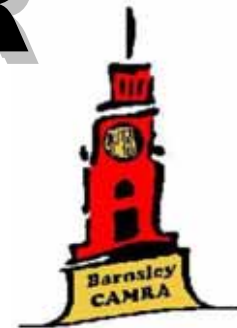

Hung, Drawn, and Quandried?

Counting halls across the land should have rung to the sound of hissing barrels rather than popping corks after the Society of Independent Brewers (SIBA) offered to provide local British beers to all the winning candidates in last weeks General Election.

SIBA had written to 2.300 parliamentary candidates and encouraged them to replace the traditional imported Champagne with a glass or two of beer brewed in their own constituency but they were unsure of how many did take up the offer (*just wait for the receipts*) ed.

SIBA Chairman Keith Bott, said, "It seemed completely wrong for new MP's to be marking a very British occasion with sparkling wine shipped in from France, when there's almost certain to be at least one independent brewer in their constituency."

"Local brewers produce wonderful, craft beers from local, natural ingredients, using minimal food miles. They employ local people and make a valuable contribution to their local economy and community."

"There's also evidence that pubs which serve a GOOD PINT of CASK ale are less likely to fail than those that don't. 60 MP's have signed up to the "I'm Backing the Pub" campaign to stem the current flood of pub closures and we couldn't think of a better way for them to demonstrate their support than by raising a glass of British beer at the start of their term of office."

I wonder how many of them did? ed.

650 Election Candidates

CAMRA, the Campaign for Real Ale, is delighted to announce that over 650 election candidates – that's one for each constituency in the UK - have committed to reforming 'beer tie' arrangements in the UK pubs industry, one of the key causes of high beer prices and wholesale pub closures. This is particularly important at a time when over 5 pubs a day continue to close across the UK. The closures are due in part to large pub companies exploiting tie arrangements, which force tied publicans to buy their beer at around 50% above free market prices.

Reforming the beer tie is one of five key commitments that CAMRA has asked election candidates to sign up to. There has been an unprecedented demonstration of support and interest in the issue of the beer tie, rebalancing alcohol taxation and supporting pubs as a solution to alcohol misuse from candidates hoping to be elected on Thursday.

On the basis of current polling almost 180 of the candidates who have signed up are likely to be elected. During the next parliament CAMRA will be calling on each of the elected candidates to back up their commitment to "reform the beer tie to deliver a fair deal for consumers" with action on issues such as a legally binding code of conduct, a guest beer right and a free of tie option for tied tenants.

Mike Benner, CAMRA Chief Executive, said:

'Such positive support for the core aims of CAMRA's Beer Drinkers and Pub Goers Charter shows that to secure a sustainable future for British pubs and prevent countless local communities from losing their social hub, reform of the 'beer tie' is urgently required. The large pub companies won't be able to escape the growing political pressure for reform.

'The widespread level of support from every political party for community pubs, local

brewers and consumers is a milestone in CAMRA's history, and will form the foundation for effective campaigning by CAMRA's 110,000 members in the next Parliament.'

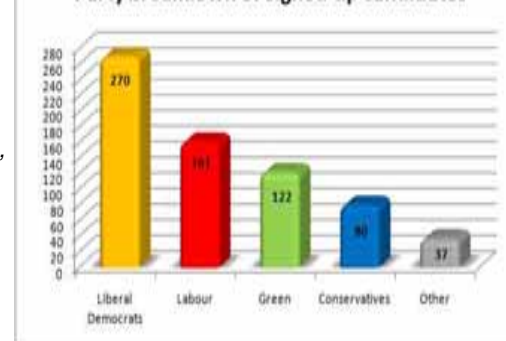
CAMRA is asking election candidates to:

- 1) Promote the interests of Britain's pub goers
- 2) Champion well-run community pubs
- 3) Rebalance alcohol taxation to support beer and pubs
- 4) Reform the beer tie to deliver a fair deal for consumers
- 5) Support the role of well-run pubs as solutions to alcohol misuse

Of the 662 election candidates who have signed up to support CAMRA's commitments, 264 are Liberal Democrats, 160 are Labour Party candidates, 80 are Conservatives, 122 are Green Party candidates and 36 are from other parties.

Cider Rips



Real cider is a long-established traditional drink which is produced naturally from apples and is neither carbonated or pasteurised. However real cider is in a similar situation to that which faced real ale some 30 years ago with the number of outlets for real cider is diminishing, even in the West Country. The situation with perry (which is made from pears) is even worse, as it is rarely available away from the farm gate. It is unfortunate that many of the most well known ciders in the UK are cold, fizzy keg products which have been produced artificially rather than naturally. It is well worth you tracking down some real ciders and perries and more and more people are discovering for themselves how deliciously mellow, aromatic and intoxicating the flavours of naturally produced real cider can be.

As a result of the difficulties facing real cider, CAMRA set up a cider and perry committee within CAMRA to inform consumers about the choice of real cider and perry available and to encourage the producers to continue production. Unlike real ale production, which can happen at any time of the year, real cider & perry can only be made when the fruit is ripe. Great skill goes into producing both products. Great store is placed by the Craft Brewer in the quality of ingredients and variety of flavours created by the malt, hops, yeast and water used to brew the beer.

It is a Producer rather than a Brewer that makes cider & perry. They may use a mixture of bitter-sweet and bittersharp cider apples or sweet dessert apples, or a mixture of the two to make cider; but perry can only be made from specialized perry pears, which are high in natural tannin.

The choosing, pressing and blending of the fruit to make cider is just as much of a craft as making beer and produces a vast range of tastes, styles and aromas, similar to those produced in fine wine. Like wine, each year's fruit produces a unique vintage, so much so that cider and perry have been sometimes called 'The Wine of the West'.

October is a very active time for producers, especially for those who make only a small amount of cider. Harvest time for cider fruit is roughly from September to November and by October production is in full flow.

CAMRA already have the month of May set aside as Mild Month and following on the success of the Mild campaign, CAMRA has now set October aside as Cider & Perry Month.

Real Cider and Perry, not the easiest thing to find in the Barnsley area, in fact if you can find any in any Barnsley pub, can you tell us.

Current Outlets: The Horseshoe, Wombwell is offering 2 Weston Ciders on draft.

The Joseph Bramah, Barnsley puts one on now and again.

The Silkstone Inn, Market Street, Barnsley offering Weston Cider.

The Courthouse Station, Regent Street, Barnsley has cider from a box, just ask.

The Anglers Rest, Park Street, Wombwell, a changing guest cider

But with all this political stuff going on how about this:

An increase in duty rates for cider of 10 percent above inflation, which would raise about 15 million pounds annually, will go ahead until June 30 but would then require further legislation to continue.

But will it go down!

H.B.Clarks

The new "Film Legend" Birthday beers continue with Marilyn Monroe for June is a golden ale, fresh and fruity with a lingering hop aftertaste at 4.2% abv.
 July brings on James Cagney at 4.4% abv, a light copper colour with a subtle aroma of hop and taste, a crisp mix of spice and fruit.
 Also new range of seasonal beers with "Rare Seasonal Birds" as the theme continues with Golden Oriole for the Summer. The 4% abv golden bitter has a peppery hop note and is soft, well balanced and easy to drink.
 Also watch out for the World Cup Beer, still to be announced.

Acorn Brewery

The brewery released two milds which were available during May.
 The first was Darkness at 4.2%, brewed with aromatic roast malts which gives it a deep red colour and Fuggles Hops that give a mild level of bitterness and aroma.
 The second was Lightness 3.6%, which was a light golden Pennine Mild brewed with Fuggle hops.
 It wont be too late to try both and see if you prefer the light or dark side!

Tetley's cask ale to Leeds drinkers has been branded as a "sick Joke" the Yorkshire Evening Post announced.

 Tony Jenkins, Vice Chair of Leeds CAMRA said: "Given that Carlsberg's recent announcement that they are moving production to Wolverhampton, I think it's rather ironic that they seem suddenly to be attempting to capitalise on the Tetley's heritage.
 It says the year 1822 on this poster which just emphasises that Carlsberg have decided to kill nearly 200 years of Leeds brewing tradition.
 At least they have recognised the resentment that the move will cause and are finally marketing their real ales; perhaps if they had done this sooner there would have been no need to close the brewery."

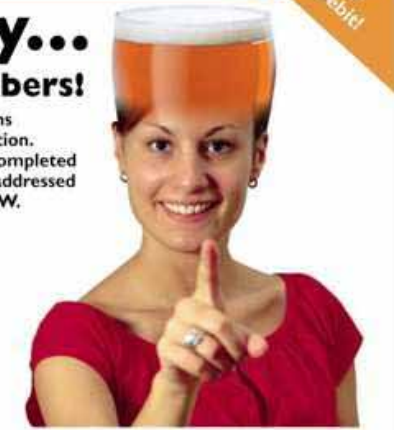

WHAT IS REAL ALE?

It's a name for draught (or bottled) beer brewed from traditional ingredients, matured by secondary fermentation in the container from which it is dispensed, and served without the use of extraneous carbon dioxide; also called 'cask-conditioned'.

Hannah At The Hob

Following on from the beer loaf recipe, I have been thinking about bread with summer food and looking forward to our own fresh tasty tomatoes. Tomatoes are always better if eaten at room temperature and lovely with cheese, ham, pickles and fresh bread.

In Britain, we don't really eat soup and stew in the summer but enjoy soup and stews abroad and we never lose our appetite for spicy curries, chillis and BBQs with garlic bread or nan bread.

Shrimps in cider sauce or fish soup

I was brought up near the coast and have happy memories of local, small, tasty brown shrimps. Sitting on the sand peeling and eating them or buying them to take home for my mother to make into that English classic, potted shrimps. Again sitting outside peeling them with my cat begging for the heads and wandering around with shrimp whiskers hanging out of her mouth. Now, shrimps seem to be under valued and we all refer to them as prawns irrespective of size. Local shrimps from local boats are more sustainable than those flown in from Thailand but use what you can find for this recipe. I also like tuna or swordfish steaks on a BBQ but that they are endangered and best avoided until stocks pick up. I suggest a British regional cider; they deserve and need our support.

I recommend cooking the raw prawns outside on a BBQ, it is fun and less smelly too. The sauce can be made in a small saucepan heated on the BBQ.

Raw prawns (on skewers if likely to fall through the bars)
50g 2oz butter
Splash of olive oil
4 fl oz 7tbs dry farm cider
Sea salt and pepper

Very hot BBQ, no smoke

Grill the prawns until cooked but not over cooked (2 mins approx)
Allow to cool enough to handle then peel them
Melt the butter & oil in the pan
When very hot add the cider and reduce the volume to taste
Add the warm prawns
Season
Serve with bread & salad. Drink the leftover cider, chilled

To make this into a summer soup or stew add some fish/chicken stock and chopped herbs such as parsley with chives or coriander leaf with pieces of chopped fresh red chilli. For a more extravagant dish cook scallops in the sauce and add pieces of grilled salmon.

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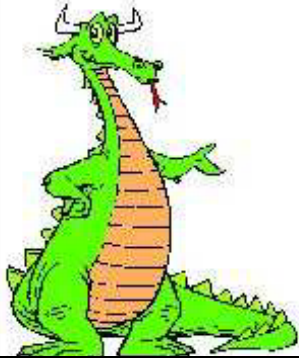

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Dear Man at the BAR

I was in a pub the other day and ordered a pint of Magnet. The beer was so cold I had to leave it standing for about 15 minutes before I could even start to drink it. My question is – What is the correct temperature to serve beer? And does it affect the beer?

Dear Frosty

The simple answer for temperature is cellar temperature, about 12°C "Cool not Cold".

For aroma and taste, chilling the beer is a complete disaster. If chilled below 5°C there will be hardly any aroma to the beer so your nose will be left with nothing to enjoy. Your tongue goes into numbness from the cold so flavours, good as well as bad go unnoticed down your throat. Not all the flavours are effected the same way and chilling changes the balance of the beer. The hop bitterness survives relatively well, whereas the fruit and complex malt flavours disappear without even a sniff.

If you have been taking note, you may now notice that this will let pale hoppy beers get away with being cooler than the rich, malty ales. It also makes the beer harder to digest, the stomach likes things at body temperature, the greater you are from this, the more difficult it is to process.

So, when you asked for your Magnet, and it came very cold, did you ask the staff why it's so cold? Most likely the response is 'that's the way people like it'. More accurate would perhaps be: that's the temperature we serve the lagers and that's less work for the landlord, and that's how he likes it.

The action plan?

Pubs Minister John Healey recently announced a 12 point action plan to give practical support to community pubs up and down the country, backed by £4 million in government funding.

Nearly 40 pubs are closing each week, resulting in job losses and millions of pounds lost to the economy. Mr Healey was tasked by the Prime Minister earlier this year to look at how government intervention can help community pubs, as businesses struggle in tough economic circumstances.

New help will include £3.3 million for business support to make pubs more successful and help communities buy into struggling pubs to keep them running. Business support is also in place for struggling membership clubs, we will be slashing "beer ties", and a consultation is underway on proposals to cut the requirement for music licences in certain venues.

Councils will also be given new powers through the planning system to intervene before a pub is demolished, giving a pause in the system for the local community to have their say. Restrictions on sales which prevent premises continuing as pubs will be also banned. The planning laws will allow pubs to branch out their business without planning permission into new commercial ventures, ranging from restaurants to gift shops and books shops, without the additional expense and time of seeking approval from the council.

The measures will give landlords the opportunity to have direct access to specialist, tailored business advice through 'Pub is the Hub', currently a voluntary support service for community pubs. Government funding of over £1 million will ensure that the group act as a specialist first-stop shop for advice on business support and diversification. Pub is the Hub will act as a gateway to advice, supporting pubs directly or passing them on to the most appropriate service such as Business Link.

Pubs Minister, John Healey said:

"This package of tough, practical measures aims to put some real support behind our community pubs, giving publicans more support to diversify and punters more choice. We need and can do more to support our pubs which can be at the heart of a local community."

"Today's measures are a much needed shot in the arm for publicans in these tough times. They will make it easier to diversify, lower costs and cut red tape when it comes to branching out. It is also a boost for local communities, giving them a greater stake in the future of their local pubs often so important in bringing people together."

"Pubs will receive specialist business support with a direct line through 'Pub Is the Hub' for a wide range of business advice and help that is readily available."

Government has thrown its weight behind the recent Business, Innovation and Skills Select Committee Report to relax the "beer ties" - the rules that require tenant landlords to buy beer supplies only from pub companies or "pubcos". This will mean that landlords can buy locally sourced guest ales as well as their usual stock, to increase the range of choice for customers and support the local economy. If the industry does not fulfil its promise, Government will legislate to open up the market.

The Government is also supporting proposals for councils in the Sustainable Communities Act that will stop large pub and retail companies from imposing 'restrictive covenants'. These can prevent the property continuing as a pub when it is sold. Proposals also include an independent review of the skills that are needed in the industry, including those in working men's clubs. This will identify where further help can be offered and ensure the long-term viability of the sector.

The Government will also carry out three independent studies of the sector to identify where further support can be offered and to ensure the long-term viability of pubs. The first will examine the ownership and management issues facing pubs, the second will review the skills that are needed in the pub industry and will be chaired by Chris Banks, Chairman of the Learning and Skills Council. Lord Bilsten will also examine the issues affecting not-for-profit clubs, such as working men's clubs.
