

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

Into summer...



2013 - Outboard Speed Boat for Steve Upham


2013 - Electric Fantail Launch for Hank Vander Werp

2015 - 30-foot Fantail Launch for the Inland Water Route Historical Society.

All of these commissions are important to our continuing success both for the student experience and for the financial security these projects bring us. **Without commissions it becomes necessary to build a boat on speculation. This is always tricky** as we then “speculate” on what type of boat will meet both the curriculum requirements and potentially sell in a reasonable time line. Some of the criteria that we look for are:

Appropriate building method: this can be either traditional plank on frame construction or a modern epoxy/wood craft.

Sail Boats: this gives us the opportunity to make spars in a variety of methods, solid or hollow. We also have the capability to make the sails



Over the years GLBBS has had the opportunity to build a remarkable variety of craft. Several of these have brought national recognition, starting with the authentically constructed 28-foot **Whaleboat that accompanied the *Charles W Morgan* on her historic 38th voyage in 2013.** This was an exceptional opportunity for our students to experience both a uniquely American building method and be part of a new chapter in our **national maritime history.** Following the Mystic Seaport commission, **we were contacted by the Captain of the *USS Constitution* and after a few short conversations we had another commission for a historic craft. The U.S. Navy commissioned GLBBS to build a 32-foot Pilot Gig to be used by the crew of “*Old Ironsides*” during their rotations on the ship. We delivered the Gig to the Boston Navy Yard early this summer (see cover story). **These two commissions have been a source of pride for the school and will always be an important part of fulfilling our mission.****

Lesser recognized boats have also been commissioned over the years but are equally important to the continuation of our programs and student experience. Second-year Diploma Program students are now building **our third 26-foot Hacker Gold Cup Racer** replica. The first Hacker has been seen on the waters of Maryland and Florida, and the second is being finished at *Runabout Restorations* of Guntersville Alabama.

and rigging which adds another dimension to the student experience.

Power Boats: Part of the curriculum for our second-year Diploma Program students is the Marine Systems Section, where they install engines and the related systems.

Time Line: depending on the complexity of the build, our projects can be either a one- or two-year building time line.

Vessel Size: we have built boats up to 30 feet in length but there is no limit so long as the client recognizes that we do not operate as expected in a professional shop. Students in our First Year Certificate Program spend six months on their large craft project and our Second-year Diploma students have nine months each year. Many of our first-year projects hold over for the next class, this giving

them projects that have the complete spectrum of construction phases to learn from.

Level of Completion: although we are capable of building a finished boat some, the Hacker for example, have been delivered with the intention of being completed by the buyer. This has worked well for both GLBBS and the owner.

As we look to the coming years **we will be seeking commissions from museums and other organizations with similar missions** that, like the Whaleboat and the Pilot Gig, desire craft that are historically important, **but we will certainly remain open to private interests as well.** If you or someone you know is looking to own a custom-built quality boat, contact us anytime to begin the conversation that will **ultimately benefit both GLBBS and you.**



When I started working here at the boat school, **all I could think about, talk about, and dream about was boats.** After 24 years in the Navy, I was free to follow my passion and I was in the perfect place to do just that. Getting to know the staff was like adopting a new family. I fit right in. Bonnie Mikkelsen became my new grandmother. For her, **it wasn't so much the boats, but how they connected people and lives.** I was too excited about the boats to put much thought into this but one of the boats we are building **this year has such an interesting story** that it has me thinking that maybe she has it all figured out. It's a somewhat complicated and winding story that meanders from England to Southwest Michigan and the eastern U.P. over a span of 100+ years.

In the early 1900's, **Thomas Truscott started a boat building company in St. Joseph, Michigan.** He

learned his trade in Islington, England, which Google tells me is a district in London. This was a time of change for boating as the gasoline engine was being perfected for the automotive industry right here in Michigan. **Truscott capitalized on this transition and was soon building over 600 boats a year and shipping them all over the world.** At one point, he was the biggest employer in St Joe. I grew up near St. Joe and spent much of my summers on the beach there. I had never heard of Truscott or saw any sign that this community was once at the forefront of boat building. By then, fiberglass was king.

In 2008, I moved back to my southwest Michigan home. I soon found myself drawn into my father's world where he spent a lot of time volunteering at the **Michigan Maritime Museum** in South Haven, Michigan. South Haven is about 20 miles north of St. Joe. They had a tall ship and I wanted to be a crew member. They hired me but it wasn't as a crew member. They had purchased **a fiberglass hull** that was taken off a **30-foot Truscott fantail launch**. **My job was to take this overgrown bathtub and turn it into a replica of the real thing.** The museum planned to take people on this boat to tour the Black River as they had done 100 years ago. The hull was fiberglass but the rest would be wood and it would be electric powered. During that build, a group called the **Inland Water Route Historical Society (IWRHS) came down from Alanson Michigan to check it out.**

They had similar plans to show people the **Inland Water Route that goes between Alanson and Cheboygan, Michigan.** They liked what we were doing and watched closely as we went through Coast Guard certification.


A couple of years ago, IWRHS came to the boat school to ask if we could do the same for them. They purchased the same hull but this one came with a small diesel for power. **We started working on it last year and will finish it this year.**

This last summer, **Ralph Shoberg**, who has a summer home just down the road from the boat school wandered into the shop and said he had heard we were working on a 30-foot Truscott launch. I said "yep" and he asked **"would you like to see a real one."** I followed him down to our dock where he had just parked his launch named **Islington.** He had restored it from what most people would have called a lost cause but when he told me her story, I understood why.

His Truscott had been **commissioned by August "Papa" Stroh of Stroh Brewing.** It was built in 1895 and is **believed to be hull #1** of the 30-ft. long series of Great Lakes Launches. "Papa" named it **Islington** in honor of Truscott's home and craft. **The Islington Hotel**, here in Cedarville, was subsequently named after the boat and **Islington Road** followed suit. The hotel is gone but **the boat still roams the waters of Les Cheneaux.** **Soon, another Truscott launch will be working its way through the Inland Water Route.**

I'm still a boat nut but I'm beginning to understand how interesting **the story behind the boat, its history and the people whose lives it touched, can seem like a little more than coincidence.**

Editor's note: Ralph Shoberg passed away in September following a battle with cancer that he revealed to few. His remarkable restoration of the Islington was really a testimonial to not only his heritage and his grandfather, Victor Shoberg, but to the multitude of summers he had spent on the waters of Les Cheneaux, and so many of them with his brother John. According to John, the stories are endless but he will relate some regarding the Islington in the spring issue of Stem2Stern...again, connecting beautiful boats with the people who cherished them.



And for lots of good reasons. A **record-breaking 500** attended, Friday, September 4th! Wine tasting was added! The **Beach Chickens** outdid themselves!. The beers and brats were perfect! The weather couldn't have been better. **Three beautiful boats sold, bringing in \$11,700 ...and each with a special story.*** And, most exciting of all, **35 Northern Michigan artists and artisans participated in the Silent Auction which sold a whopping 80% of their works!**

As always, great kudos go to the staff and the Associate Board. Co-Chair **Laurel Jellison** had a family need, so she had to delegate from afar but her husband, **Mike, and his crew didn't leave any slack.** An incredible group of volunteers with the **Les Cheneaux Arts Council**, headed by **Carol Hubbard** and **Peggy Patrick**, carried off what at one point seemed to be an impossible feat. In only a month's time, they enlisted a broad-reach of participants with a wonderful cross-section of talent, did a superb job with publicity, and **Diane Keighley** magically produced a handsome full-color catalog. **Tim DeWick** built three, large, wooden display racks on which **Linda Sattler** (to quote Dianne) "did a fantastic job arranging the artwork for flow and viewing. Our worker bees

were great getting everything set up on the boards and tables...and **Nikki Buskirk** is a dream to work with!"

Those "worker bees" included **Jackie Carroll, Gael Dreisbach, Teri Empey, John Grenier, Everett Landen, and Allen Williams.** The Art Auction grossed over **\$6,500, netting almost \$2,500 for the School**, which included some artists donating their proceeds.

Total proceeds for GLBBS in all came to just over \$24,000. More than triple that of previous years.

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
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A Little Romance ...GIVEN TO THE CAPITAL CAMPAIGN

In early spring of 1997, **Jack Steinmetz** commissioned nationally known boat builder **Mike Kiefer** of Great Lakes Boat Building Company in South Haven, Michigan, to build a 12-ft. version of a **1860s-style Whitehall rowing boat as a surprise gift for his wife Margie**, in recognition of her attaining her masters degree in liberal arts from the University of Chicago. This **marvelous piece of art**, crafted out of Michigan sassafras, mahogany, and oak, was launched at the surprise party that July at the boat's new home on the Kalamazoo River in Saugatuck, with Mike Kiefer attending.

A Little Romance lived in Saugatuck for some years, plying the waters from Kalamazoo Lake to Lake Michigan, then moving to Cambridge, Maryland, to test the brackish waters of the Choptank River and Chesapeake Bay, before returning to her beloved Michigan and her latest home on the Grand River in Grand Haven.

This beautiful boat has been **featured in three national boating magazines**: *WoodenBoat* (July/August 2001), *The Ash Breeze* (Winter 2001), and *Lakeland Boating* (August 2007); along with participating in various Michigan wooden boat shows.

Margie decided to retire her beloved rowing boat and donate it

to the Capital Campaign at GLBBS this summer. Of special note, **Mike Kiefer taught the first class given at GLBBS**, in the summer of 2007. And of additional special note, **Margie's and Jack's son-in-law is Mike Amory**, owner of Ashmar Boatworks in Cambridge, Maryland, where **GLBBS graduate Bill Bronaugh** is employed (see our ad in the upcoming issue of *WoodenBoat*, featuring Bill).

Most appropriately, **Jim Berryhill**, already a rowing legend here in Les Cheneaux and a summer instructor at the boat school as well as a huge supporter, **bid on *A Little Romance* at our Beer Fest auction and won**. She could not be in a better home, where Jim will definitely bring her out of retirement!
