Monica Kurz began working in the field of suicide prevention in 2005 as a volunteer counselor for the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline at Headquarters, Inc. She brought her passion for compassionate listening and a focus on consumer strengths to her work as a case manager in community mental health centers. After nine years of case management, Monica transitioned to the University of Kansas, School of Social Welfare as consultant for evidence-based treatment models of case management including the Strengths Model and Integrated Dual Disorder Treatment. Throughout this time, Monica maintained a focus on supporting high-quality suicide intervention services on the NSPL as a trainer with Headquarters, Inc. In January 2017, she moved to full time work on suicide prevention as the Director for the Kansas Suicide Prevention Resource Center. She enjoys educating and consulting with communities about prevention work and building suicide safer communities.

### **About the Presentations:**

#### Session One: Suicide Risk Assessment

Standardized assessment of suicide risk which is supported by a robust evidence base is essential for quality practice and to address the public health problem of suicide in Kansas. The C-SSRS is quickly becoming the "gold standard" in suicide risk assessment due to the flexibility it offers across settings, the accessibility of training for professionals in a variety of fields and the evidentiary support it shows for assessing risk for suicide attempts and ideation.

#### Learning objectives of this session include:

- 1. Learn about the importance of standardized assessment of suicide risk and severity across multiple community and healthcare settings.
- 2. Become familiar with the Columbia-Suicide Severity Rating Scale (C-SSRS).
- 3. Learn how to utilize the tool with people at risk of suicide, and understand how to score the scale.

#### Session Two: Ethical Considerations for the Care of Suicidal Individuals

Competence is a key ethical factor in the care of individuals at risk of suicide. It is essential for psychologists (and other mental health professionals) to expand their competency to include the appropriate and effective assessment and treatment of suicidal individuals. This session will focus on common challenges experienced by clinicians working with people at risk of suicide.

#### Learning objectives will include:

- 1. Identify ethical principles associated with treatment of suicidality.
- 2. Work through case examples which demonstrate challenges and opportunities for ethical treatment of suicidality
- 3. Be familiar with evidence in support of treatment of suicidality in the least restrictive setting
