

PEBBLE PUPS

May's fieldtrip will be a re-run of last year's popular Sulphur River trip. The Sulphur River at the Ladonia

Fossil Park in Paris, TX has fossils, shark's teeth, geodes and arrowheads galore. Pray for a nice gully washer beforehand!

This trip requires climbing in and out of a fairly steep ravine. Be prepared for mud and boots with good tread are helpful. Bring sunscreen, hat, water, snacks and bug spray and a bucket to collect finds.

When: Saturday, May 19th meet either in the lobby of the Hampton Inn Paris, TX (3563 NE Loop 286, Paris, TX 75460) at 8:00 AM or at the Ladonia Fossil Park between 8:30 and 9:00 AM.

Directions to the Park: Take Hwy 82 west to Honey Grove and turn south on Hwy 34. Watch for signs on the right side of the road for the Ladonia Fossil Park and pull off to park. It is just before the bridge over the Sulfur River. This trip is dependent on weather. If the river is too high, we will not be able to go down. Please, stay in contact with us if you are unsure if the conditions are good. James Puls will be giving a talk prior to our descent into the river. .15 YEARS AGO MAY, 2003: Gem Faire has asked TRMS to provide display cases, working exhibits, tables of literature and grab bags and the wheel game for their June show. Members were asked to work 2 - 3 hours at a time. John Ravenscroft announced there would be a thank you card for members to sign to go to the Tulsa Geological Society for their generous donation to the scholarship fund. The membership voted and passed a proposal to build 10 display cases at \$150 each. Bob Shaha & Bob Hicks served as auctioneers for the annual club auction. The field trip was to collect selenite crystals near Jet, Oklahoma. An article was contributed by Chris Fite titled "Fire! Disease! Death!" <u>25 YEARS AGO MAY, 1993:</u> 45 were in attendance which included 4 visitors. A nice selection of door prizes were awarded, Scotty West continues to give a bola tie as a door prize at each meeting. The program was presented by TRMS member, Jack Hill who showed a video he had made of the 1992 show. The remaining mineral and gold & silver sections of the Proctor Collection video were presented. TRMS By-laws Committee April 03, 2018 Proposal for By-laws Changes

In accordance with the By-laws, this notice will be published twice in the TRMS Newsletter and voted on at the General Meeting following the second publication, which is anticipated to be the one in June or possibly July, 2018.

1) Family Group Definition:

Current By-laws:

Article I Membership 2.A.1 states "Adult Members shall be eighteen (18) years of age or older." Article II Dues 1.B defines a Family Group as "one or more adults residing at the same domicile and children in their full or partial custody at that residence".

The intent has always been to allow for no more than two adults and their children under 18 a reduced group rate.

Proposed Change:

A revision in II.1.B to "one or two adults 18 years of age or older residing at the same domicile and children under 18 in their full or partial custody at that residence" is proposed to clarify the intent.

2) Reconcile Article VII.3.B.3 to match changes approved on 03/12/2018 to Article VI.4 This proposal is being made to facilitate more flexibility in conducting the TRMS Annual Audit of the Treasurer Records. The date restriction on the Audit Report needs to be modified. Doing so allows an audit to be done during the last months of a year through the first month of the next year, and still keep the Audit Report to the members scheduled in a timely manner, If the audit is done during the last months of a current fiscal year, later transaction will be rolled over into the next fiscal year and included in its audit. Change Approved 03/12/2018

ARTICLE VI - BOARD MEETINGS AND OFFICER DUTIES

4. Annually, the Board of Directors will authorize an audit of the books and records, a summary report of which will be made to the members <u>prior to the third month of the fiscal year following the one audited, at a General Meeting</u>. The Board of Directors may appoint one or more members to perform the audit without charge, or may contract for the performance of the audit by an independent auditor, at its discretion.

Current By-laws:

Article VII.3.B. Appointees and Committees-Committees-Annual

3. Audit Committee may be appointed to audit the books and records, a summary report of which will be made to the members at the February regular meeting. Appointed by the Board of Directors in accordance with Article VI.4.

Proposed change:

Article VII.3.B. Appointees and Committees-Committees-Annual

3. Audit Committee may be appointed to audit the books and records, a summary report of which will be made to the members *prior to the third month of the fiscal year following the one audited, at a General Meeting.* Appointed by the Board of Directors in accordance with Article VI.4.

BEWARE THE BOLT FROM THE BLUE

There are thunderstorms around and lots of thunder and lightning, but the storms aren't over you, so relax and carry on. No problem? You'll just duck into the car when it gets to you.

Guess what, you may be about to die from lightning. The old phrase "A bolt from the blue" as conveying surprise didn't come from imagination. It came from real lightning strikes, but a bolt from the blue is misleading. Lightening NEVER comes from a clear blue sky. It is ALWAYS caused by thunderstorms, but the "from the blue" part may be true. Lightning can hit as far as 10 miles from a thunderstorm where the sky may indeed be blue.

So, take care to protect yourself whenever you can hear thunder. Sound travels about a mile per second. So, thunder from 10 miles away may seem unrelated to any lightening you see. In fact, you may not be able to see the lightning strike. When you can see a flash, start counting "one thousand one, one thousand two, one thousand three, etc.," until you hear the thunder. Divide that number of seconds by 5 and you'll know about how far away the storm is. I've been near two lightning strikes and it isn't fun.

During one storm, I was driving a tractor & raking an alfalfa patch. Suddenly my hair stood on end and electricity began sparking back and forth between the strands of a barbed wire fence 50 feet away. Guess who was the highest object around? I shut off the tractor and dived for the ground. I didn't reach the ground before lightening hit the fence about 100 feet away. There were no clouds overhead.

Another time, we were playing miniature golf when our hair stood up and sparks started flying around the wire on the lighting system. A huge cottonwood tree was in the middle of the course where we squatted under and ducked our heads. Lightening did strike then, but it hit a chimney and 2 power poles two blocks away. Three bolts! The thunder was deafening!

So, remember, you can indeed be hit by a bolt from the blue. If your hair starts standing up, you are in trouble and have little time. You have seconds at most to protect yourself. Do not be the highest object around. Squatting with your head down is considered by many as the safest position. But, stay well away from trees, power poles, chimneys, antennas, or anything else that stands tall. If you're in a boat, ball up with only your bottom touching the boat.

ROCKHOUNDS YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU!

There is no way, when your number comes up, that you can take your rock collection with you when you go to your heavenly reward.

It has to stay behind for your family to dispose of. What are they going to do? Most of them have no idea what the rocks are or what they are worth. As the old saying goes, they will probably throw out the baby with the bath water! They have no idea what is gem material and what is leaverite. It is up to YOU to make sure your collection is correctly identified.

PLEASE put labels or stickers on your rock, slices, faceting rough, minerals, fossils and silver. An uninformed person can't tell the difference between a piece a sodalite and a piece of lapis. Nor can they tell the difference between genuine, gem quality faceting rough and glass. To the novice, slices of jasper are just that – Jasper. They can't identify Bruno Jasper, Biggs Jasper, Rain Forest Jasper from the run-of-mill jaspers found in the local gravel pit.

When it comes to agate, well, that's a horse of a different color! Some agate is priceless because the area it was found in is no longer available for hunting. Minerals and Fossils are another major problem. If they don't have a label or a sticker to identify what they are and where they are from, the family will be at a loss to put a value on the specimens.

Other collectors, museums and dealers, will be hesitant about purchasing the collection if it is not properly identified.

So, Rockhounds, it is up to you, while you are still here on earth to properly identify your rocks, minerals, fossils, gemstones and jewelry. If specific pieces are to go to specific relatives or organizations, write it down. An inventory sheet with approximate dollar value would be helpful, too.

Don't put it off. Do it now while you are still here. Your family will thank you when the time comes.


