### RECTOR'S RAMBLINGS

*I recently came across an amazing Lenten meditation, written by Malcolm Boyd (who is an author and an Episcopal priest):*

The waste and agony of dying are all around us. Death has come to mean an impersonal body count. Horror stories fill TV screens and usurp press headlines. How can we simply go on as if this kind of tragedy were absent? There is also the aspect of danger for all of us. What if someone deranged decides to shoot innocent people in a movie theater? Or open fire in a school building? If we can't count on responsible behavior by so-called responsible people, what exactly can we count on?

The Nazi experience remains recent history. Holocaust victims still live among us. We are numbed by the shocking repetition of tales of horror. But instead of such incidents taking place only in distant places, now they seem to occur two blocks away or on the other side of town or on this side. Right here.

Our future: Is it written in guns and nuclear overkill? In the utter tragedy of rape? In racism that lingers and just won't go away? The season of Lent offers an opportunity to look inward toward conscience and outward to the human suffering that makes life a living hell for some people.

In Lent we have a chance to permit the liberation of people and living things. But sometimes we don't seem to permit even our own liberation, let alone that of others. Yet I want to celebrate life! Blood flows through my veins. Rain falls. Water surges through the earth. I know the sun is up there even when it's hidden by clouds. I know the air stirs even when the wind is still. A leaf trembles on that tree. I see yellows, reds, blues, greens, black and white. I have so many feelings and I don't quite know what to do with them, Lord. Can I tell you? Will you understand me?.

I feel like singing, looking, biting, laughing, crying, tasting, painting, walking, dancing, running, being.

Being human. Being alive. Being loving.



## FAMILY PROMISE COMING SOON

Printed below are details about Family Promise. Volunteers, food, and other necessities are listed, and members of our congregation are asked to prayerfully consider what you may be able to contribute for this much needed service to our community.

**TIME IS RUNNING SHORT AS INCARNATION WILL HOST ITS FIRST FAMILIES THE WEEK OF MARCH 22-29TH!** Much needs to be done before then. After a walk-through of the rooms which will be available to our guests, it is apparent that a clean up and reorganization is in order. Geraldine is looking for volunteers to pick a morning and make an effort to create spaces that will look like home to our guests. Our dumpster will probably get a work out!

### FAMILY PROMISE DETAILS

1. Incarnation is scheduled to host families the week of March 22-29th; that is a Sunday evening through the following Saturday evening. We will be a host church 4 times a year.
2. Incarnation is supported in our endeavors by members of Union Bethel Church and the Friends Quaker Church. Neither of our denominations has an abundance of membership, and the individuals required to support this ministry is significant.
3. Our guests arrive at our church for the first time Sunday at 5 p.m.
4. We can expect the maximum number of individuals which is 14 people.
5. Each night of the week we are expected to serve a meal at 6 p.m. for our guests. Two hosts are required for this activity.
6. A Family Promise team of volunteers will have prepared 4 individual rooms for our guests downstairs. Preparations include individual beds, table lamps, alarm clocks, clean bedding, and two extra beds for the volunteer overnight supervisors. The beds will be transported to our church by a van provided by the administration of Family Promise. We have asked that the beds be delivered after our service Sunday so we can prepare the rooms well in advance.
7. Here is a list of the support required to handle our commitment to the individuals of Family Promise:
  - a. People to prepare meals. These can be made in advance. We are responsible for all 3 meals. Breakfast can consist simply of cereals, bread, milk etc. Both dinner and breakfast will be served at Incarnation. Lunch can consist of dinner left overs and will be transferred to the HUB (Central Christian Church, 1019 Central Ave.) which hosts the families during the day. Remember the number 14 plus enough for the two supervisors.
  - b. Two Evening volunteers: 5-8:30 p.m. Serve dinner and support guests. Make the initial orientations to the building.

- c. Two Overnight volunteers: 8:30 p.m.-7 a.m. Van returns to the church at 7 to transport individuals to the HUB where there are shower facilities. Children will be bused from that location to their respective schools.
  - d. Breakfast volunteers if different from Overnight: 6-7:30 a.m. 1-2 individuals. Supervise breakfast and the transition of guests to their day time activities.
8. Staff the HUB on the weekend: Saturday from 9-5, Sunday from 7-5. Individual shifts can be set up to cover these time periods.
9. Here is the list of items we still need:
- a. 5 more sets of twin bedding
  - b. 7 more washable blankets
  - c. 32 wash cloths and hand towels. (Allows time to wash these when participants change during the week.) Bath towels are not necessary. It does not matter if these are matching sets. Just looking for items in good shape.
  - d. 4 laundry drying racks for each room where families can hang their wash cloths and hand towels.

We encourage you to think about what you can contribute to families who find themselves in difficult circumstances. As a representative of Incarnation I am pleased that our church will be able to physically house guests and become useful spaces. I look forward to partnering with our sister churches in this endeavor as we fulfill "A Promise to Families."

## Holy Day

### The Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary

We celebrate the Annunciation of the Blessed Virgin Mary on March 25<sup>th</sup>. This is the Christian celebration of the announcement by the angel Gabriel to the Virgin Mary that she would conceive and become the mother of Jesus, the Son of God, marking his Incarnation. The Annunciation is called Euangelismos (Evangelism) in Greek, literally meaning, "Spreading the Good News". Incarnation means, "The union of God and man in the person of Christ".

The angel Gabriel came in unto Mary and said, "Hail, thou that art highly favoured, the Lord is with thee: blessed art thou among women". And when she saw him, she was troubled at his saying, and cast in her mind what manner of salutation this should be. And the angel said unto her, "Fear not, Mary: for thou hast found favour with God. And behold, thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a son, and shalt call his name JESUS." He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest: and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David. And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end.

Then said Mary unto the angel, "How shall this be, seeing I know not a man?" And the angel answered and said unto her, "The Holy Ghost (some of us refer to the Holy Ghost as the Holy Spirit) shall come unto thee, and the power of the Highest shall overshadow thee: therefore also that holy thing which shall be born of thee shall be called the Son of God. And behold, thy cousin Elizabeth, she hath also conceived a son in her old age: and this is the sixth month with her, who was called barren. For with God nothing shall be impossible". And Mary said, "Behold the handmaid of the Lord; be it unto me according to thy word." And the angel departed from her.

## News from the Memorial Foundation

The Trustees of the Memorial Foundation held its quarterly meeting on Feb. 12, 2015. Out-going President, Gregg Holt, conducted the meeting.

Heartfelt thanks were offered to Gregg for his many years of service to the Memorial Foundation and the Church. A warm welcome was extended to newly elected members Ann Bartell and Neil Swift, and thanks given to Chuck Jennings and Ted Cogswell for their willingness to serve another term on the Foundation.

Treasurer, Ardelle Watkins, announced the Memorial Foundation received a very generous donation from former parishioners, Gene and Caroline Hufford. It was agreed to use this money to pay for repairs to the Church's boilers/heating system.

The Foundation issued a check to the Church for \$25,475.10 to pay the 2014 Diocesan Assessment through November 2014. Ardelle stated the 2015 annual distribution from the Foundation's Endowment Fund to the Church will be \$10,125.57, and is available anytime the Vestry requests it.

The following individuals were elected to serve as officers of the Memorial Foundation for 2015: President: Wayne Linnell; Vice President: Mary Ann Cosgrove; Secretary: Gayle Gallik Archey; and Treasurer: Ardelle Watkins.

Sr. Warden, Richard Pate, gave a recap of his goals for 2015 as Sr. Warden and also the Church maintenance projects for the coming year. Several members of the Foundation offered to attend the next Vestry meeting to suggest a joint meeting be scheduled with the Vestry to discuss ways to move forward as a group for the betterment of our Church. The Foundation's next quarterly meeting will be held in May.




Dear Home-Aloners,

**FISH Data for January 2015**

The chart below is a comparison of those serviced by FISH between January 2014 and January 2015. As you can see there have been some changes between the 2014 and 2015 figures. There was a decrease in the number of families, adults, children, singles, meals served, and pounds of food delivered; we were down 14.0%, 7.3%, 17.4%, 11.6%, 11.0%, and 12.7% respectively. For the year-to-date (YTD) numbers there was also a decrease in the number of families, adults, children, singles, meals served, and pounds of food delivered; we were up; 14.0%, 7.3%, 17.4%, 11.6%, 11.0%, and 12.7% respectively. However, FISH still provided about 5.2 tons of emergency food to our community during the month of January 2015.

## Clothing Closet



We've had a busy month processing clothes: taking in the generous donations, sorting and laundering, storing what we cannot use immediately, and getting good clothes out onto the racks and shelves for the hundreds of people who come in each month. Despite the weather, our traffic has been steady and we've encouraged folks to take plenty so we won't have so much to swap out for the lighter, brighter Spring and Summer Closet. Our plan is to have the Spring/Summer clothing on the racks mid-March, two or three weeks before Easter. Optimistically, we'd be ready by Thursday, March 12. Realistically, by Thursday, March 19.

We're hoping to go through all the stock (a huge endeavor!) and be practical about what we're keeping and offering to folks shopping with us. Our thinking is that if we wouldn't wear an item ourselves or put it on our children and grandchildren, it's not good enough to offer people in need.

We had an "awakening" this month when we ran out of hangers. Nearly panicked, we calmed down when we realized we had nowhere to hang more of anything! That's the beauty of our place. It's just the right size and when we're out of room, that's that. We've learned that there are places we can "move" the raggedy, worn-out items we're given. We've learned that there's a market for bulk transport of clothing to Seattle and from there to China by container shipment. China has the man/woman power to take apart the fibers and

to recycle them into "new" products. Our "rags" don't make up much of that shipment, even so it's far better to recycle than sending them to our landfill where they take space while they slowly decompose.

At the Annual Meeting, we were encouraged by the Memorial Foundation to request funding for a washer/dryer, a supportive purchase for this mission. It's not as easy as one might think! We've decided on a good location for a laundry facility, and have drawn a plan for City Planning. Now we need to seek bids for both plumbers and electricians, and finally seek permission from the Vestry; not a simple project. We would also be able to use this facility for laundry services needed for our share of Family Promise. It's been suggested that we make an hour available (9:00 – 10:00) for our Family Promise guests to shop The Closet before we open at 10:00 on the Saturdays they are with us. This is a great idea and would be another excellent service we could provide.

Our thoughts continue to be with Jenny as she rehabilitates her leg. This has been a difficult process for her because she has given her best to The Closet for eight years and suddenly she was able to give no more. Not a week goes by when she isn't remembered by both the members of the church and outside volunteers who miss her big smile and the nurturing way she's guided and built up the staff and clientele of The Closet. She has a good following on Facebook and consistently brings new people to this ministry. Thank you, Jenny.
