Measure of impact for Pupil Premium expenditure in 2018/19:

A. There are currently 9 Pupil Premium pupils on roll. 2 of these pupils are LAC. This represents 26.5% (25 % May 2019) of the school, which is just above the national average (23.5%). This percentage is slightly lower than 2018 (28.1%). Data shows an increase in attainment for reading and writing (May 2019).
