Being with all of you each Sunday, with the beauty of the sanctuary, the excitement of the children, to hear the gospel story, sing our favorite carols, share our joys and concerns, and visit with each other during the coffee hour after the service.

I have a Christmas CD by Evie, *Christmas Memories*, that has a

song about a little shepherd boy in a manger creche on the mantle. In the bustle of decorating the house, he got moved further from the manger and the child, and he sings "Move me closer, move me closer, move me closer to the child. Let me see Him, let me take his hand, move me closer to the child." This is Christmas to me, a chance to get closer to Jesus, to his birth, his youth, his teaching, his love and forgiveness. I hope we can all move 'closer' to the child this season and see what he has done for us and can do for us in the coming year.

Pastor's Corner

Are you ready for Christmas?

Every year, just before Christmas, it seems I am asked that question. It's a loaded question, but I know what it means. Have you finished your gift shopping? Has everyone in your list been checked off? Have you gotten all the Christmas bins out of the rafters and decorated your Christmas tree and put lights outside (in a perfect world that would be done the day after Thanksgiving)? Have you finished baking the pies and cookies for Christmas day? Have you sent out Christmas cards? And as a pastor, there's more: have you planned out the entire Advent season including the Christmas Eve service?

If you are like me, something always has to give. Cards weren't sent out, or decorations weren't put up outside, or gifts were bought late on Christmas Eve. It's a rush

to do it all. Either it is the thrill of victory that everything was accomplished, or the agony of defeat for the perfectionist that sees that once again I could not do it all.

Are you ready for Christmas? There is still time.

We are still in the season of Advent... of the coming... of the Lord Jesus Christ. When Jesus came, when he was born, Mary and Joseph weren't ready, either. They had nine months to prepare, but they weren't ready! The still took the trip from Nazareth to Bethlehem at the last moment, very difficult for a woman ready to give birth any day. They hadn't made reservations at the inn or made plans to stay with a relative. And they certainly weren't prepared for what it meant that Mary's child Jesus would be "*great and will be called the Son of the Most High. The Lord God will give him the throne of his father David, 33 and he will reign over Jacob's descendants forever; his kingdom will never end*" (Luke 1:32-33).

So while I think we all enjoy all the sights and sounds of Christmas, the desserts, singing Christmas carols, and seeing the joy of children as they open gifts, we all recognize the only really important thing is that Jesus, the Son of God, came to hu-

mankind. He came humbly, born in a manger, the servant-king come to save us. And he will come again. That is the reason that we are celebrating.

Knowing that, we can prepare spiritually for Christmas Day, celebrating the birth of Christ and all that means for us who call ourselves Christians. We can open our Bibles and read Isaiah 7:14, the beginning of the gospels of Matthew and Luke, we can read a devotion (we have devotional booklets in the sanctuary foyer), light a candle (perhaps from an Advent wreath!), and pray, thanking God for His love, his mercy, and His Son. Don't worry, it's not adding on a new thing to your already busy schedule. It is because of these practices that we are given joy and peace and are able to truly enjoy the season, for we are not focusing on the commercialism of the holiday. It is a reminder of who Christmas is all about – Jesus Christ, the Son of God, who was, and is, and shall be forevermore.

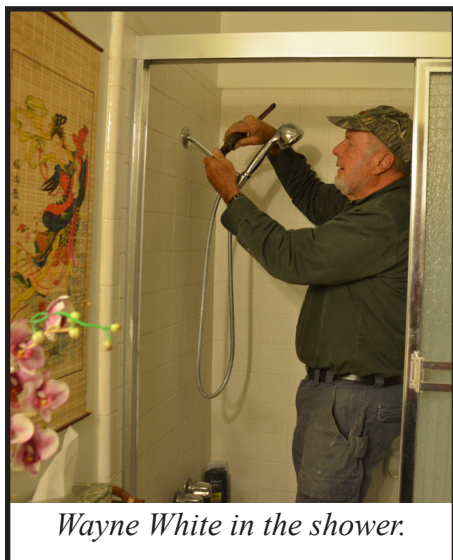
Special date for Clothes Closet for fall
