So what ever emotions you are feeling this Eastertime, may what Jesus went through on our behalf, have a real and lasting impact on all our lives and may it help us in our daily walk with God and all we do in his service.

Let's all be Easter people – people who live knowing the tomb is indeed empty – "He's not here, for he is risen!" With Christian love

Who is my Neighbour?

When the Lawyer asked this question, he wanted to put Jesus on the spot, and force Him into saying something that was heretical. Instead Jesus told probably one of the best known parables in the Bible. It's teaching still challenges us today; if we want the world to see God's love it is our actions that demonstrate it - better than the best speech.

In 1960, some 40 million people worldwide were made refugees by war or disasters. Coverage of the suffering sparked a spontaneous outpouring of compassion among UK Christians, who sent money to the Evangelical Alliance. A fund, known at first as EAR, the Evangelical Alliance Relief fund was created to distribute the funds to evangelical agencies caring for the needs of refugees around the world. Money kept coming in to this fund throughout the decade.

In 1967 former curate George Hoffman was hired by the Alliance to develop the fund's work. On 29 May 1968, George and members of the Evangelical Alliance Relief Fund Committee met for the first time, determined to marry Christian compassion with practical action; the vision from which Tearfund (The Evangelical Alliance Relief Fund) was born.

Tearfund works in partnership with the local church as they show God's love through their actions in their community: These 'partners' work with the poorest members of society to bring long term improvement. From the very beginning prayer was at the heart of Tearfund's work and so it continues today. As you read please pray for their work in Iraq.

There are currently more than 3.4 million internally displaced people in Iraq, many of whom have made a perilous journey to escape ISIS. Most live in temporary shelter, often without safe water, sanitation and hygiene facilities, leaving them vulnerable to life threatening diseases:

'We are so thankful for you, as you brought the water tanks and hygiene kits. They have helped us live a life here.

'Lina* and her five children arrived at a temporary settlement after seven days fleeing ISIS.

• Give thanks that they are safe, and ask that Tearfund's hygiene kits and water tanks will reach many more people like Lina to protect them from disease.

Tearfund is working in recaptured areas around Mosul to provide water and electricity so the former inhabitants who fled can return.

• Lift up this project and ask that Tearfund and its partners could help restore basic services for people when they return.

Nasim* and Asma* fled from ISIS with their four young children in 2014. 'When we arrived here there was nothing, it was like a desert,' Asma told us. Since then, Tearfund has negotiated a water pipeline extension and installed 1,800 water storage tanks in their area.

• Pray for this work, that Tearfund could increase the number of settlements it reaches with the blessing of a clean water supply.

plants. For the baskets the raffia is dyed and then woven into fabric on hand looms.

Fair2all not only has fair trade chocolate Easter eggs but also beautifully decorated Papier mache eggs – a classic symbol of Spring! Like the ring boxes that we also stock they are handmade and intricately hand painted with traditional designs. This work provides an income for artisans who live with their families in the rural mountain areas of Kashmir where work opportunities are minimal. They work for a family business, who in addition to paying their workers fairly has built a hospital in Sri Nagar.

Hope we can welcome you to fair2all soon.

A great way to welcome Spring would be to invest in a beautiful Madaraff; ideal for popping a picnic in for days out or keeping your lunch and other goodies safe under your desk. A new selection has just arrived at fair2all.



These baskets are strong and long lasting. The strength comes from the construction – the inner basket is woven penjy which is covered by a variety of woven raffia 'fabric' making them attractive and colourful. Strong leather handles are riveted on to the basket and leather corners are added to make them a very durable. Madaraff baskets are made under fair trade conditions in Madagascar.

This means that everyone who has worked to produce your basket has been paid a fair wage for their work. The raffia fibres are the veins of the leaves of the Raffia Palm, often used by gardeners in its natural form for holding plant grafts together and as a 'natural string' to tie A key part of Tearfund's hygiene work is training and promotion, encouraging people to practise and pass on good techniques to protect themselves and others from disease. In the Dohuk area of northern Iraq, Tearfund has so far reached 6,000 households with hygiene promotion.

- Ask God to bless this project, that people will be enthusiastic and receptive and that many will stay healthy through it.
- Pray for those in positions of power and authority in Iraq, that they would have wisdom in how to lead and would do so effectively, with compassion for all.
- Pray for peace and the effective provision of services and infrastructure to benefit the people.
- Dear Lord, we pray for an end to the conflict in Iraq. Please bless Tearfund's work providing water and help people avoid disease. Give the millions of displaced Iraqis strength and hope for the future. We ask that they will soon be able to return home and that both their temporary settlements and their original towns and villages will have the water, sanitation and hygiene they need. Amen.

I can read bedtime stories till the cow jumps over the moon and sing "Ten Little Monkeys" until I want to call the doctor... but if I don't have love, I'm as annoying as a ringing phone.

I can chase a naked toddler through the house while cooking dinner and listening to voice mail. I can make the best cakes and tea in the neighbourhood and I can tell a sick child's temperature with one touch of my finger... but if I don't have love, I am nothing.

Love is patient while watching and praying by the front window when it's 30 minutes past curfew.

Love is kind when my teen says, "I hate you!"

Love does not envy the neighbours' swimming pool or their brand-new car, but trusts the Lord to provide every need.

Love does not brag when other parents share their disappointments and insecurities,

and love rejoices when other families succeed.

Love doesn't boast, even when I've multi-tasked all day long and my partner can't do more than one thing at a time.

Love is not rude when my spouse innocently asks, "What have you done today?"

Love does not immediately seek after glory when we see talent in our children, but encourages them to get training and make wise choices. Love is not easily angered, even when my 13-year-old acts like the world revolves around her.

Love is not self-righteous when I remind my 17-year-old that he's doing 83 in a 60-mph zone, but rejoices in the truth.

Love does not give up hope.

Love always protects our children's self-esteem and spirit, even while doling out discipline.

Love always trusts God to protect our children when we cannot.

Love always perseveres, through blue nail polish, burps and other bodily functions, rolled eyes and crossed arms, messy rooms and sleepovers. Love never fails.

But where there are memories of thousands of nappy changes and painful labour, they will fade away.

Where there is talking back, it will (eventually) cease.

Where there is a teenager who thinks she knows everything, there will one day be an adult who knows you did your best.

For we know we fail our children, and we pray they don't end up in counselling, but when we get to heaven, our imperfect parenting will disappear. (Thank you, God!)

When we were children, we needed a parent to love and protect us. Now that we're parents ourselves, we have a heavenly Father who adores, shelters us and holds us when we need to cry.

And now these three remain: faith, hope and love.

But the greatest of these *is* LOVE!!

Belonging - Life as a Syrian refuge

Bombs, machine gun fire - these were the constant sounds in my hometown in Syria. One night my parents sat me down and told me their plan. They said that I was to travel on my own to England. I would spend one month walking to the nearest port before spending some months on a boat to England. Once at the port I was packed onto a small motorboat with about fifty other people. We spent what felt like forever at sea with little room. It was horrible.

My parents also told me that in England there was a distant relative who would take me in to live with them. At the port I scanned the crowd but all I saw was... nothing. They weren't there. Had they forgotten me? I had come 4000 miles, risked my life to get here and for what? A huge wave of desperation crashed over me and I sank to my knees and wept. After I had consoled myself, I looked around the port. As I looked round, I noticed a small shack. Outside was a sign saying "Call a contact".

I went over and looked in. On a desk sat a telephone and phone book. I went in and looked for the telephone number. I found it, dialled it and nervously waited...

The East Midlands area has chosen our church to be Church of the Year for 2018. We were asked to write an article for the LINK and thought you might like to read it...

The first Congregational Church in Newton Burgoland was formed in 1790 by the Rev. William Ludford. Initially he preached from the house of Mary Haywood (where he lived until 1807), but a decision was made in 1796 to build a small chapel, paid for by the Rev Ludford and friends. This chapel was located on the opposite side of the Green from the current chapel.

The church soon outgrew this building, and a second was built on the current site (along with a house for the minister), opening in 1807 and having the word "HEPHZIBAH" ("in whom is my delight") over the entrance. Rev Ludford was the minister for over 30 years until his death in 1821. His remains were interred in front of the pulpit and a memorial tablet was erected to his memory.

The gallery and extra schoolrooms were added in 1840 where village children were educated, An extra room was also added to the Minister's house (now occupied by the caretaker)

The pipe organ was presented to the Church in 1935 by John Haywood Compton, founder of the "Compton organs" company of London and son of one of the earliest church secretaries mentioned in the records, also named John Compton.

More recently, in 2008, work was undertaken to update the building - removing several pews and installing a small kitchenette area thus allowing the building to be used more widely by the community - including the mobile Post office and local Rainbows, Brownies and Guide groups.

The garden was updated last year to offer a quiet space for reflection for the people of the village – thanks to grants from CF and the Menorca opencast community fund.

Although we are a small fellowship, we have a heart for loving God and our community and offer what we have to benefit those around and bring glory to God. We support the work of the Ashby Food Bank, through collecting food at our Harvest Festival and during the year, also Ashby Street Pastors and other charities.
