Saving Your Family Photos Why I Give Fast Facts: School Programs Events & Programs for You! Family photographs, whether in the history center collection or in your home, are often pasted or glued to black paper, or sandwiched between sheets of cardboard.

You might think that the best way to preserve the photographs is to remove the photographs from the paper and albums. But that's not always the case. Many times the risk of tearing or damaging the photograph is too great.

The best way to preserve your old photo albums is by storing them in acid-free boxes and wrappers.

The best way to preserve your family photos is to scan and save them to a computer or online photo service.

The Thomson Family

The Thomson family has a long history in Andover. One of the most well-known is Abby Locke Thomson. In 1866-1867, when she was 16 years old, Abby kept a daily diary that's now in the history center collection. Abby left behind a snapshot of post-Civil War Andover. She also wrote about clothes, boys, parties, and school. Not much has changed!

Abby was a grandmother by the time the girls in the photos here spent a day hamming it up for the camera at the Thomson family homestead on Abbot Street.

Generations later, the Thomson family created the printed photo album shown below with each family member identified and placed in the family tree.

Tips for Saving Your Digital Photos

- Download photos from your phone or camera to a computer.
- Back up. Back up. Upload images to a photo sharing service.
- Delete bad, blurry, and duplicate images.
- Identify or group your photos with dates. Add numbers because you will probably have more than one! Like this AuntMaryThanksgiving2018-1.jpg
- Print out your best photographs because sometimes the old-fashioned way is still the best!
- Use an online book tool and print a family photo album like this one.






Why I Give...My Time Andover at Work Volunteer
