Songs and Stories of the Great War, 1914-1918; a 60 minute audio-visual presentation to be held in the IHM Church on **November 10th at 3 pm.** Mass to follow at 4:30

The Canadian War Museum tells us that, “The First World War was a singing war. Soldiers used songs to bond, and to alleviate the stress and fears encountered at the front. They shared songs with each other at base camps, and while marching, and in the front lines.”

Do you still remember songs like -Mademoiselle from Armentieres? It’s a Long Way to Tipperary? Pack Up Your Troubles in Your Old Kit Bag and Smile, Smile, Smile?

Do you remember which Ontario city changed its name during World War One, and why? Or which was the first country to initiate wartime bombing of cities? Who sent a card and a box of maple syrup to every Canadian serving overseas in December 1915? From a total population of approximately eight millions, do you remember how many Canadians were mobilized for WW1? A half million? More? Less?

Please join us and find out.

The following are two paragraphs provides extra details about the presentation.

Wartime songwriters composed songs that were sometimes cheeky, such as Belgium Put the Kibosh on the Kaiser, 1914, celebrating the surprising and resolute Belgian resistance to the initial German advance; or downright silly, such as, K-K-k-Katie, a Canadian-composed wartime song from 1918, about a young soldier who has a stuttering problem. But, however cheeky, or silly, all of these songs reflected aspects of our wartime culture.

And of course there were many bittersweet songs that reflected the realities of a call to arms and a soldier’s impending separation from home. Keep the Home Fires Burning (Till the Boys Come Home) was a popular recruiting song, but also included a key message

about how a soldier's (or nurse's) loved ones would wait and worry and constantly pray for his or her safe return.
