EPIPHANY OF THE LORD: In the company of friends ...

"Where is the newborn king of the Jews? We saw his star at its rising and have come to do him homage." Matthew 2: 1-12

Twenty years ago, Carine Tarazi suffered a brain injury in high school that confined her to a wheelchair for a year. She limps with the help of an electronic leg brace and her right arm barely functions, but she lives an independent, fulfilling life as a writer and editor.

At the time of the injury, she felt powerless; Carine had resigned herself to a future that would be limited and dependent on others. But, as she writes in an essay in **The Boston Globe** [May 28, 2017], life did not play out as she feared:

"When I showed up at college, head shaven from my latest surgery, walking with a cane and wearing a big plastic leg brace, I expected the cold shoulder from my classmates. I was surprised to find that those who studiously ignored me were remarkably rare. Most people just wanted to make friends. Best of all, my adventurous roommate couldn't accept my physical weakness as an impediment of any kind. Kim and I went on overnight road trips and to raucous concerts while my parents peeked through their fingers. Somehow, instead of falling, the sky raised itself a little higher . . .

"Back when I could barely walk for an hour at a time, Alice insisted on hiking with me, pushing me, sometimes literally, up every steep hill. Andy taught me to swim again, gripping my hands and walking backward through the pool as I kicked. Just last year, I sat on a bicycle with the help of Kim's husband, who did his utmost to hold it upright and jog alongside while I clung desperately to the handlebars . . .

"I'm fortunate to have friends who, consciously or not, protect me from difficult situations. I'm also lucky to have met many strangers who went out of their way to help me: the old man who spoke no English and simply led me by the hand to his own subway seat; the woman who sprang up and raced out of a cafe to rescue my thermos when she saw it catapult out of my grasp and onto a busy road; everyone who's helped me across the street when my brace wasn't working quite right; on and on. I remember these people even years later, though some disappeared without telling me their names."

Carine now lives on her own, has established a successful career, drives and travels. She needs help now and then and has to take her time, "but I can always get the help I need, and I do what I can when I see someone else struggling. I used to believe I was alone against blind chance and the unknown. Thanks, stranger, for the lesson."

Our lives are a journey through time, in which we seek fulfillment, purpose, meaning. Carine Tarazi's journey is complicated by her physical limitations — her journey is as much about learning to travel as the destination. But she manages because of the "stars" she follows: the good friends who refuse to let her miss out on life in all its excitement and joy. On our journeys through this life, we discover "stars" that help us find our way; we meet "magi" whose wisdom and grace help us discern our course; we find the gift of God's presence in the Bethlehem of our own hearts. Like Carine's learning to trust her dedicated and caring friends, our own everyday odyssey is a continuing "epiphany" for meaning, for purpose, for the things of God that, often unnoticed and unappreciated, are part of every human experience, treasures that we often come to realize only with the help of those who travel with us.

AN EPIPHANY

Today we celebrate the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy that God would shine his light on all the nations. That's certainly what happened to the Magi as they followed a star to the home of the newborn King of the Jews. But it seems that God's light led them somewhere they didn't expect. And that's often what light does. Think about it. Following their own religious traditions, the Magi believed that the appearance of a new star heralded the birth of a new king. So intending to make a diplomatic visitation, they journeyed to King Herod's court. But instead, the star led them to a humble home in Bethlehem. They accepted the light they received, ready for whatever course correction might come their way. Receiving, leaning into, and seeking more light made them more open and able to receive even more light. That's how it works for us too. Think back to a time when you experienced some insight from God. Maybe some confusing aspect of your faith started to make some sense. Or you found clarity about a new phase of life you had entered into. That one "light" didn't necessarily answer all your questions. It set you on a path, but it didn't give you the entire road map. So you had to do your best to follow it, and as you did, you sorted out the next step. Each step forward, each choice to be flexible, each response of trust made subtle or not-so-subtle changes in you. Light built on light, and slowly but surely, like the Magi, you started doing things differently. You started to see things as God does, in his light. And that's what Epiphany is all about. It's a revelation that changes our hearts.

"Lord, make today an epiphany for me!" If you enjoyed this reflection take a copy of the Word Among Us from Narthex.

<u>"THE MESSIAH IS AMONG YOU . . . "</u>

There was once a monastery that had come upon hard times. Once it was filled with young monks and its great church resounded with the singing of God's praise, but now it was almost deserted, with a handful of elderly brothers shuffling through the cloister struggling to pray and work.

On the edge of the monastery woods an old rabbi had built a little hut. He would go there from time to time to fast and pray. Whenever the venerable and wise rabbi was there, the monks felt blessed by his presence.

One day the abbot of the monastery went to visit the rabbi to seek his counsel. The rabbi welcomed him warmly. First, the two prayed silently together; then the rabbi made tea for his guest. As he set the cups on the table, the rabbi said to the abbot, "You and your brothers are serving God with heavy hearts. You have come to ask a teaching of me. Very well. I will give you a teaching — but you can only repeat it once. After that, no one must ever say it aloud again."

The rabbi leaned in and looked straight into the eyes of the abbot. "The Messiah is among you," the rabbi said. "He lives among you now."

The abbot did not know what to say; he left the rabbi's hut without a word. The next morning, the abbot called his brothers together. He told them he had received a teaching from the rabbi who walks in the woods — but warned that the teaching was to be spoken once and then never said again. The abbot then looked at each of his brothers and said, "The rabbi said that one of us is the Messiah."

The monks were stunned by the abbot's words. *What could this mean?* they asked themselves. *Is Brother John the Messiah? Or Father Matthew? Or Brother Thomas? Could I be the Messiah?*

They were all puzzled — and unsettled — by the rabbi's teaching, but faithfully obeyed the abbot's instructions that it never be mentioned again.

As time went by, the monks began to treat one another with a special reverence. There was a gentle, peaceful quality about them that was hard to describe but easy to notice. The few visitors to the monastery found themselves deeply moved by the life of the community. Before long, people were coming from miles around to be nourished by the prayer of the monks. More and more brothers joined the community. As the monastery began to rebuild, the joy of their prayer once again resounded through their church — and hearts.

The old rabbi was never seen again — but the old monks, who had taken his teaching to heart, forever felt his presence.

"The Messiah lives among you" — Epiphany celebrates that reality in all our lives: that God's Christ is present among us in our love for one another, in the mercy and justice we work for, in the forgiveness we extend and accept. Our lives are filled with "epiphanies": moments of awareness and understanding, discoveries of abilities and potential, realizations of the love of God in our lives. In this New Year, may we seek to find the Messiah in our midst, following the star of God's reconciliation and justice, enabling us to behold Emmanuel — "God with us"— in every experience of charity, consolation and forgiveness, whether given or received.
