Effective January 1, 2018

In November of 2017, our Board of Directors and the Volunteer Fire Department as a whole, made the tough decision to increase our annual membership from \$25 annually to \$35 annually. The White Bluff-Rye Hill Volunteer Fire Department has been at \$25 annually since it began in As each of you know, times have changed dramatically since 1976, and so has our fire department. This increase to \$35 will still keep us as one of this areas lowest annual membership rates for a volunteer fire department.

This increase from \$25 to \$35 will allow us to continue improving our departments emergency apparatus, equipment and personal protective gear. With added area, added trucks, added equipment, come added expenses. We hope that you understand our need for this increase and continue to support our volunteer fire department with your annual membership and additional donations, whenever possible.

WHITE BLUFF—RYE HILL V.F.D. EXPANDS COVERAGE AREA INTO JENNY LIND & SHADOW LAKE

In April of 2017, the Sebastian County Quorum Court voted to reassign the two Jenny Lind fire stations and expand the fire coverage areas of the White Bluff-Rye Hill V.F.D., Greenwood Rural V.F.D. and E.M.P. V.F.D. This expanded fire coverage area assigned to our department, included approximately 70% of the Jenny Lind community and all of the Shadow Lake community. We were assigned an additional 669 structures and approximately 8+ more square miles of coverage area. The Quorum Court voted to assign the fire station at 14711 Rye Hill Road South to our department, giving us (3) stations to properly protect and cover our area.

The White Bluff-Rye Hill Volunteer Fire Department is here to provide you with the best fire protection, emergency medical services, search and rescue team, community fire safety programs, and other programs and services to the best of our abilities. Our fire department has been providing fire protection and other emergency services for over 41 years, and look forward to the opportunity to provide these services to each of you, in our newly assigned area.

Our fire department is very active in our communities, whether that be training in different portions of our fire coverage area, pre-planning, fire safety and prevention programs or events where we invite the community to come and see what we do. It is our goal to continue to grow along with our communities and be an active part of that growth and make it as fire safe as it can be.

WHITE BLUFF – RYE HILL VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT ISO FIRE CLASS RATING OF 5

The Insurance Services Office (ISO), a national insurance industry risk rating and assessment service, has the White Bluff-Rye Hill Volunteer Fire Department rated as a Class 5 Department. The ISO rating of a community affects the insurance premiums that policyholders pay for fire insurance on commercial and residential buildings. The Class 5 rating improvement was updated for our department in August 2014, and places our department in the top 25% of all (1,425 Paid and Volunteer combined) fire departments in Arkansas and in the top 35% percent of all (49,000+ Paid and Volunteer) fire departments in the United States.

defense while an ISO class 1 rating is the most effective fire defense system from an insurance analysis perspective. Most fire insurance carriers, particularly those covering commercial properties, utilize ISO Class ratings in determining policy rates.

The ISO reviews several primary areas in determining a community's rating – its fire department's resources, personnel and training, the public water system quality and capabilities, and the community's 911 emergency dispatch services. An achievement like this does not happen overnight. Rather, it results from consistent and committed leadership over many years involving a vast array of people on the fire department ranging from Executive Board Members, Firefighters, and Ladies Auxiliary Members. The true dedication and commitment to the Fire Department's accreditation by our members, to improve and expand training, improve our record keeping, improvements to our water haul capabilities, the 911 dispatch system, as well as the capital improvements to the White Bluff-Rye Hill V.F.D.'s firefighting equipment, were all critical items in achieving and maintaining this ISO Class 5 certification.

Do you have Smoke Detectors in your family's home?

Smoke Alarms – Why, Where, and Which? A smoke alarm is critical for the early detection of a fire in your home and could mean the difference between life and death. Fires can occur in a variety of ways and in any room of your home. But no matter where or how, having a smoke alarm is the first key step towards your family's safety.

Why are Smoke Alarms Important? Every year in the United States, about 3,000 people lose their lives in residential fires. In a fire, smoke and deadly gases tend to spread farther and faster than heat. That's one reason why most fire victims die from inhalation of smoke and toxic gases, not as a result of burns. A majority of fatal fires happen when families are asleep because occupants are unaware of the fire until there is not adequate time to escape. A smoke alarm stands guard around the clock and, when it first senses smoke, it sounds a shrill alarm. This often allows a family the precious but limited time it takes to escape. About two-thirds of home fire deaths occur in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms. Properly installed and maintained smoke alarms are considered to be one of the best and least expensive means of providing an early warning of a potentially deadly fire and could reduce the risk of dying from a fire in your home by almost half.

Where Should Smoke Alarms be Installed? Smoke alarms should be installed on every level of the home, outside sleeping areas, and inside bedrooms. A smoke alarm should be installed and maintained according to the manufacturer's instructions. When installing a smoke alarm, many factors influence where you will place it, including how many are to be installed. Consider placing alarms along your escape path to assist in egress in limited visibility conditions. In general you should place alarms in the center of a ceiling or, if you place them on a wall, they should be 6 to 12 inches below the ceiling.

- * Install a working smoke alarm on every level of the home, outside sleeping areas, and inside bedrooms.
- * Replace smoke alarm batteries at least annually, such as when resetting clocks in the fall or spring.
- Test all smoke alarms in your house once a month.
- * Do not place a smoke alarm too close to a kitchen appliance or fireplace, as this may result in nuisance alarms.
- * Avoid locating alarms near bathrooms, heating appliances, windows, or ceiling fans.
- * Replace smoke alarms that are more than 10 years old. Smoke alarms don't last forever.
- * Develop and practice a fire escape plan, because working smoke alarms and a fire escape plan will increase your protection in case of a fire.

Charlie helped bring a fledgling fire department that started in 1976 by working hard with others to acquire equipment and trucks. They worked on old military vehicles and converted them into fire trucks, then purchased and refurbished an old pumper to get the department going. Over the years, Charlie was front and center on his desire and commitment to constantly improve our departments equipment, trucks, and training. Through hard work, dedication, donations and the communities support, our department has continued to grow and thrive due to the leadership and commitment that Chief Mitchael instilled in all of our firefighters and support personnel.

Many years ago, Charlie along with a few others understood the need for all of the fire departments to come together to train, share knowledge and assist each other on emergencies. Charlie helped form the Sebastian County Fire Association and served as President for a number of years and also served as the County Training Coordinator. Charlie also served in the capacity of Fire Service Coordinator for Sebastian County and served on several boards for emergency services and was in touch with local and state legislators throughout his career pushing to help improve funding for volunteer fire departments.

Charlie will always remain as one of the most well respected firefighters to serve in Sebastian County. Everyone that knew him, knew of his dedi-

cation to helping others. We could write volumes of books on how many lives Charlie touched during his time on earth. He will be truly missed but will forever live on in the lives of everyone he has touched and be a part of everyone that has or will serve with the White Bluff—Rye Hill Volunteer Fire Department.

QUICK FIRE SAFETY & PREVENTION FOR YOUR HOME & FAMILY

Prevent fire from entering your home. Fire kills 4,000 people and injures more every year. Here are some fire precautions you can take:

- * Install smoke alarms on every floor of your home and near bedrooms. Test them monthly and replace batteries regularly.
- Keep fire extinguishers in areas like the kitchen, near the fireplace, and in the garage or workshop (ABC multi-purpose fire extinguisher is the best for home use). Make sure the extinguisher is kept charged and practice using it. Don't ever use water on electrical or grease fires- it will shock you or spread the fire.
- * Have a family escape plan young children and older people are very vulnerable to fire injuries, so teach them in advance:

If you do have a fire get everyone out immediately. Call the fire department by dialing **911**. Children should also be taught to use **911** when appropriate and should be assured that they will not be in trouble for calling **911** during an emergency.

FIRE SAFETY TIPS FOR YOU AND YOUR FAMILY

Would you know what to do if a fire started in your home? Would your kids? Take the time now to review fire safety facts and tips so your family will be prepared in the event of a fire emergency in your home.

Fire Prevention

Of course, the best way to practice fire safety is to make sure a fire doesn't break out in the first place. That means you should always be aware of potential hazards in your home. Start by keeping these tips in mind:

Electrical Appliances, Cords, and Outlets

Are your electrical appliances in good condition, without loose or frayed cords or plugs?

Are your outlets overloaded with plugs from the TV, computer, printer, video game system, and stereo? Are you overusing an extension cord?

Do the light fixtures in your home use bulbs that are the correct wattage?

Does your home contain GFCIs (ground fault circuit interrupters) and/or AFCIs (arc fault circuit interrupters), which prevent electrical shock and fire by shutting off faulty circuits?

Look around your house for potential problems and unless you're a trained electrician, be careful about do-it-yourself electrical projects. Studies have shown that many home fires are caused by improper installation of electrical devices. Replace or professionally repair any appliances that spark, smell unusual, or overheat.

Don't run electrical wires under rugs.

Make sure lamps and night-lights are not touching bedspreads, drapes, or other fabrics. Use caution when using electric blankets.

Careful in the Kitchen

Did you know that cooking is the leading cause of home fires in the United States? The kitchen is full of ways for a fire to start: food left unsupervised on a stove or in an oven or microwave; grease spills; a dish towel too close to the burner; a toaster or toaster oven flare-up; a coffee pot accidentally left on.

Always supervise kids while cooking and practice safe cooking habits — like turning all pot handles in so they can't be accidentally knocked over and not wearing loose-fitting clothing that could catch fire around the stove.

Using Candles Safely

As decorative candles become more popular, candle fires are on the rise. If you light candles, keep them out of reach of kids and pets, away from curtains and furniture, and extinguish them before you go to bed. Make sure candles are in sturdy holders made of non-flammable material that won't tip over. Don't let older kids and teens use candles unsupervised in their rooms.

CONTROLLED BURNS What you should know!

We have people call us each year with questions about burning brush and yard debris so we thought we would provide some brief points as to the do's & don'ts.

- First of all, anytime you are going to have a controlled burn, please notify the Sheriff's Department at 479-783-1051 and inform them you are burning and give them your name and address. This prevents us from getting called out from a passerby calling your burn into 911.
- If your fire gets out of control, please call 911 immediately so they can dispatch us to extinguish the fire.
- Please do not burn when there is a BURN BAN issued or when conditions are unfavorable, such as high winds, etc. We have several signs in our area that will advise when burn bans are in effect.
- Backyard Burning is the burning of household trash by residents, on their own property. Burning household trash containing plastics, latex, and styrofoam releases toxins into the air.



Things to know About our Fire Department

Our fire department covers twenty four plus (24+) square miles of homes and businesses with approximately 3,950 people living in our fire district. Our department supplies mutual aid to any department in Sebastian County that requests our assistance, including the City of Fort Smith and also assist the Pocola, OK fire department when requested. Our department provides our community with not only Firefighting Services, but Emergency Medical Services, Auto Extrication, Search and Rescue, along with Fire Safety and Prevention Services. It is our goal to serve our community and make it an all-around safer place to live.




