Incorporating Quotations in Writing

In your writing, never have a quotation standing alone as a complete sentence. Think of a quotation as a helium balloon. When you let go of a helium balloon, it flies away. In a way, the same thing happens when you present a quotation that is standing all by itself in your writing, a quotation that is not "held down" by one of your own sentences. The quotation will seem disconnected from your own thoughts and from the flow of your sentences.
