Dinner for Nepal

Wednesday, June 10th

6:00 p.m.

The April 2015 Nepal earthquake (also known as the Gorkha earthquake) killed more than 8,000 people and injured more than 19,000. It occurred on April 25, with a magnitude of 7.8Mw or 8.1Ms and a maximum Mercalli Intensity of VIII (Severe). Its epicenter was the village of Barpak, Gorkha district, and its hypocenter was at a depth of approximately 15 km (9.3 mi). It was the worst natural disaster to strike Nepal since the 1934 Nepal–Bihar earthquake.

The earthquake triggered an avalanche on Mount Everest, killing at least 19, making it the deadliest day on the mountain in history. It triggered another huge avalanche in the Langtang valley, where 250 people were reported missing.

Hundreds of thousands of people were made homeless with entire villages flattened, across many districts of the country. Centuries-old buildings were destroyed at UNESCO World Heritage sites in the Kathmandu Valley, including some at the Kathmandu Durbar Square, the Patan Durbar Square, the Bhaktapur Durbar Square, the Changu Narayan Temple and the Swayambhunath Stupa.

A major aftershock occurred on May 12, 2015 with a moment magnitude (Mw) of 7.3. The epicenter was near the Chinese border between the capital of Kathmandu and Mt. Everest. More than 200 people were killed and more than 2,500 were injured by this aftershock.

Jennifer Thompson, who attended the Church of the Incarnation in 2007 before she moved to Helena, was in Nepal at the time of the initial earthquake and saw first-hand the devastation and destruction that occurred. Deeply touched by the experience, she will be hosting a Dinner for Nepal at our parish with the hope of educating people about the tragedy. Tickets are \$20 per person, with all funds going to continuing relief efforts in Nepal.



Saints for the Month of June

Saint Barnabas the Apostle, Saint John Baptist, and Saint Peter the Apostle

For the month of June we have three saints to celebrate. On June 11th we celebrate Saint Barnabas the Apostle. On June 24th we celebrate Saint John the Baptist. And on June 29th we celebrate Saint Peter the Apostle.

Saint Barnabas – St. Barnabas was a Levite from the country (island) of Cyprus whose name means “The son of consolation or son of encouragement”. He and St Paul successfully evangelized the “God-fearing” Gentiles who attended synagogues in various Hellenized (Greek) cities of Anatolia (modern day Turkey). St Barnabas is traditionally identified as the founder of the Cypriot Orthodox Church.

St. Barnabas’ Hellenic Jewish parents called him Joseph, but when he sold all his goods and gave the money to the apostles in Jerusalem, they gave him a new name: Barnabas. He was one of the first teachers of the church in Antioch. When St. Paul returned to Jerusalem (after his conversion), St. Barnabas took him and introduced him to the apostles, and declared unto them how he had seen the Lord on the way there, and that he had spoken to him, and how he had preached boldly in Damascus in the name of the Jesus (see Acts 9:27). St. Barnabas is the patron saint of Cyprus, Antioch, against hailstorms, and invoked as a peacemaker.

Saint John the Baptist – St. John the Baptist is sometimes referred to as the “Forerunner of Christ”, because he was born before Jesus Christ. He is also described in the Gospel of Luke as a relative of Jesus who led a movement of baptism at the Jordan River. Jesus was the one whose coming John foretold. And most notably, the one who recognized Jesus as the Messiah and baptized him. Additionally, John introduced Jesus to his disciples as the “Lamb of God” (see John 1:29-36).

St. John the Baptist’s parents were Zacharias and Elisabeth. Now, since Zacharias is described as a priest of the course of Abijah and his wife, Elizabeth, as one of the daughters of Aaron, this would make St. John the Baptist a descendant of Aaron on both his father’s and mother’s side. He was also a cousin of Jesus, a Nephew of Mary.

St. John the Baptist is the patron saint of Jordan, Puerto Rico, Knights Hospitaller of Jerusalem, French Canada, Newfoundland, Cesena, Florence, Malta, Genoa, and Monza, Italy; Porto, San Juan, Quiano

Church of the Black Nazarene, Turin, Xewkija-Gozo; Penzance, Cornwall; and the fraternal society of Free and Accepted Masons (better known as the Freemasons).

Saint Peter the Apostle – St. Peter also known as Simon Peter or Simon Cephas (the Syriac or Aramaic word for the “rock”) was a fisherman from the city of Bethsaida in the province of Galilee or Gaulanitis along with his brother Andrew who is also an apostle. He is venerated in several churches and is regarded as the Catholic Church’s first Pope. He is credited with establishing the church in Antioch and presiding for seven years as the leader of that city’s Christian community. He then went to Rome where in the second year of Claudius, it is claimed, he overthrew Simon Magus and held the Sacerdotal or Bishop’s Chair for 25 years.

The Gospel of Mark was traditionally thought to show the influence of St. Peter’s preaching and eyewitness memories. He was with Jesus during events witnessed by only a few apostles, such as the Transfiguration. St. Peter confessed Jesus as the Messiah, was part of Jesus’ inner circle, walked on water (but begin to sink when his faith wavered); denied Jesus three times, was restored by Jesus, and preached on the day of Pentecost.

Jesus called Peter and his brother Andrew to become “fishers of men”. St. Peter appears to be a spokesman for the apostles at several events; for example, he conducted the election of St. Matthias as a replacement apostle for Judas Iscariot, and his opinion in the debate over converting the Gentiles was crucial, etc.

St. Peter is quite often depicted as literally the keeper of the gates of heaven. He is the patron saint for various workers, prayers for aid or healing, institutions, churches and cathedrals, and numerous locations.



FISH Data for April 2015


The chart below is a comparison of those serviced by FISH between April 2014 and April 2015. As you can see there was a significant decrease in demand in 2015 compared to 2014. There was a decrease in the number of families, adults, children, meals served, and pounds of food delivered; we were down 4.7%, 5.1%, 8.2%, 6.0%, and 0.6% respectively. There was an increase in the number of singles served (18.5%). And for the year-to-date (YTD) numbers there was a decrease in the number of families, adults, children, and meals served; we were down; 5.9%, 1.6%, 19.7%, and 7.8% respectively.

And there was an increase in the number of singles and pounds of food delivered; we were up 1.6% and 1.3% respectively. However, FISH still provided about 4.3 tons of emergency food to our community during the month of April 2015 and 17.1 tons for the months of January through April 2015 (that's 4.3 tons per month).
