Reflections

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"Then the foremen of the sons of Israel came and cried out to Pharaoh, saying, "Why do you deal this way with your servants?" Exodus 5:15 (NASB)

Serving What Is Comfortable

In Exodus 5, we find four questions. The first question, a question which was asked again and again of God's people throughout the book of Exodus, is "Who will Israel serve?" The answer to that question depends on which verse you are reading. In verses 1 and 3, Moses implies that Israel serves the Lord. But in verses 15-17, it becomes clear that the answer, apparently, is Pharaoh.

The other three questions all have the same answer. In verse 2, Pharaoh asks, "Who is YHWH?" In verse 21, Moses essentially asks the question, "Who am I?" And, in verse 22, Moses asks, "Where is God?" The answer to all three of those questions is, "Just you wait and see." Pharaoh would soon discover who God is. Moses would soon discover who God intended him to be. And everyone would know what God was up to as He acted to force Pharaoh to let His people go so that they might serve the Lord alone.

But the central question in this chapter is "Who will Israel serve?" It was God's intention that they would serve Him, and that they would do so boldly. But as we saw in verses 15-17, Israel's answer in that moment was "Pharaoh." They answered that way because Pharaoh had made their lives miserable. They were not happy as slaves in Egypt, but they were comfortable. And they would remind Moses of that periodically even after they left Egypt, when they remembered eating leeks and onions by the Nile, or when there wasn't enough water, or when they were threatened by their enemies. So, it turns out that what the Israelites served, and often what we find ourselves serving, is what is comfortable.

The Israelites had to choose. They could continue serving Pharaoh. That was costly, though. It meant they would remain in slavery. Or they could serve the Lord. That was costly too, as they learned when they were forced to gather their own straw to make bricks. Clearly serving God is costly. So, the Israelites chose what was comfortable; they chose to serve the devil they knew rather than serve the God they did not know.

Those God has called always face that choice. Whom will we serve? I think most of us would say that we serve God. But I know for myself that, like the Israelites, often what I am really serving is what is comfortable. I don't like change. I don't like challenges. I don't like taking up my cross. I like comfort. I want my faith to be an easy-chair, because I want to be comfortable. The problem, unfortunately, is that in seeking comfort, in sticking with what I know, I end up in slavery. Comfort, it turns out, is costly.

I know that God is at work in our midst, but I don't know just where He is leading us. That makes me uncomfortable. But I am confident in this, that wherever God leads, it will be to greater freedom and to greater grace, because we are led by His Son, Jesus, who died for us, so that we might serve God.
