National Coin Passed



This is who we are and what we do. I received a call from Commander Persson about a request he received for assistance from a veteran's widow. Her husband had passed away in November of 2017 and she was not able to have him cremated due to lack of funds. You can imagine the burden this placed on her shoulders. She is very proud of her husband's military service and could not ensure his final needs and Military Honors would be taken care of.


Thanks to a records search, we were able to find all of his DD 214s and NGB 22s to establish his service. He served 4 years in the Navy and was a Vietnam

Veteran. His tour of duty was aboard the USS Topeka, the ship served as the flagship for the commander, Cruiser Destroyer Group, 7th fleet. In that capacity, the ship operated in the South China Sea and the Gulf of Tonkin providing naval gunfire for the troops ashore and supporting Carrier Air Operations by conducting search and rescue missions for downed air crews. He also served 17 years in the Army Guard and was awarded the Southwest Asia Medal with 2 bronze stars and the Kuwait Liberation Medal.

Trish Peoples, Quartermaster VFW, agreed to partner in this endeavor and the

"Memories of the uniform go back as far as I can remember." said Rene Merryfield, daughter of Jim Merryfield, USAF retired

"I grew up as an Air Force brat. That is one of my favorite memories and I couldn't imagine my life any other way, Moving every 4 (ish) years, from Las Vegas to North Dakota, California and my most favorite Panama to Nebraska and then to Illinois." told Rene M. She went on to say, "while in Illinois my dad was deployed to Saudi Arabia. We didn't have emails or Skype back then, not that it was that long ago, but we wrote lots of let-

That summer my dad was gone, my mom had an idea to drive to California for a vacation to visit family. It was lots of fun with some interesting events along the way.

I remember we were going in between relative houses and mom told all of us to be quiet as she turned the volume up on the radio. As she listened she heard the news of a

bombing at Khobar Towers in Saudi Arabia!

She was upset and she tried to keep us calm. As we pulled up to my grandmothers house (who was listed as the emergency contact) she came running out of her house to tell us the Air Force had called.

"We were all scared that the worst news ever to be received had just happened." said Rene M. "My mom called and they were just informing her that they have no news and were unsure at the time if he was alive or dead!" I remember laying the hallway at my grandmas house crying for my dad. I thought we would never hear from him again. "I was so scared that I would not get to hug him, have him tuck us in bed or help with the homework. We all slept in my mom's room that night." she told. "I remember laying on the floor by her bed and the phone rang in the middle of the night, it was my DAD! He was hurt but not life threatening.

"Being a military brat was awesome. It is a lifestyle, and kids adapt well." said Rene M. Military men and women have it hard Leaving families, missing the birth of a child or missing the funeral of a loved one because they are deployed. But the wives still run the household, get the kids to school and work doing this on their own now because their loved ones are protecting our freedom is just as hard.

Jim Merryfield's middle daughter, pictured left, remembers how everyone pulled togeth-

er and that we tried to keep everything as normal as possible. "We kept Dad in our normal as possible. "We kept Dad in our daily prayers!" said Rhonda Rasgorshek.
She went on to say everyone did their part

to help out, do errands and keep our spirits

From a spouse's point of view, Radcliffe, spouse to retired SSGT USAF, Chuck Radcliffe, states. "When you are a milchuck Radellie, states. When you are a fill-itary spouse, you are part of the military fam-ily as a whole. I, myself always found that comforting." She went on to say, "I never minded moving to a new base, setting up a new house - even if it were base housing! There was a sense of security there. My children adapted well to whatever our surround-

Radcliffe admitted that if she had to do it over again, she would. She smiled and said, "There is just something about a man in uniform!'

Experiencing the military through a child's eyes, as a veteran in my own right, and as a spouse of a veteran, the awe in all three positions is still there.

'I remember going to work with my dad at the paint shop in the M and M hangar at Edwards AFB, California when I was a young girl, " said Penny Merryfield. Dad would let me watch as they prepared a plane for repainting.

'When l was younger my dad Robert Kittrell was sent Johnson AFB, Japan The move the plane ride getting there and the culture of Japan will stay with me all my life. While being a child

raised in the military broadens your horizons, it still doesn't prepare your for the heartache that sometimes comes from being in a military family.

Dad went to Viet Nam when I was a teenager. It was a hard year. When dad came home, he was different. War had changed him. This would be the case for so many soldiers when returning from war.

All of these was a preparation for me, when my husband, Jim was injured in Saudi Arabia. The knowing he was hurt, and yes we have to be mom and dad sometimes, played the role to keep the home fires burning and

Waiting for the return to home and to us! To all the dependents of military veterans, they thank us for being here for them.

Legionnaire Submission: Communication

This article is the second in a series of articles about the American Legion's Strategic Plan.

The second strategy outlined in The American Legion's Five-Year Membership Plan is regarding communication. Your post should have some form of a media relations team. It might be as small as one person who has the responsibility to contact your local newspaper or a full committee with many responsibilities. In any case, this person or group of people have a major responsibility. They tell our story to the public. What they communicate to the public can have a great effect on turnouts for your events.

One way to keep people informed of the activities in your post is by newsletter. Many posts have some type of newsletter. It's a very effective way to keep your membership informed of your activities. It will reach those members who don't hang out at the club or come to meetings. They can pick and choose the events they would like to be a part of. Not every member has to be involved in every project. Encourage inactive members to choose one or two activities a year that they are interested in and ask them to help.

The American Legion has many resources for your media relations committee to use for holidays and programs such as Veterans Day, Memorial Day, and Boys State. There are radio, newspaper, and video Public Service Announcements (PSAs) available online as well as an extensive Public Relations Toolkit that is available for download or printout. If getting information off the internet isn't your style, call The American Legion office in Indianapolis and they can help you find these resources in print.

Develop a relationship with your local media outlets. Many radio stations run PSAs for free or reduced price. Some newspapers have a "What's happening around town" type of section where they advertise local events for free. If your post puts out a newsletter you can ask local cafes and restaurants to make it available as reading material.

Another way to reach people is through social media; such as Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram. Find a tech-savvy member to make a Facebook page or website for your post. Be sure to keep the information up-to-date. Using social media can attract a younger crowd and keep them informed of your activities.

Communication is a very important part of your post. It has the power to keep members informed and continuing to renew their dues. It can also inform the community of your presence and encourage new people eligible for membership to check out your post.

Security policy locally.

Programs such as working with your local Law enforcement agency to establish a Youth cadet Law Enforcement program, to providing first aide / CPR classes at your posts. Those are just a few examples. But for this article, I will focus on The American Legion Blood Donor Program, since January is National Blood Drive Month, and this can be as simple as arranging for Post members to participate in a local blood drive, or even hosting one at your Posts.

People have held blood drives and given blood since community service became an American value. It's only natural that The American Legion - with community service as one of its pillars - be heavily involved in blood donation efforts.

The American Legion Blood Donor Program has existed officially since 1942 to help that cause. Each year - especially since 9/11 - Legionnaires have donated in spades, and departments have coordinated efforts at the post level. The Blood Donor Program honors those departments that best participate in blood-donation efforts, recognizing departments in two

areas: for post participation and individual Legionnaire participation. Post participation awards are given to departments with the highest number of participating posts. Individual participation awards are given to departments with the highest percentage of individuals giving blood to the program.

Legionnaires participate by giving blood and reporting it to their posts, which mark the donation on their annual **Consoli**dated Posts Reports. Similarly, posts that host blood drives mark their participation on their **Con**solidated Post Reports, listing number of drives held and total pints donated (for Legionnaires and non-Legionnaires).

The departments that have the highest turnout for Legionnaires and post participation are honored at the Legion's national convention. The national security chairman announces the winners in front of the convention floor. Certificates are then signed by the national commander and national adjutant and mailed to the winning departments.





idge Johnson loves the American flag. It's not the flag she grew up under, but it's the one that, for decades, has stirred her patriotism and often moved her to tears.

Johnson and her take husband

and often moved her to tears.
Johnson and her late husband,
Lee Critchfield, immigrated to
the United States from Canada
in the 1950s. Critchfield become
an American citizen in the 1960s;
Johnson waited 20 years longer.
"It just took me longer," she
sald. "I still wanted to be a Canadian, but I also wanted to be an

dian, but I also wanted to be an

American,"
Against her family's wishes,
Johnson became a citizen of the
United States on April 6, 1982.
Becoming a U.S. citizen is an
arduous process, she said.

"We had to register at the post

office every year, giving our name, address, where we worked, name, address, where we worked, our children, and the fact that we were going to school, or where we were working," she said. "We had to do that for five years."

They also had to pass a rigor-

ous citizenship test.

During a ceremony, the judge who conferred her citizenship told Johnson and the other new citizens to look at the American

flag.
"As we looked at the beautiful "As we looked at the beautiful American flag flying, he said, "You now need to remember that you are an American and you have no allegiance to the country you came from," she recalled.

She took that to heart, and has remembered it every day since

remembered It every day since.
"Every time the Pledge of Alle-

giance is said, I get teary-eyed. I can't sing the Star Spangled Banner without getting teary-eyed," she said.

It pains Johnson to see a flag It pains sonison to see a mag that's torn, tattered or dirty. Some time ago, she decided to do something about it: She began politely asking the owners of torn flags if they would take them down and consider replacing them.

After doing that for a while After doing that for a while, Johnson thought she should make sure she was doing the right thing, and doing it properly. So she paid a visit to Jerry Clark, commander of the American Legion Hughes-Pittinger Post 26 in Powell, and asked him if what she was doing was Office.

was doing was OK.
"I said, 'You bet,'" Clark
recalled. "That's called Americanism, and we support that 100
percent. Flag education ... is part

of it. Americanism is one of the pillars that we live by." He gave Johnson his blessing. Clark also invited her to tell people that they could buy flags through the American Legion. Because of the volume of flags the American Legion obtains, the local post is able to obtain them at a lower cost, he said.

Later, Clark decided to make Johnson's avocation official. With

the approval of post members, he gave her the title of Flag Lady for the American Legion Hughes-Pittinger post. Since then, Johnson has re-doubled her efforts. She met

not have an American flag on display, asking them if they would be interested in flying a flag. The vast majority quickly agreed, she

said.
Some no longer had flags, because they had been taken by previous owners or managers. So Johnson helped them obtain flags, poles and brackets when needed. She's also provided flags to individuals who expressed an interest in buying them.
"I'll bet it's been more than 50 flags she's sold," Clark said.

Other business owners managers thought they were only supposed to fly flags on patriotic holidays. Johnson said she in-formed them it's always appro-priate to show their patriotism by flying a flag.

Johnson has been so success

ful in encouraging people to fly their flags and increasing flag awareness that Clark presented her with an award during a post meeting late last year.
