

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Dear Rumple Family,

It seems hard to believe that it is almost November. 2019 seems to have flown by. The other day, I was looking through the pictures saved in our enewsletter program. It was a great way to look back over the past year of ministry at Rumple- and I was amazed. What a wonderful year of mission and ministry it has already been- from the Epiphany service to Rise Against Hunger, from beautiful Easter worship and music to the Puerto Rico Mission Team, from welcoming the cast of From the Mountaintop, to the bluegrass music and picnic on Grandfather Sunday, from Habitat work days to Food for Families, from the Visiting Scholar to the recent Alzheimer's workshop, from Music and Mission camp to Wednesday afternoon programs for children. The list could go on and on. All this has happened as we continue to welcome new members, have more and more folks offer to serve in many areas of church life, and find our church financials as healthy as they have been in many, many years. There is a lot to celebrate as we continue to make an impact in the name of Jesus Christ in the High Country and beyond. We head into this final month of the church year - advent begins on December 1 - with so much to be thankful for here at Rumple and so much to look forward to.

One particular thing I am looking forward to is the installation of a retractable screen and a projector in the sanctuary. (This is happening while I write this article, actually. This project, approved by the Worship Committee and Session, was made possible by both a special gift and by increased giving to Rumple in 2019. This new equipment will enable us to easily project images and slide shows (no more people walking out carrying a large white board while someone is maneuvering a cart in the center aisle,) share congregational meeting information through images, and make our sanctuary more versatile for bible school, presbytery meetings, youth events, and more. Extreme care was taken to preserve the integrity of the beautiful Rumple sanctuary. I look forward to the opportunities this new equipment will enable just as expanded wifi, a new phone system, and the updated sound system have done for us already.

Another huge area of ministry that I am excited about is the work of the Implementation Team. The team met for the first time in mid-October. This group of 11 folks (plus me) will continue to work with the Vision Team's Report that was adopted by the session early in the summer and has been shared widely with the congregation. As the Implementation Team prioritizes the "big dreams" in the plan, they are going to need your help! In order to put these big dreams in place we will need the continued guidance of God's Holy Spirit and the willing and able hands and hearts of many Rumple members, affiliates, and friends. I hope when you are called upon to help, you will respond positively. If you have questions about the process, please feel free to speak to Jim Crowell and Maurice Ewing who are heading up this process for Rumple.

In this month of November our focus is often on gratitude. I know I am very grateful for this Rumple family and for all that I believe God is doing in and among us. I continue to be very grateful to be your pastor.

As the days grow shorter and the nights grow cooler, the pews at Rumple grow a bit more empty. I know many of you have already returned to warmer climates and we, who remain in Blowing Rock all year, do miss you and look forward to your return in the spring and summer.

Molly Ijames is a native of Flint, Michigan, and holds a B.S. in Music Education from Bob Jones University. Her love for sacred music began as a church pianist in her teenage years, and now as an adult, her ministry as an accompanist expands to church and community choirs, Christian camps, schools, and local congregations. She spent seven years working for Sound Forth Publishing, as her compositions blossomed into mainstream publication. She is widely recognized for her sacred compositions and arrangements in various catalogs with over 200 choral anthems, several seasonal cantatas, multiple piano solo and duet collections, keyboard magazines, and instrumental ensemble pieces in publication. She is frequently called upon to teach at

Tax Planning While Helping the Mission of Rumple Church

Recent tax legislation has impacted the treatment of some individual's charitable contributions. Regardless of whether or not you have been impacted, there are still ways to reap tax benefits while helping the mission of the church. Please remember what follows is a general discussion. How these rules apply to your specific situation should be discussed with your tax advisor.

Oualified Charitable Deduction (OCD) from an IRA

If you are 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ or older you must take a required minimum distribution (RMD) from your IRA. Under current tax law you can distribute your annual RMD directly to a 501(c)(3) public charity (Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church) enabling you to avoid paying income taxes on the amount you contribute (Up to \$100,000). For many individuals, under the current tax provisions, this can result in lower reportable income and as a result lower taxes than if a payment is made directly to Rumple from other savings. The group that administers your IRA can provide the paperwork necessary to make a direct payment from your IRA to Rumple.

Gifting Appreciated Stock

If you have appreciated security holdings in a personal account, selling these shares will normally result in income that you must report on your tax return. If you gift these shares directly to Rumple, you are allowed a charitable tax deduction equal to the full value of the shares gifted but are not required to re-port any income associated with the shares' appreciation on your tax return. This approach may result in better tax consequences than if the shares are sold and then a cash contribution is made to Rumple.

If you wish to make a gift or meet your pledge with stock, mutual funds, or other tradable assets, please use the following procedures:

Inform the Rumple office manager[rumplechurch393@gmail.com] with your name & email, the name of the asset, the broker transmitting it, and expected delivery date. Provide your investment representative with the following information: Receiving brokerage name – First Citizens Bank Account # - 4KV174445 DTC # - 0443

You will be notified when the securities have been received in the RMPC brokerage account and the amount received after the securities have been sold.

The Missions Committee is dividing into four new subgroups as a new means of managing the growing number of ways Rumple serves:



Hymn for NOVEMBER by Dave McCollum

Certainly not for fame or glory, the work of a hymn writer, whether text or tune, is more often a labor of love than a quest for glory. This was the case for hymn text writer Isaac Watts. "Watts's ambition, according to his own words, was as follows: 'My design was not to exalt myself to the rank and glory of poets, but I was ambitious to be a servant to the churches, and a helper to the joy of the meanest Christian."

What Watts lacked in worldly attributes, he was frail in health and grotesque in appearance, described as five feet tall with a big head and a long-hooked nose, he made up for in many different scholarly fields. His writings included essays, discussions of psychology, three volumes of sermons, catechisms, twenty-nine treatises on theology, textbooks on logic, and a variety of other works. The last thirty years of his life was spent as "an invalid at the home of his friend, Sir Thomas Abney, where Watts devoted himself in comfortable and happy surrounding to the writing of many of the fine hymns still used todav."

Though he never married, Watts often wrote for children. In fact he wrote an entire hymnal for children in 1715 entitled, *Divine Songs for Children*. Watts's addresses the layers of meaning that can be found in any given hymn text in his preface to this hymnal: "... children of high and low degree, of the Church of England or dissenters, baptized in infancy or not, may all join together in these songs. And I have endeavored to sink the language to the level of a child's understanding, and yet to keep it, if possible, above contempt, so I have designed to profit all, if possible, and offend none."

Our hymn this month, "I Sing the Mighty Power of God," is a straight forward hymn of praise that uses multiple examples from the creation story to point our gaze toward a God whose power is evident at every turn. Stanza one begins by praising the God who made the mountains, seas, and skies, but quickly turns from mere creation to the wisdom of God and the order of nature. Here is the text: I sing the mighty power of God that made the mountains rise, that spread the flowing seas abroad and built the lofty skies, I sing the wisdom that ordained the sun to rule the day; the moon shines full at His command, and all the stars obey. Often sung as an opening hymn in worship, we are immediately reminded that God is God and we are not. In our individual worlds where we are accustomed to calling all the shots, this timely thought sets our worship in motion by putting us in our place and God in God's place.

After we are comfortably or perhaps uncomfortably in our place, Watts outlined God's providence for us. Here is the text: I sing the goodness of the Lord that filled the earth with food; He formed the creatures with His word and then pronounced them good. Lord, how Thy wonders are displayed where-e'er I turn my eye: If I survey the ground I tread or gaze upon the sky! If we slow down enough to see the wonders of creation whether on the ground or in the sky, there is no limit. The infinite universe is ours to gaze. We constantly learn more of the expanse of galaxies and the seemingly infinite miniscule particles that make up all matter. We take our place as large in comparison to molecules and tiny compared to the universe. Of course our perspective is ever changing to God's creation and the only constant is "wonder."

Finally, Watts turns creation back toward God. To further secure our place, the final stanza refers to our life as "borrowed," assuring the worshiper that God is in control. Here is the final stanza: There's not a plant or flower below but makes Thy glories known; And clouds arise and tempests blow by order from Thy throne; While all that borrows life from Thee is ever in Thy care, And everywhere that man can be, Thou, God, are present there. The editors of our "Glory to God," hymnal change the last line to remove the male-dominated language. It reads, "And everywhere that we can be, Thou, God, are present there. The change works to include all those who worship. As the perfect bookend to the first stanza, Watts puts us in our place in God's world regardless of our time and space. I suggested earlier that this hymn often functioned as a hymn of praise at the beginning of worship. Assuming that function, as we conclude this opening hymn of praise, we are now ready to open our hearts and minds to God's word confident of not only who we are but whose we are. Thanks be to God!

"Who's In The Pews"

Called to Worship-Empowered to Serve-A Missional Church-Inspiring Disciples- Creating Community

There are thirteen words in the Rumple Vision statement...taken individually they are just words but linked together, a compelling impact. Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church has a wealth of individuals that live this vision. Each month will feature a group or individual within the church that is inspired to carry out God's wish for us. This month we feature Andy Groothuis.

Andy is the son of Rumple members Peter and Jana Groothuis. After moving to Boone at a young age from Pennsylvania, Andy was home schooled then earned his bachelor's degree in Graphic Arts and Imaging Technology from ASU. His hobbies include hiking, drawing and studying history.

While visiting his grandparents in Michigan, he saw mounds of items being thrown away during the town's spring cleaning. He knew something could be done to reduce this waste, began thinking about repair and the idea was hatched for "Repair Hub". Andy reasoned "we used to be a society that fixed almost everything. Since then, we have become more of a throw away culture. Repair Hub is a new non-profit that will teach you how to fix your items and create community through repair".

The Repair Hub kicked off on October 5, 2019 with a popup evet at the Watauga Library that encouraged folks to bring in their broken or torn items for repair instead of throwing them away. On arrival, visitors were paired with a qualified volunteer that assisted in the repair of the item. The value was created with that individual leaving with their item refreshed while also gaining a new skill.

Although this is a new service in Boone, similar groups have been active in the Netherlands, Australia and also here in the United States. Repair Hub has an educational component with workshops that follow the reduced waste theme.

Andy's grandfather instilled the ability to fix things at an early age. I asked him to elaborate on the fixing concept and he stated, "Repair comes in the reuse part of Reduce, Reuse and Recycle. When you repair an item, you save on resources it would take to replace, whether that be money or raw materials and energy." He mentioned even the most challenging items can produce value stating "There is a safety feature used in steam cleaners so the caps do not come off under pressure. I have worked and worked on this small appliance at home and that cap will not come off. It was a few models back so the company did not offer repair so I cut its long electrical cord and used that for a fan repair."

Intrigued, I asked Andy what his hopes and dreams are for the future of this endeavor? He replied "I will be adding workshops at the beginning of 2020. These will go into more detail of repairs and repurposing items. In the future I hope to have a permanent location to house tools and provide a drop-in for people to repair items."

I look forward to sharing another "Who's In The Pews" inspiring snapshot of our church members and the implementation of the Vision for the Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church next month.
