We've shared our blessings with: a Back2School supply drive, Food4Families food deliveries, medicine collections for Chiapas, Mexico, hosted mission co-workers, the Smiths, who serve in Russia, served with Habitat on work days, the middle school youth went on a mission trip and more. We celebrated 100 years in mission partnership with Grandfather Home with a special worship service and generous offering on August 19.

# Hymn for August by Dave McCollum

Every now and then you need a short phrase that sums up a long or complex sentiment. Clichés get a bad rap for often trivializing a well-known feeling. But a cliché becomes very effective in relating our shared current experience or emotion in terms that are easily expressed and understood. One of the challenges in hymn writing is trying to express complex sentiments in a limited number of syllables. Our hymn for this month's article uses all the above tools and a few more to create what has been called "one of the grandest hymns in the whole realm of English hymnody." 1

"O God, Our Help in Ages Past," a paraphrase of Psalm 90, a psalm of Moses, was originally entitled, "Our God, Our Help in Ages Past." Isaac Watts published the hymn beginning with "Our God," in his 1719 publication, The Psalms of David Imitated in the Language of the New Testament. He later changed the title from "Our God," to "O God," in his 1738 hymnal entitled, Psalms and Hymns. The tune, ST. ANNE, composed by William Croft in 1708 was originally written for a version of Psalm 62. After establishing the tune with the Watts' text, its musical worth was proven by master composers George F. Handel and J. S. Bach when they both included it in original compositions of their own. Handel used the tune in an anthem entitled "O Praise the Lord," while Bach made use of it in his great Fugue in E-Flat Major, often called "St. Anne's Fugue," referencing the name of the hymn tune. Isaac Watts, although frail most of his life, was considered a scholarly genius in many different fields. His father was a learned deacon in a dissenting Congregational church, and at the time of his son's birth was in prison for his non-conformist beliefs. Isaac displayed literary genius at a very young age, writing verses and even rhyming everyday conversations. Following a scolding by his father for the irritating habit, Isaac responded, "Oh, Father, do some pity take, and I will no more verses make." The text, originally nine stanzas, usually appears in five stanzas. Stanza one references the following sweeping realities in a few syllables: the past, future, shared oppression and heaven (our eternal home). Stanza one: O God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, our shelter from the stormy blast, and our eternal home. Stanza two continues the theme of our shared lot in life but gains strength from our faith in God. Stanza two: Under the shadow of Thy throne still my we dwell secure; sufficient is

Thine arm alone, and our defense is sure. Stanza three brings creation into the time-reference of stanza one. It is as follows: Before the hills in order stood or earth received her frame, from everlasting Thou art God, to endless years the same.

If you've read this far, I would like for you to spend some time with the next stanza and give me your interpretation of the stanza. The stanza speaks of the ever-rolling entity of time. What are the implications of the last phrase? Here is the text: Time, like an ever-rolling stream, bears all its sons away; they fly, forgotten, as a dream, dies at the opening day. And finally, the last stanza restates much of the first stanza grounded in the knowledge that God is with us. It states: O God, our help in ages past, our hope for years to come, be Thou our guide while life shall last, and our eternal home. Dave

During the PC(USA) Season of Peace in September and October, Rumple Missions will focus on peace and witness through the work of Watauga County Habitat for Humanity. Habitat for Humanity believes that affordable housing plays a critical role in building strong, stable, peaceful families and communities. As a Watauga County Habitat for Humanity Covenant Church, Rumple is committed to serving with Habitat to improve our community by building decent, affordable homes in partnership with families in need.

A representative from Watauga Habitat will join us in worship on Sunday, September 30. Volunteer groups from Rumple will work on the Bradshaw family home on September 29 and October 13. If you, your Sunday School class, Circle, social group, etc. are interested in volunteering and/or providing lunch for the volunteers, please contact Tim Harris at 828-262-1067 or Misty Mayfield at 828-234-1389.

Rumple will collect the Peace and Global Witness Offering on October 7 World Communion Sunday. This offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world, including low-income and poverty housing. Rumple will retain 25% of this offering to contribute to Watauga County Habitat for Humanity. The remaining offering will support mid-council and Presbyterian Mission Agency ministries to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

We also continue our 1st Sunday food collections for **Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S.** on Sunday, September 2. Blowing Rock CARES is a food bank that helps provide basic non-perishable food to families and individuals in Watauga County. The food pantry is open for clients on Mondays from 9 am to 1 pm right here at Rumple.

The September items of need for Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. are applesauce (low or no sugar), canned fruits in natural juices, canned beans (pork & beans, pinto, great northern, lima), black-eyed peas, canned salmon, canned sauerkraut, large cans of spaghetti sauce, and toilet paper. Please bring your items on September 2 or anytime throughout the month of September and leave them in the shopping cart in the church lobby.

Rumple and St Mary of the Hills are partnering with the Women's Fund of the Blue Ridge for their **Hygiene Supply Drive** to provide hygiene products to women at Hospitality House, Oasis and other local charities. Items of need are full-size shampoo, conditioner, lotion, toothpaste, toothbrush, floss, deodorant, and plastic soap containers. If you would like to donate hygiene supplies, please drop them in the hygiene supply box in the church lobby by September 30.

#### 2018 Nominating Committee

### Who, what, when, where, why, and how?

The 2018 Nominating Committee has begun their work. This year's committee, per the Rumple Manual of Procedures, is made up of three at-large members (elected in October 2017) and two elders, one from the class of 2018 and one from the class of 2019. Committee members are: Tim Harris, Danny Kirkland (Elder 2018), Teresa Lentz (co-chair), Misty Mayfield (co-chair, Elder 2019), Greg Tarbutton (secretary). The committee is tasked with nominating four elders (two women and two men per Rumple's Manual of Procedures) for the class of 2021 (elders in the Presbyterian Church are elected for a three-year term) and three at-large members for the 2019 Nominating Committee (who will be joined by two elders, Misty Mayfield for 2019 and one elder from the class of 2020).

In August, the 2018 Nominating Committee invited your suggestions for 2019 elders and nominating committee members. Recommended persons should be active members of Rumple Presbyterian Church, who demonstrate faith, dedication, and good judgment. Elders serve as members of the Session, which is responsible for the mission, government and spiritual leadership of the church.

In early September, the committee will begin their prayerful deliberations of selecting nominees willing to serve. Once the Nominating Committee has their slate of nominees, they will ask the Session to call a congregational meeting where the official election of elders and nominating committee members will take place. This meeting will be announced at least two weeks in advance and the names and bios of the nominees will be shared as well. As is allowed in Presbyterian polity, other candidates may be nominated from the floor, if the person nominating has secured the permission of the candidate. All active members (but not affiliate members) of Rumple are eligible to serve as elders and are able to vote in the congregational meeting.
