Club Speakers

19th January 2016: Transformation from the Ground Up by Sam Parkin

Sam Parkin, an ex-Poole Grammar Schoolboy, gave us a talk about his time in South Africa with ICS (International Citizen Service). Sam is taking a gap year before going up to Cambridge to study natural Sciences, and he applied to go on an ICS sponsored project. To achieve that, he had to raise £1500 by his own efforts and by undertaking a 12 hour sponsored tennis marathon he raised over £2000.

Sam spent 10 weeks in South Africa, living with a Zulu family and assisting with teaching in a Zulu school for orphaned and vulnerable children. He assisted with the teaching of a wide range of age groups, and found the experience has contributed greatly to his self-confidence and personal development. We were all struck by Sam's maturity and his presentational skills and felt his time abroad helped, not only those needy children in South Africa, but also Sam himself. (Peter Taylor)

16th February 2016: Poole Quays Forum by Bill Contance

Bill Constance (Forum Chairman) explained how over the last two and a bit years the Poole Quays Forum had come together to take advantage of the 2011 Localism Act. The group had gone through the statutory requirements to develop a neighbourhood forum and proposed neighbourhood plan. Covering the Old Town and Hamworthy with their 8000 residents the Plan had been submitted to Poole Council on 1 December 2015. Currently subject to evaluation, it has to be voted through by residents and businesses before it is adopted as part of the Council's planning policy. (Alun Williams)

23rd February 2016: Bowel Cancer by Prof. Alex Mirnezami

To set the scene Alex reported that about 40,000 cases of Bowel Cancer are diagnosed each year – 110 per day! It is one of the primary fatal diseases. To illustrate its impact he summarised the story of R.J.Mitchell – the designer of the Spitfire who died of bowel cancer in his 40's before seeing the success of his design in action, in spite of receiving the best care available at the time. This care was only palliative and less than 5% of patients survived for 5 years or more. The major problem is the cancer spreading to other parts of the body, particularly the organs at or below the waist, but can include the brain.

Alex then reported that in recent years two routes to improved treatment have been identified. The first was massive surgery removing everything affected. This can have a major effect on a patient's life and is, therefore, only undertaken with the patient's full agreement. The operation required can take 8-21 hours with up to 5 different surgery teams cooperating to work on different organs, but it can generate a 50% chance of 5-yr survival.

The second route is the main area of Alex's current research – The identification of gene characteristics – Micro-RNA's or MiR's – that are particularly prevalent in affected tissue. These have been found to accelerate the spread of the cancer but, also, it has been found that they can be targeted by gene therapy. This will not be a single "magic bullet" as many MiR's are involved and each one needs its own treatment. For example, Alex is now working with a team of 10 people on this research and MiR's numbered 154 and 223 of the ones they have investigated so far have been found to be active. One interesting thing about this £multi-million research is that it was all kick-started by an initial £9,000 grant from charity to fund the initial exploration. We left the meeting knowing that in the foreseeable future this new therapy route will lead to a massive reduction in the threat posed by this disease. (Nigel Wrigley)

An **education programme** featuring jazz workshop opportunities for young musicians followed by a schools jazz competition in which bands will be judged and given feedback from an expert panel of judges.

A culminating **Awards Ceremony with Concert** will feature The Dorset Youth Jazz Orchestra and the Bournemouth University Big Band plus special guests.

In addition the Festival will feature many of Bournemouth and Dorset’s best-loved jazz musicians and groups including tenor sax player **Ian Ellis’s Quartet**, trumpet player **Andy Urquhart’s Sound of Blue Note** with special guest **Mark Nightingale** added on trombone, celebrated club singer **Rachel More**, **Sarah Bolter’s “Not Just Sax”** with special guest **Tina May** on vocals, **The Swing Unlimited Big Band** performing a night of swing classics, **The Girls Only Jazz Orchestra** and **Zoe Schwarz’s** award winning **Blue Commotion band**.
