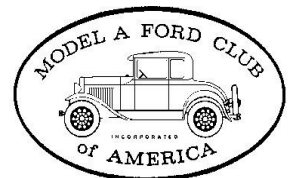

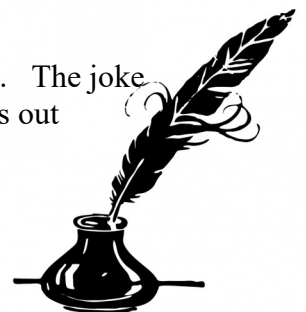

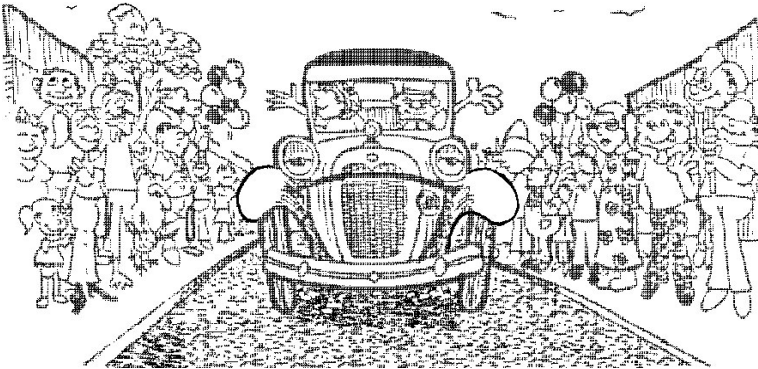
Orange County Overnight & Pancake Breakfast (Saturday, April 1st & Sunday, April 2nd)

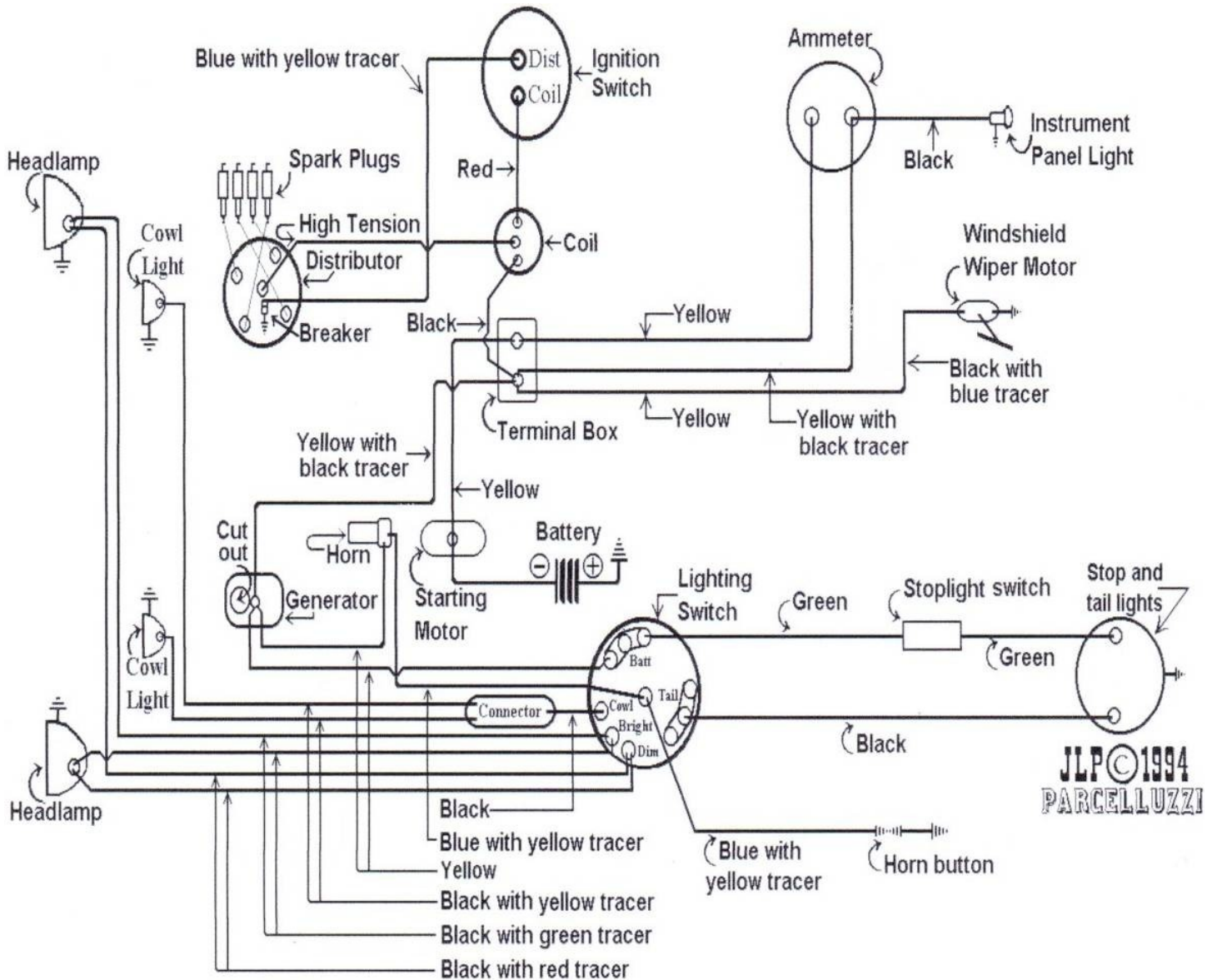

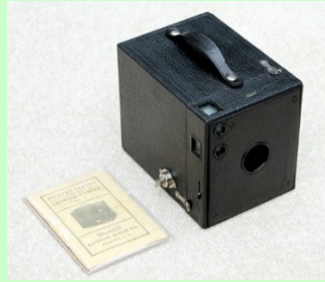

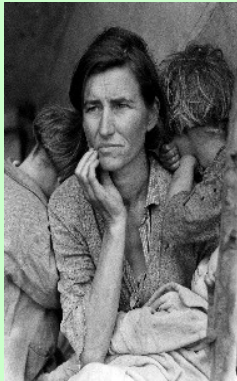

The way it used to be... Bill Corson



I met an interesting older gentleman on a recent visit to have my modern serviced. While in the customer lounge there was not much to do but contemplate how deeply the mechanic would get into my pocket book so we struck up a conversation regarding how modern technology has changed things from days past. I recall when the only thing I could afford to put into the crankcase of my old clunker cars was reclaimed oil, at the unheard of price of fifty cents a quart. Tires were always recapped but, since I did not travel far, or fast, they worked just fine. An alternate was, if sufficient rubber was left on an unrecapped tire the friendly neighborhood dealer would re-groove them by cutting in new tread pattern.

The fellow I was talking to passed along information that I had not heard of, or even considered, such as, if you wanted a really good shine on the vehicle's paint job, add a small amount of kerosene to the wash water. An original 1920's recipe for Irish Stew.

Cut 2 pounds beef in 1 1/2 inch cubes. Trim off excess fat. Place fat in spider, try out.*

Flour beef pieces and brown well in tried out fat.

Place in kettle with:
1 large onion, sliced
2 tsp salt
1/8 tsp pepper
8 cups cold water.

Simmer until meat is very tender when tried with a fork.

Add:
2 carrots, diced or sliced
4 potatoes, diced.

Cook until vegetables are done, about 10 minutes. Thicken with 4 Tablespoons flour blended with 4 tsp cold water. Bring to a boiling point and cook for two minutes..
Makes 4 good sized servings."

A few definitions for the cooking terms in this recipe! - Editor

To Try Out Fat: Cut the fat into bits, put it into a frying-pan, and let it cook slowly for several hours. When the fat is melted and nearly free from water, strain it, pressing to obtain all the fat.

Spider: A spider is a cast-iron skillet or frying pan. At one time, these had three metal legs enabling them to be set directly over the coals

Ford Model "A" Town Sedan Deluxe that could be a daily driver. It's a 98%-original survivor that comes with all the parts, including the original brakes (which were replaced with 1940 Ford hydraulics; a common swap). The hydraulic brakes only have 100 miles on them - the car has been driven locally, but not a lot. The ticker has 19,831 miles on it as of February 2017. Model A runs well, including electrical and gauges. The front-end has been rebuilt, so it drives in a straight line. The bodywork has been done but for the roof, which is partially rebuilt, and with all the wood in place. It has one or two small dings from "in-passing" garage moments, and one spot of surface rust. It's always been garaged. This Model A comes with a great pile of original documentation, including the original bill of sale, lots of original registration documents, manuals, and a few photos (with the negatives) of the original owner with the car in its home state of Massachusetts. What's it need? Mechanically, not much. It would probably be good to flush the fuel tank. The interior and roof need to be done, and the paint is old, and the tires are past their prime.
