## ***REMEMBRANCE DAY 2018***

We acknowledge this weekend the eleventh hour (pause), of the eleventh day (pause), of the eleventh month that marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the World War One.

Unfortunately it also marks the sowing of the seeds of World War Two that saw even many more millions die or become disabled whether in mind or body as both wars and all wars devastate families and loved ones.

Canada lost over 60,000 dead and another 138,000 wounded in World War One with over 43,000 lost and another 172,000 wounded in World War Two. In all nations, over 40 million died in World War One and 60 million in World War Two.

We must remember those brave Canadian men and women who sacrificed so much to ensure that the freedoms and rights we so often take for granted were preserved for the generations that followed.

Honour and Homage is their just reward. As stated in the poem “In Flanders Fields”, these were the ones who “took up the torch and held it high.”

Let us acknowledge all members of our military to whom we owe such a debt of gratitude as we listen to “In Flanders Fields”

The ringing is meant to prompt a moment of silence and reflection on the loss of life and suffering caused by war.
