The Brooke July, 2018

Dear Church Family,

Won't you be my neighbor? Those familiar words of Mr. Rogers are more than a catchphrase – they're an invitation to community and connection with one another. Fred Rogers was actually an ordained Presbyterian pastor who followed his calling to ministry for children by creating the PBS program that ran on TV for more than thirty years. His show premiered in 1968 – the same year the cornerstone for Brooke Road UMC's sanctuary was laid. Ministry isn't limited to working in a church, and Mr. Rogers proved that every day as his messages of love and affirmation reached families in their living rooms across the country.

It's from Mister Rogers' Neighborhood that we take our inspiration for the July sermon series, "Wont' You Be My Neighbor?" You may have seen that a movie about this iconic show just came out, and we're working on schedul-



ing a church trip to go see the film together. Reviews have called the movie, "a balm of kindness and empathy in these troubled, divisive times," which I think we could all use a little more of. With that in mind, I've prepared a sermon series on what it means to be a neighbor and just how radically countercultural real neighborliness can be today.

Throughout July, we'll look at five passages in scripture about what it really means to love our neighbors and ask what those stories might mean for us in Rockford in 2018. On July 1st when we celebrate communion, we'll dive into the familiar story of the Good Samaritan and why that's the story Jesus gave as an answer to a lawyer's question in Luke 10:29, "Who is my neighbor?" On July 8th we'll turn to Amos 5 and the line made famous by Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., "let justice roll down like rivers and righteousness like a never-failing stream." This passage invites us to ask how we can live out our love for neighbor through policy advocacy, and we'll reflect on some misconceptions about what "separation of church and state" means as we recognize the 4th of July, considering how protest can be a form of patriotism.

On July 15th we'll worship outdoors and give thanks for our neighbors in all of creation – the trees, the flowers, the sky, and every beautiful thing God created. The message that day will begin a two week study of the second chapter of James, which offers wisdom about who we are to really see as our neighbors and work to include – not just the rich and powerful, but neighbors who we find anywhere, especially in our own community. On July 22nd we'll continue through James and consider what the phrase "faith without works is dead" is saying to us in our church today. We have a lot of great ministries to celebrate and plenty of room to grow! On July 29th we'll wrap up the series with Isaiah 65 and God's promise that our work is not in vain, but that change and renewal are coming as long as we're willing to work for it.

It has been a wonderful first month with my new church family at Brooke Road, and I'm looking forward to many, many more. Please look over the rest of this newsletter and consider signing up for volunteer opportunities or suggesting a new ministry initiative you might feel called to! I'm praying for each and every one of you, and ask that you continue to keep Kyle and me in prayer as well. Hope to see you Sunday!

Medication Collection

The Walgreens info says they allow both prescription and over-the-counter medications such as pills, capsules, powders, ointments, creams, aerosol cans, inhalers, liquids, lotions, patches, vitamins and pet medications.

The container I used at Walgreens was at the back of the store in the Pharmacy department. Anyone can use it at any time.

I will collect meds again in October for those who don't wish to take them to Walgreens.

Justice For Our Neighbors (JFON)

Justice for Our Neighbors, JFON, is a free immigration legal clinic. In Rockford, the clinic is usually the 4th Sunday of the month, 2:00-5:30 p.m., at Court Street United Methodist Church, 215 N. Court St., Rockford, IL 61103. To make an appointment, call 773 609-4401 or e-mail <u>appointments@nijfon.org</u>.

Hospitality

This includes greeting at the front door. There's an early shift and a late shift on Sunday afternoon, and two people are on each shift. This occasionally involves a little trouble shooting, but the main jobs are to get people signed in and introduced in the hospitality room and to help the clients and visitors feel welcomed and comfortable.

Another job is helping in the hospitality room. This means welcoming people when the greeters bring them to the room and offer them food and a puzzle or other activity while the clients wait. Keep the refreshment table looking nice and the coffee made. If you feel comfortable doing it, you can make small talk with people as they wait. The hospitality coordinators try to be aware of the clients and the volunteers in the room. This job can also include helping to set up and take down. Actually, hospitality is in the job description of everyone — help the clients and visitors feel welcomed.

Child Engagement

Two people at each clinic staff the children's area. There are games, art supplies, toys, and kidfriendly snacks here. Babies usually stay with their parents or grandparents. Older children do puzzles or art in the hospitality room. The children's area has children from toddler to upper elementary as a rule.

Intake Interviews

The coordinator of this area trains the volunteer the first time. For the citizenship form, there's training at 1:00pm before a clinic. There are paper intake forms for new clients and computerized forms for follow-up clients. There are interpreters to help with these interviews and with the attorney interviews if needed. Bilingual people interview in either language, as needed. Usually three to six people are needed for interviewing at each clinic.

Interpreters

Mostly Spanish but sometimes other languages.

Case Manager

This person assists the attorney and intake interviewers by making copies of original documents for the client file. Another job is to prepare file folders and put documents in the correct order. Sometimes this person acts as back-up for the intake coordinators by matching clients, interviewers, and rooms.

Education and Advocacy

Outside the clinic there are other ways to be involved in advocacy and education. Although we're still developing in these areas, we have provided volunteers in citizenship training classes and at citizenship workshops that helped immigrants fill out citizenship applications. Also, some volunteers have lobbied in Springfield and on local issues and have contacted legislators on immigrant issues. We expect to do more of these activities.

Volunteers have rights too and you can always say no if asked to work on a certain day.

Justice For Our Neighbors (continued)

What every volunteer should know

- An important point is that clinics are confidential. You don't talk about clients in identifying ways outside the clinic. If you see a client someplace else, you wait until they recognize and acknowledge you before speaking to them.
- Volunteers don't give legal advice or even say something that might be construed as legal • advice. We can listen actively if a client talks about the case (this actually hardly ever happens) and make neutral replies, but we can't say something like, "It sounds like you have a good case" or "I'm sure everything will turn out okay."
- People who are mandated reporters in some other area of their lives are limited in the jobs they • can do at the monthly clinics according to the Rockford clinic's current policy. The main job available at a clinic is as greeter. It's an important job and allows some interaction with clients. Plus, education and advocacy can be done.
