Helpful Tips On Using This Book To Best Benefit Your Child


1. Have your child point out the different shapes and colors.
2. Ask your child to answer the following questions that correspond with the reading:
 - a. Page 2 – Which shape is on the right? What is the color of Square? Which shape is jumping the highest?



- b. Page 4 – What are the different shapes on the page? How many sides does the pink pentagon have? How many points does the yellow star have? Which two shapes have the same number of sides?



- c. Page 7 – How many windows are on the door? How many circles are on the page?



d. Page 11 – What color is the oval?



e. Page 12 – What shape is on the right?



3. After finishing, go over the moral of the story, “Different shapes are good at different things,” and how it applies to real life.
