricola, arrested then-bishop Blaise for being a Christian. On their way to the jail, a woman set her only son, who was chocking to death on a fish bone, at his feet.

Blaise cured the child, and though Agricola was amazed, he could not get Blaise to renounce his faith. Therefore, Agricola beat Blaise with a stick and tore at his flesh with iron combs before beheading him.

In another tale, Blaise was being led to the prison in Sebastea, and on the way came across a poor old woman whose pig had been stolen by a wolf. Blaise commanded the wolf return the pig, which it did -alive and uninjured - to the amazement of all.
