Toddlethon



The weather was warm and sunny for the 16th annual Toddlethon held on Wednesday 10th May in Poole Park. Approximately 225 young children took part in the toddle around the cycle track that was led by the Mayor of Poole, Xena Dion. Their sponsorship will raise over £4000 that will be shared between four charities—Dorset Mind, Home-Start, Life Education Wessex and End Polio Now. At the end of the toddle the children enjoyed biscuits and drinks while they were entertained by Count Backwards.



Club Speakers

4th April 2017: Dorset Mind by Karen Butters

Karen Butters is Head of Health, Safety and Wellbeing in the administration of Bournemouth University. She is a trustee of 'Dorset Mind' which is the local element of a national project called 'National Mind' which was set up in 1946. These bodies provide care for those suffering from various forms of mental illness. Anxiety and depression are conditions which are commonly found but there is also support for those suffering from schizophrenia and a number of other obsessive complaints.

'Dorset Mind' is an independent voluntary organisation which is registered as a charity; it has seven staff and a group of fifty volunteers who carry out the work. Their object is to help and support those suffering from mental illness and to restore them to normality. Sadly, it became clear that many of those afflicted were teenagers and young adults who were unable to cope with the pressures of modern life.

Regrettably, the care of the mentally sick lags behind the progress that has been made in the treatment of those with physical illnesses and there was a hope that the work of 'Dorset Mind' might help to reduce this deficiency. It was a hope that those present at this interesting talk earnestly shared.

25th April 2017: Bournemouth in Bloom by Rotarian Rev. Chris Colledge

The Rev Chris Colledge is the chairman of Bournemouth Horticultural Society and was given a warm welcome as a member of the Rotary Club of Westbourne.

The Bournemouth Horticultural Society was founded in 1884 and its objects are:-

- to promote an interest in gardening
- to hold flower shows
- to hold regular information meetings
- to provide an exchange for seeds and plants
- to offer discounted prices for seeds, plants and gardening sundries.

Regular shows are arranged throughout the year following the change of the seasons from early spring-time to the harvest-tide of autumn. The Society owns the brand 'Bournemouth in Bloom' of which there are a number of subordinate bodies in the suburbs of the conurbation. Many of the floral displays which make our urban surroundings so agreeable are administered through this structure.

Chris gave a wide-ranging talk beginning with reminiscences of a voyage on a containership which he undertook before studying for the priesthood. He then moved on to more specific matters relating to the work of the Bournemouth Horticultural Society. He summed up with his slogan 'growing together in the community' which he left resonating quietly in the ears of his appreciative audience.

16th May 2017: Gerry Clarke and Don Nutt

It was a stormy night and the rain came down in torrents so it was fortunate that the trip planned to visit the English Oak Vineyard had been cancelled.

After supper at 'The Riviera Hotel' those assembled were happily entertained by Gerry Clarke and Don Nutt.

Gerry gave a comprehensive description of the arrangements for the Jazz by the Sea Festival 2017 which will take place in Bournemouth and Poole from 11th to 17th June. It was clear that Gerry has put a big effort into this and it should be rewarded by support from all those who like to swing - As we all know 'It don't mean a thing...'

Don gave an interesting talk about the heyday of Poole's maritime history in the century and a half from the reign of Good Queen Bess to the coming of the Hanoverians. We heard of three sea captains of Poole whose names are preserved in the narrow alleyways in and around the town's waterfront. There was Henry Brookes who sailed to Newfoundland at the age of thirteen; Captain John Bennett of the Royal Navy who amassed a vast fortune before his death at the age of forty-six and Woodes Rogers who rescued Alexander Selkirk, the man who inspired Defoe's history of Robinson Crusoe, and went on to be the Governor of the Bahamas in Nassau.

Thanks to both Gerry and Don; it was a very interesting evening.

The Club AGM was held on Tuesday 9 May in the Fusion Building at Bournemouth University.

President's Report

President's Priorities for 2016-17

At the Club Assembly on 14 June 2016 I put forward 5 priorities which were accepted by the Club. They were:



- developing a clear strategic direction for the Club going forward, with discussion in the Club about the options available to us
- giving priority to membership development and the associated PR, taking advantage of the new flexibilities open to clubs as a result of the recent RI rule changes
- ensuring that, through all we do, 'service above self' remains our principal goal, particularly supporting young people to achieve their full potential and offering service to organizations caring for disadvantaged people
- continuing service both locally and internationally, co-operating wherever possible with the other clubs in Poole
- providing a balanced programme of activities so that our Club continues to be a source of enjoyment, fun and fellowship for its members

How did we do?

Strategic Direction of the Club

The first two priorities are inextricably linked in my view. I was delighted to establish a new Membership Development Committee at the start of the year and this turned out to be key to the process of change on which we are embarked. I want to extend my warm congratulations to all concerned on what has been achieved this year. It has been a vigorous programme of development supported by the imaginative use of Facebook. Well done to all!

The creation of the Business Networking Group (BNG) has been a huge step forward by the Club and the Group has, I know, been warmly welcomed by members as a whole. They have already done great work, such as their successful fund raising effort for Routes to Roots, and are full of other ideas too. At the same time, we are delighted to have recruited two new members to the Tuesday Evening Group (TEG) and our total numbers are now over 30. At the end of March we had the first get together of the entire Club when its two sections joined for drinks – a major event in our history, the first such occasion but certainly far from the last, of course. These steps heralded the proposals from the President-elect for radical and challenging changes in the way the Club operates and occasioned what has probably been the most extensive process of consultation ever taken within the Club. Elsewhere in the AGM reports is an account of these changes. 2016-17 has been work in progress.

Service Above Self

Service Above Self remains our principal goal and the committee reports set out an impressive record of achievement in this regard. I do not wish to steal the thunder of the Chairs but I can say we have continued to punch above our weight. I am particularly pleased that we have continued, if not strengthened, our support for young people in a variety of ways, not least the help given to young carers. Our service to the disadvantaged has also continued; a new aspect of this was holding one of our meetings at Crumbs which all present very much enjoyed. We cannot, of course, undertake this work without the necessary resources, human and financial, and I am immensely grateful to those concerned in our fund-raising activities.

The question for the coming year will be: "Are we doing things right or doing the right things?". I know Roger wishes the Club to review all its activities to concentrate on those things which have the biggest impact.

Our Programme

Many will remember the words of the old song: 'Something old, something new, something borrowed, something blue'. This well summarizes our varied programme over the last year and, in my view at least, we have had much enjoyment, fun and fellowship. Old favourites such as our pre-Christmas Dinner, our New Year event, the Bowls Evening and our restaurant visits have continued to delight, whilst newer elements such as the cinema evening and our occasional move to alternative venues such as the University for our AGM and the Crumbs HQ have also been welcomed.

Finally, we have also had a very full and varied programme of speakers and I want to thank Peter Dawes, now about to step down, for his sterling work in this thankless task over several years. As you know, I was keen to promote our own members in our speakers' list and am grateful to those who participated in the Life's Rich Pattern series. There will, I know, be even greater variety in the future.

Two disappointments

I guess almost every President can look back on disappointments. No doubt members can enumerate a long list of these but I will mention just two.

I have been a firm supporter of collaboration with other clubs and still believe this is key to the future of Rotary in the UK. Despite the failure of our efforts to amalgamate with the Poole Club, I wanted to continue our co-operation with the other two clubs in Poole wherever possible. We have been stalwart supporters of the regular Rotary in Poole meetings but they have not, I fear,

yet yielded the concrete gains I had hoped. The three clubs have, however, met together twice during this year and we played our full part in the organization of the Technology Tournament. We also jointly presented a wreath on Remembrance Day. We have been regulars at Group 2 meetings and organized a highly successful local Youth Speaks competition.

Second, more can be done in terms of improving communications within the Club and this was a significant point emerging from the recent consultations. This is not a straightforward issue – I know from my professional life just how difficult it is in any organization – but the changes proposed for next year take this into account.


Concluding Remarks

Business Networking Group Report

The Business Networking Group (BNG) was formally launched on Thursday 6 October at The Plantation in Canford Cliffs, when 11 invitees were welcomed by 4 Poole Bay Rotarians. As of today we have inducted seven new Rotarians (although sadly one of these has had to step down due to pressure of work), with at least another 2 in the pipeline. We have also provided a permanent home for Beverley and Penny from the old satellite group.



We wanted to identify a project that we could call our own and which would provide a focus for the new group to come together on – and so took on the challenge from ‘Routes to Roots’ to help them raise money for their Christmas & Winter Appeal. We organised a ‘Street Music’ event at 2 pubs in Poole and a raffle to raise funds, plus donated a number of sleeping bags. Many thanks to the various Tuesday Evening Group (TEG) members who helped – and to those who gave up some of their meal refunds to buy raffle tickets. In total we raised £1768.



We have also been very conscious that we wanted to take part in the range of service and fund-raising projects planned by the TEG. We took over the Santa train one night, and have been chasing up people, by phone, to participate in this year’s Toddlathon (with some success it appears).

Andrew Mead, the Head at Lytchett Minster, has shown an interest in the group – and we are still hoping to persuade him to join. Several of our members took part in the mock interviews both at Lytchett Minster and at St Edwards Schools (the latter co-ordinated by Parkstone Rotary).

News of the success of our new approach reached the ears of those at District and we were invited to speak at a District seminar at the Potters Heron in April aimed at inspiring a new approach by other Rotary Clubs, through which they could attract more members.

All our members have now been allocated to a Service Committee – indeed as you’ll see later, one has even taken on the role of Chair. We have a good, strong, core group of new Rotarians, who are encouraged by a number of TEG members who regularly attend the Thursday breakfast meetings. We are looking to build on what we have achieved this year, increase our membership to around 20 and play a full part in an integrated programme of events and projects for 2017/18. Club Administration Committee

A number of meetings have taken place away from the Club’s normal venue but these have all been held without undue difficulty. Lytchett Minster School

Our strong relationship with the school, adapting each year according to pupils' priorities, continues:
 Mock interviews – thanks and well done to BNG who provided several interviewers this year
 Polio Eradication – a collection by pupils; a cheque received and forwarded to the project for £75
 Shoeboxes – filled boxes provided by the school and help on our packing night
 Musical Train support – pupils supported one evening with collectors and a Santa helper
 Technology Tournament – 5 pairs of pupils entered this year, one pair was in the winning team
 The school entered four teams in this year's Group 2 Youth Speaks tournament; two were runners up
 Not achieved this year:
 Rotary Young Leaders Award – while not possible this year the school does want to participate next year
 Lions Swimathon – the school was not able to raise a team this year.

Service to organisations working with disadvantaged young people

MyTIME assistance – our support to this charity contributes to a respite weekend for 12 Poole young carers this year
 Kids Out – we are taking the children this year to the Adventure Wonderland at Hurn
 Holton Lee - we aim to set up and start a project with the Livability charity this summer in support of their work there
 Winchelsea- after our help last year the school formally opened their outdoor gym a little while ago.

Re-engagement on the 2010/2011 Alleys Project

Fund-raising Committee

We have seen a significant downturn in our fund-raising totals this year due to the loss of our Easter supermarket collection and revenue from the Lions' Swimathon. I hope to be able to exceed £10,000, but not much more than that.

Christmas Float Collections

Our fund-raising mainstay continues to grow in popularity and thanks to Alun's efforts on Facebook this year we achieved a total of more than 60,000 "hits" from people clicking on our activity pages, commenting and enquiring. The total amount collected was £7192, of which we retained £3543. Without spending too much time searching history, I think the total collected could well be our best yet. The remainder was shared between Home-Start, WaterAid, Soroptimists, Routes to Routes, Westbourne RC, Poole Lions and Julia's House. In addition to the above, we received support from Lytchett Minster School 6th form, Upton Residents and one of our business partners, Parkeon. Thanks to Alun and our Business Networking Group, we were able to obtain some assistance with towing which gave me some respite. The float also appeared in a couple of Christmas events, one leading the very popular Broadstone Carnival and another at a Christchurch business event. A hi-light for me was breaking the "£600 collected in one night" barrier in Lower Parkstone.

Poole Lions Swimathon

Poole Lions this year retained all the Swimathon money for their own charity as this is the Lions Centenary Year and they wanted to make the event unique to them. We still provided considerable support, but sadly attendance was disappointing and the future of the event is being given serious thought by Lions, both in terms of the scale of the event and the methods of fund-raising. We are, however, in receipt of a catch up payment of £650 from gift aid adjustments from previous years.

Toddlethon

We are on the eve of the 2017 Toddlethon, and indications are this year the event will be as successful as ever. Alun compiled a data base of all settings and members made follow up telephone calls. We are raising funds for Home-Start, Life Education Wessex, Dorset Mind and Polio Eradication. We will welcome 200 plus children and their carers, who will toddle around the cricket pitch following the Tank Engine float. Refreshments and entertainment by Count Backwards follow the Toddlethon.

Easter Collections

We have not been able to stage an Easter collection this year as, for some reason, local Supermarkets seem to be restricting charity activity over the Easter period.

Business Partners

Thanks to the ongoing efforts of Peter Hambly, our list of business partners remains at a respectable 7 with the possibility of an additional one in the near future who has expressed a particular interest in supporting the Technology Tournament. Parkeon and Poole Audi are particularly generous in the level of support, both exceeding considerably the nominal annual payment. In conclusion, as I stand down from my chairmanship of the Fund-raising Committee, I would like to thank my present and past committee members for their support and contribution. I wish my successor, Gemma Varnfield, every success and I shall continue to provide ongoing support, in particular with the float. (Peter Taylor)

International and Foundation Service Committee

International:

District 1110 Shoeboxes

A full report was given following our Shoebox Evening in the winter edition of "Bay Views". Essentially we delivered 336 shoeboxes and forwarded to District £336 to cover costs. Of this £240 was provided by the donors of the boxes and £96 from our Trust Fund.

The total number of boxes delivered by District 1110 was 27,200 which this year were sent to Albania, Montenegro, Moldova and Romania, with a small number going to the Gambia.

Disaster Boxes

This year we have sent £200 to Shelter Box and over the past seven years have provided close to £6000, thereby supporting relief for Syrian refugees in Turkey, earthquake victims in Nepal and Haiti and flood victims in Pakistan and Sudan.

Rotary Jaipur Limbs

The Club have given £600 to Jaipur Limbs this year, £200 following a visit and talk by PDG Don Short and £400 to support a new Jaipur Limb Centre in Kagando Hospital, South West Uganda, to be named The George Buckley Memorial Limb Centre. Their total requirement is US\$66,000 and via a number of Matching Grants the Rotary Jaipur Limbs Project Trustees have underwritten this sum.

Tools for Self Reliance

Following a talk by Chris West of TFSR the Club agreed to endeavour to locate relevant unwanted tools and when sufficient tools have been obtained, arrange collection by TFSR. Those that we have are currently stored in Tony Ford's garage.

Seeds for Development

We invited Alison Hall to talk to us about her project in Northern Uganda, whereby she provides seeds to farmers, who sell the resulting maize and beans to the Vision Hope Nursery School, who then provide food to the children, thereby ensuring that the children are both fed and educated. Also, the farmers, who are the children's parents, are ensured a much needed income in a community where there are no jobs and livelihood. We provided £250, including gift aid, towards her target of £2500. This she achieved enabling her to leverage that sum to £10,000.

Twinning with the Rotary Club of Ancenis

They visited us in May last year and came to our President's Night. It is our intention to visit them next year, hopefully in the spring. David Hudson is the prime contact with others in contact from time to time.



Foundation

Polio Eradication

Polio is now endemic in three countries, Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria. Nigeria was free but due to the ensuing conflict, the virus has returned. We continue to provide funds for Polio's elimination, primarily funded by the Toddlethon. On the 28 June 2016 we sent £1000 and are now looking forward to this year's Toddlethon. An additional sum of £200 has been forwarded following the sale of 200 purple crocus lapel badges and Lytchett Minster School forwarded £74.77 following a "mock Polio Immunisation Day".

Foundation Giving

2017 is the Centenary Year for the Rotary Foundation, Rotary International's own charity. To date the Club has funded Foundation by member's contribution of £25 each per year. We also collect money in lieu of giving Christmas Cards which this year raised £205.25.

Membership Committee

The plan was to increase the Tuesday Evening Group (TEG) membership to 25 and launch a Business Networking Group (BNG), targeting at least 12 new members. The overall outcome was successful, we attracted new members and raised the profile of the Club.

How did we do this?

1. Undertook an assessment of current club classifications, identified gaps and targeted new member classifications in areas such as the Academia, Business Consultants, Administrators, Medical Professionals, Hoteliers etc. and invited suggestions or contacts from Club members.
2. Looked at frequency, timings and venues of meetings for both the TEG and the BNG.
3. With grant funding support from RIBI we created new club promotional materials including roller banners and three information leaflets.
4. Embarked upon a new membership drive through a number of Club and personal contacts.
5. Continue to arrange display details of Club meetings through local hotels and estate agents.
6. We invited Rotarian Malcolm Dent to come and talk to us about the effective use of Social Media.
7. Increased the content of our Website and Facebook pages, illustrating the fun and enjoyment that can be had working to serve our local community through Rotary membership.
8. Our offer for the Club to host a BBC "Any Questions" evening in The Lighthouse is still on the table.
