

### Hymn for February

In this, our first article on hymns for the 2018 calendar year, it seems only proper to begin with hymn number one in our current Presbyterian hymnal; Holy, Holy, Holy. Our former Presbyterian hymnal (1990) began with another hymn and in the view of many congregations was off to a questionable start. Regardless, Holy, Holy, Holy has proven a mainstay in multiple denominations and traditions since its first appearance in 1826.

Holy, Holy, Holy was written by Reginald Heber (1783-1826), one of the pioneers in the early nineteenth century, in a form that highlights the literary refinement of poetry in the style of English hymnody. Showing early aptitude in poetry by translating a Latin classic into English verse at age seven, Heber went on to enter Oxford at the age of seventeen. He wrote the text for Holy, Holy, Holy during his tenure as vicar of Hodnet, Shropshire, 1807-23. Based on Isaiah 6:3, and Revelation 4:1-11, the scripture references attempts to worship God in voice and song.

The tune (NICEA) for Holy, Holy was written by John Bacchus Dykes (1823-1876), and is celebrated as one of the most universally associated tune and text in print. It is a tribute to the First Council of Nicaea which formalized the doctrine of the Trinity in 325 AD, and creates a ceremonial feel that celebrates God's creation each new day (early in the morning our song shall rise to Thee).

The tone of Reginald Heber's text is that of ceremonial praise and names the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit at the end of stanzas one and four. For this reason if none other, it begs to be sung on Trinity Sunday in the celebration of the Christian Year.

I remember singing hymns in my home church congregation standing beside my grandmother who made it a weekly habit of beginning each worship service with a stick of Juicy Fruit gum. A bit of a bribe up front: time to behave yourself. Although the same each Sunday, it was always a treat to get a stick of gum.

It was also a treat to hear hymn number one announced: Holy, Holy, Holy, It must have been the best hymn if for no other reason that being placed first in the hymnal. I didn't understand the theology of the hymn at that time, but I certainly understood how it made me feel about the church and about God. The soaring melody and regal harmony created a celebration of this new day of God's creation.

Three of the four stanzas share unabashed praise by those expressing their faith by singing to God in worship. The only break from praise directed to God occurs in stanza three. For a brief moment, the focus of the singer changes from God to man. Contrasting our condition (sinful) to God's holiness, the hymn turns toward our shortcomings to recognize God's glory being foreshadowed by the darkness of sin. The third and fourth line of the stanza also warn us of a common sin. "Only Thou art holy," gives us pause to placing anything worldly beside God's holiness. The stanza concludes with a final nod to the Trinity that we found in the first stanza.

Holy, Holy, Holy invites us while celebrating God's goodness and creation, to also place ourselves appropriately in creation as the created. A little lower than the angels (Psalm 8) but ready to claim God's goodness as our own. Standing the test of time, I predict that Holy, Holy, Will continue to inspire many generations to come, with or without a stick of Juicy Fruit gum. Thanks be to God.



### Lent at Rumple

**ASH WEDNESDAY** marks the beginning of the 40 days of Lent, the season of preparation and examination leading up to Easter. Rumple will host a worship service on Ash Wednesday at 6:00 p.m. in the sanctuary. The service will include prayer, music, Scripture, the imposition of ashes, and invitation to the Lenten disciplines. Childcare will be provided for this service in the nursery.



The Walk: A Spiritual Journey through Lent, A six week small group prayer and bible study. The Walk is an intentional time for people to gather around the Word of God and reflect on their relationship with Jesus Christ. The small group will meet each Tuesday at 11:30-1:00, and repeated on Tuesday evening, 6:00-7:30 p.m., beginning February 20 and continuing through March 13. Groups will meet in The Rumple House and will be led by pastor, Kathy Beach. Interested participants please sign up with Hazel (office@rumplechurch.org) so that you will have ample time to read a small book in preparation for the group. The book, Making All Things New: An Invitation to the Spiritual Life, by Henri Nouwen, will be available in the church office for purchase, \$10 each, beginning February 8 If you are unable to participate in the group but would like to read along with the book, please speak to Kathy.

The Rumple Christian Education Committee invites you to a Holy and intentional season of Lent. As we did during the season of Advent, Rumple will be sending out daily emails with Scripture, a short devotion, and prayer. If you are not currently on the Rumple email list, please get in touch with Hazel in the church office, office@rumplechurch.org. And, beginning on Ash Wednesday, a Lenten calendar, with daily Scriptures, prayer, and spiritual practice ideas will also be available in the church office and at the entrances to the sanctuary. The Committee also hopes to put this calendar up online so that you can print out your own copy at home, if you wish.

Please also read about the Rise Against Hunger mission afternoon on March 18 on the missions page of this Slate and Stone. This is another wonderful opportunity to join, with fellow followers of Jesus, in the spiritual practice of mission and service.

Missions 2018 is ready to go, and we hope you are too! We are coordinating our efforts this year around quarterly Missions projects. Each quarter will highlight areas of need and agencies responding to those needs. Our first quarter focuses on hunger and food insecurity. From February through the spring, we will help address the needs in our community and world through support of **Blowing Rock CARES** and **Rise Against Hunger**.

**Blowing Rock CARES** - Rumple has a long history with BR C.A.R.E.S. and will continue our support in 2018 with monthly food collections. BR C.A.R.E.S. is a food bank that helps provide basic non-perishable food to families and individuals in Watauga County. The BR CARES food pantry is open for clients on Mondays from 9 am to 1 pm right here at Rumple.

NEW PROCESS FOR FOOD COLLECTIONS - We are changing our item and food collection for 2018, but only slightly. In order to highlight the needs of BR C.A.R.E.S. and to make a more concerted effort to meet those needs, we will collect food and other items on the first Sunday of every month. Our first Sunday happens to be Souper Bowl Sunday on February 4. The items of need for the February 4<sup>th</sup> collection are canned meats (chicken, tuna, etc.), canned beans, fruit in natural juice, and toilet tissue. Please bring your items on February 4<sup>th</sup>. We will have shopping carts for collections. We will continue to have the shopping cart in the church lobby in case you miss the first Sunday but would still like to donate items.

Rise Against Hunger -- We are co-hosting a meal-packaging event with Rise Against Hunger on Sunday, March 18 at 3:00pm at the American Legion in Blowing Rock. We will package meals for 1-2 hours, then share a potluck meal. We are partnering with St. Mary of the Hills, FaithBridge, and the Appalachian State Presbyterian Episcopal Campus Ministry to package over 10,000 dehydrated meals for those in need around the world. Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization based in Raleigh, NC. The packaged meals are used primarily to support school feeding programs in developing countries, which not only addresses hunger but also the related challenges of poverty, disease, education, and the welfare of women and children. 




## **Around Rumple**

For nine years, Blowing Rock CARES (Children Are Really Special) has been helping feed hungry neighbors in Watauga County through a food pantry. For the past four years this ministry has been operating out of Rumple. In fall 2017, the Rumple Session voted to assume administrative oversight of Blowing Rock CARES. This means that Blowing Rock CARES remains a separate non-profit from Rumple and keeps their 501 c3 status. The ministry will keep separate financials and continue to be directed by an independent board. Where Rumple will play a role is with this board. The Rumple session will have a liaison to the board and approves all board members. The Blowing Rock CARES board, through the session liaison,

will keep the church updated on the ministry's progress. The Rumple Session and Missions
