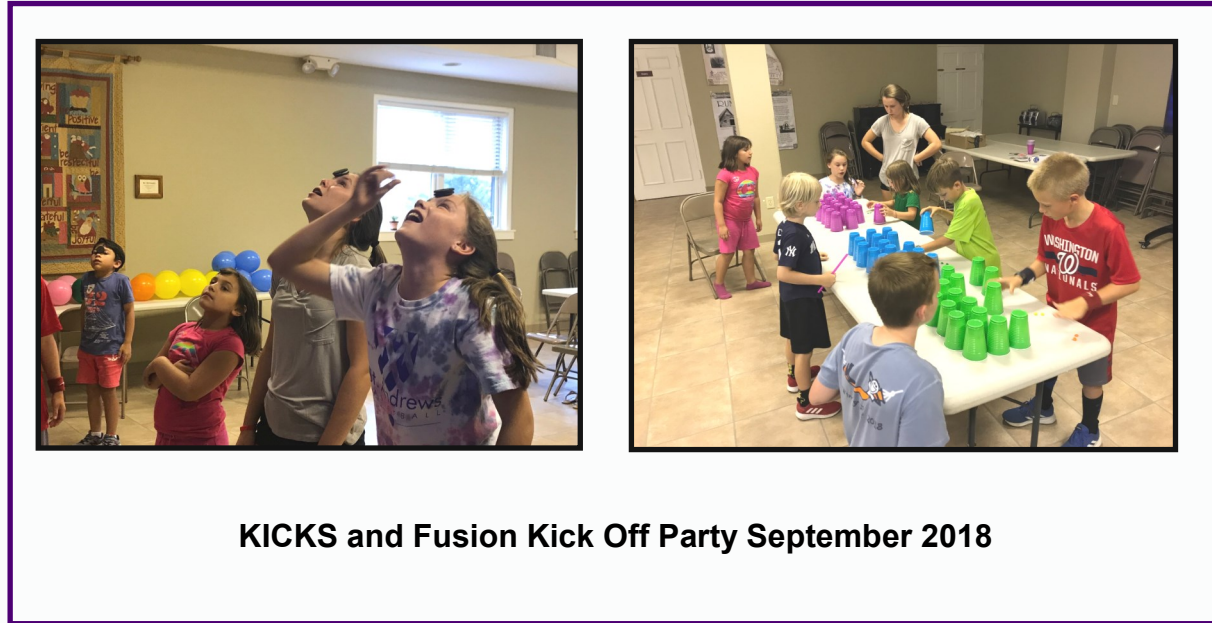

Hymn for October by Dave McCollum

A bit of movie trivia: The year was 1993. "Sister Act 2: Back in the Habit," was attempting to follow in the footsteps of the wildly popular, "Sister Act," that had come out one year earlier. Put yourself in the producer's chair. You know this sequel must end with a choir competition in which Sister Mary Clarence's choir must win. You must come up with not only a convincing competitor, but a convincing choral performance that is not only strong but believable. You decide that a traditional robed choir singing a hymn might do the trick. But which hymn. Where do you find a hymn that is the quintessential choral expression? Of course, from Beethoven's Ninth (Choral) Symphony. The hymn text was written nearly 100 years later but is now almost synonymous with the tune found near the end of the work. "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee," not only worked for the movie scene but, along with some pretty awesome stage presence by the competing choir, captured the moment of high drama and sheer joy. Yeah, ok, Sister Mary Clarence's choir won, but it took a soloist, choir, and choreography to beat one of the greatest hymns ever written.

The text was written by Henry van Dyke, born in Germantown, Pennsylvania, on November 10, 1852. Regarded as one of the ablest Presbyterian preachers and leading literary figures of his time, van Dyke wrote the text while serving as a guest preacher at Williams College, Williamstown, Massachusetts. The story is told that van Dyke handed the manuscript to the college president, saying, "Here is a hymn for you. Your mountains (the Berkshires) were my inspiration. It must be sung to the music of Beethoven's "Hymn of Joy." Van Dyke stated his purpose in writing the text as follows:

These verses are simple expressions of common Christian feelings and desires in this present time, hymns of today that may be sung together by people who know the thought of the age, and are not afraid that any truth of science will destroy their religion or that any revolution on earth will overthrow the kingdom of heaven. Therefore, these are hymns of trust and hope.

I love the expression, "sung together by people who know the thought of the age," and yet are faithful. The thought of any age (secular) will always question God's existence and presence (sacred). Kenneth W. Osbeck writes, "Joyful, Joyful, We Adore Thee" portrays a joyful interplay between God's created world and the manifestation of this same creative spirit in the life of a believer. Such interesting similes as "hearts unfold like flow'rs before Thee ..." illustrate this interesting technique." I encourage you to choose a favorite phrase from the following pairs to carry with you today: Earth and heaven; stars and angels; field and forest; vale and mountain; chanting bird and flowing fountain. Did you pick one?

Osbeck continues, "the fourth stanza concludes with an invitation for all of God's children to join the mighty chorus of joy begun at creation's dawn (Job 38:7) and, in so doing, to find the encouragement needed for any circumstance of life." Here is the final stanza: "Mortals, join the mighty chorus Which the morning stars began; Father love is reigning o'er us, Brother love binds man to man. Ever singing, march we onward, Victors in the midst of strife; Joyful music lifts us sunward In the triumph song of life."

The August 27 Session Minutes were approved with additions and correction.

WORSHIP - Worship Committee along with Kathy and Vicki Worsham discussed plans for decorating the Sanctuary for the Lenten and Christmas Season. Also, the communion table for World Communion Sunday on October 7 and All Saints Day in November. Budget requests to be brought to the Finance Committee for 2019 were presented reviewed and approved by the members.

NEW BUSINESS - Rumple's sound system - A professional from ASU will check out our equipment for possible help and guidance.

During the PC(USA) Season of Peace in September and October, Rumple Missions is focusing on peace and witness through the work of Watauga County Habitat for Humanity.

In times of crises and disasters such as Hurricane Florence, we often see images of destroyed homes and families sorting through the wreckage to salvage what they can. In these moments, we pray for those who have lost so much, and we wonder how best to reach out to those in need. As a Habitat for Humanity Covenant Church, Rumple has the opportunity to help our neighbors in need of reliable, safe housing. The Covenant Church Program connects congregations with local Habitat affiliates to pray, volunteer, and donate time and talent to Habitat projects. Through this covenant, we support Habitat's mission to help partner families achieve the strength, stability, and independence they need to build a better life for themselves and their families.

A representative from Watauga Habitat will join us for a Minute for Mission in worship on Sunday, September 30. Volunteers from Rumple will work on the Bradshaw family home on September 29 and October 13. Rumple will collect the **Peace and Global Witness Offering on October 7** World Communion Sunday. This offering enables the church to promote the Peace of Christ by addressing systems of injustice across the world, including low-income and poverty housing. Rumple will retain 25% of this offering to contribute to Watauga County Habitat for Humanity. The remaining offering will support mid-council and Presbyterian Mission Agency ministries to advocate for peace and justice in cultures of violence through collaborative projects of education and Christian witness.

We also continue our 1st Sunday food collections for **Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S.** on Sunday, October 7. Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. is a food bank that helps provide basic non-perishable food to families and individuals in Watauga County. The food pantry is open for clients on Mondays from 9 am to 1 pm right here at Rumple. The October items needed: are toilet paper, canned fruit in natural juices, pork & beans, pinto beans, black eye peas, black beans, butter beans, and low-fat canned milk. Please bring your items on October 7 or anytime throughout the month and leave them in the shopping cart in the church office reception area.
