roster to check it over and contact any delinquent members. If there are problems with the roster, then the Jr. Vice and Detachment

Paymaster should make the

Paymaster should make the corrections and forward a copy to the Department Adjutant/ Paymaster and to the National membership section.

Also, the Jr. Vice arranges with the membership to hold recruiting events.

Remember, it is not only the Jr. Vice who can recruit new members. We are all recruiters! How many of you have taken the time to look at the recruiting video on the National website? It has some good information and ideas. Presently, the Department has a couple of

Detachments that are in jeopardy of losing their Charter because they do not have enough members. Remember that it is the Detachment Paymaster's responsibility to send out renewal notices to their members.



You need to start getting your registrations and room reservations for the Department Convention as soon as possible. Also, you need to let the hosting

Detachment know if you will need transportation to and from the convention center. If there are not enough people requesting transportation the host Detachment will have to cancel the buses. Also, send your ads in for the Convention Program. Getting these things done early makes it a lot easier on the hosting Detachment and makes the Convention run smoother. This report is to show where we are after switching to everyone's dues being due on 1 September of each calendar year.

Membership delinquent dues are extremely high for this period of time. It is the responsibility of the Detachment to track location and collect dues of its membership. Fifty five percent (55.4%) of our membership (Regular, Associates, Multiple) has not renewed. This cash flow impacts our spending for ordering supplies to replenish our Ships Store (no

stock), paying the rent, electric, computer and phone systems, salaries of our staff and the insurance for the entire organization. This is called overhead of the non-profit corporation. We have monitored our cash flow and delayed paying of bills and placing orders to keep from establishing another Line of Credit causing the League to be in debt. I am very proud we are debt free in our operating funds and meeting our expenses to date. We need for everyone to pay or collect the unpaid dues to give us the operating funds required to provide the services required. We have submitted invoices to other businesses where we have contracts to gain unpaid funds and to establish a normal business invoice system to collect money owed to the organization. This has allowed us to operate in the black to date. As you can see, a void of \$334,740 is nothing to neglect and that is why I am sending this to our National Vice Commandants for distribution to every member of the League. Thank you for your anticipated help on the delinquent dues and recruitment of existing members. New members are also a positive approach. WE NEED YOUR HELP.

Hope everyone had a Happy New Year; be prepared to come to Mid-Winter to work.



Overcoming resistance, personal or organizational,

depends on understanding.
Benjamin Franklin valued
this, telling us that questioning
authority is the "first
responsibility of every citizen."
It helps to understand that
resistance is a normal response
and that trying to avoid any
resistance is ridiculous. The best
laid plans and systems fail if the



people side of change management is ignored. Resistance to change is a normal response, so plan for it, expect it and accept it. Resistance does not mean that the change is bad, or that the change process has failed. Nor does it mean that those resisting change are bad people who are getting in the way of change!

The clue to overcoming resistance is understanding that you cannot avoid resistance, but you can manage it. Remember that people experience change in personal ways. Addressing people's needs and values when you encounter resistance to change can reduce any negative impact of

resistance. Changing your attitude towards resistance is what's needed to ensure successful change.

Threats of closing Detachments by Staff is not the answer, instead being counterproductive. It undermines the purpose for change. We must all do our part in making this transition as smooth as possible.

There are a couple of points that I would like to inform the membership about:

One is that those who are members of a web group called *Together We Served* (TWS) (a contact group of Marines and Veteran Marines who can get together and contact old friends, the Marine Corps League and the Admin for TWS) have entered into a partnership. Many of you will be receiving an email from them asking you to join the Marine



Corps League, and the Marine Corps League will publish an ad in the "Semper Fi" magazine asking you to join the TWS. They will be offer-

ing discounts on life memberships in the TWS and reduced fees for joining. It may very well be a great thing for both organizations as they have a membership of over 400,000 members that the League can offer membership to - active and Veteran Marines, Navy Corpsmen and Navy Chaplains - and the MCL can promote the TWS. It is a Win Win opportunity for both.

Second is the membership in the Division has slipped dramatically from last year. But I have to say we have done slightly better than the National average of 50% unpaid as of the December 31st report. Division had 762 unpaid members of 821

paid and 1,467 life members, a total of 2,288. What this means is we have to contact these unpaid members at

the Detachment level and find out if they wish to renew and if not why, so we can correct the problem. I feel that a lot of them were not reminded their dues were due and some may be confused by the new due dates. Whatever the cause, it needs work at all levels to correct the problem, because if this continues the League itself may be in serious trouble going forward. But overall the Division is doing much better in other areas, such as timely Officer Installation Reports, P.L.M. reports, and IRS issues. Good work by all in these areas!

ACHMENIS of District 5 have faced difficult challenges the past several months. On August 27th, 2017, Hurricane Harvey with 130 mph winds made landfall near Rockport, Texas, and travelled inland to Houston leaving tremendous flooding in its path. Houston received over 50 inches of rain and some Detachment

members in Brazoria, Harris and Galveston Counties were in the direct path of the flooding. Hurricane Harvey was downgraded to a Tropical Storm and receded back into the Gulf of Mexico

and made landfall three separate times. After causing tremendous damage in the above counties, the storm moved east to Beaumont where rescue efforts were conducted by amphibious vehicles from Charlie Company, 4th Amtrac Bn., in Galveston.

The devastation caused by Hurricane Harvey had a catastrophic impact on the lives of many of our league and non-league members. Please send the nominations to the Marine of the Year Chairman, **John Mashunkashey**, via email *(johnawake65@windstream.net)* or mail to 416 2nd St., Barnsdall, OK 74002. *The nomination procedure is shown below*.

This award shall be presented to a regular member of the Southern Division who has rendered service that distinguishes themselves above and beyond the duties and obligations normally expected to membership in the Marine Corps League. Any member of the Southern Division may originate the nomination of a candidate for this award. The nomination of a candidate shall be made in letter form, either typed or legibly hand written, and shall be signed by at least four members in good standing. The nomination letter must indicate the nominee's Detachment name and all signers of the nomination letter must indicate the name of their Detachment. The letter of nomination should clearly describe the candidate's achievements and contributions that have served to bring acclaim and prestige to the Marine Corps League or United States Marine Corps and/or have enhanced or furthered the concepts of duty as a citizen of the United States of America. The letter of nomination should stress and emphasize the nominee's achievements and contributions for the most recent year but may also include supplemental information about the nominee's merits beyond that period. The letter may be augmented by attached endorsements or affidavits, such as newspaper accounts of a deed or deeds, but such endorsements are not required. Nominations may be submitted to any member of the Marine of the Year Society but must be received by a member of the society no later than March 15 of the current year.

The Southern Division Marine of the Year Society

Marines who have been formerly honored as Southern Division Marine of the Year shall assume the privilege of membership in the Southern Division Marine of the Year Society. The Society is charged with receiving and reviewing recurrent nominations for the Marine of the Year award and selects a spokesperson from among their membership to name their selection for the Southern Division Marine of the Year at the Southern Division Conference.



Force Wraps Up Mission in Afghanistan

The first Marine Corps task force to deploy to southern Afghanistan's violent Helmand province since the Corps pulled out of the region in 2014 officially ended their nearly yearlong mission on Monday.

Top brass from Marine Corps Task Force Southwest handed over command of U.S. military adviser operations in Helmand Province to a new division of Marines, which will continue training and advising Afghan security forces in Helmand and elsewhere in southern Afghanistan, during a ceremony at Camp Shorab.

"Our partners really... stole the initiative from the enemy. They stole the initiative, and they never relinquished it," Task Force Commander Brig. Gen. Roger Turner said shortly after the handover ceremony.

"Doing operation after operation in Nad'Ali, Marjah, Nawa, Sangin, and Garmser, they have continued nearly continuous operations since last April," the one-star general added in a task force statement.

The incoming Marine Corps task force, led by Brig. Gen. Benjamin Watson, will take over responsibility for U.S. adviser teams assigned to Afghan National Army 215th Corps and 505th Zone National Police.

"We're grateful for this opportunity — the opportunity to come to a place where we have history as a service, and as individuals," Gen. Watson said.

The Marines' continued presence in Helmand is yet another chapter in the Corps' difficult and bloody history in an area long known as the Taliban's spiritual heartland.
