"It's All Connected!"



During Lent, the kids are studying "The Faces of Easter." They hear a story of Jesus' life and then connect other Godly Play stories to it. Hymn for March by Dave McCollum

We've all heard stories of someone who received an inspired thought. It usually goes one of two ways: either they follow up by writing it down to save the thought or they fail to act on the thought and it is quickly forgotten. I've had a few occasions when I woke up in the middle of the night with an idea for a song. I learned early on to get up and write it down. It doesn't always turn into a song but occasionally one has come to pass.

Sanford F. Bennett, a druggist in Elkhorn, Wisconsin, shortly after the Civil War wrote the words to this month's hymn: "There's a Land That Is Fairer Than Day" (In the Sweet By and By). The tune was written by a music teacher in the same town as Bennett, named Joseph P. Webster. The story is one of inspiration and follow-through.

The story goes that Mr. Webster, the local music teacher was prone to many symptoms that often characterize creative people: nervousness, sensitivity, and periods of depression. Mr. Bennett, the town druggist knew Mr. Webster well enough that he was able to sense his peculiarities at first glance. Bennett would often respond if Webster was melancholy by giving him a song to work on. The following account appears in Hymns of Faith, by William J. Reynolds:

He (Webster) came into my place of business, walked down to the stove, and turned his back on me without speaking. I was at my desk writing. Turning to him I said, "Webster, what is the matter now?" "It's no matter," he replied, "it will be all right by and by." The idea of the hymn came to me like a flash of sunlight, and I replied, "The Sweet By and By! Why would not that make a good hymn?" "Maybe it would," said he indifferently. Turning to my desk I penned the words of the hymn as fast as I could write. I handed the words to Webster. As he read his eyes kindled, and stepping to the desk he began writing the notes. Taking his violin, he played the melody and then jotted down the notes of the chorus. It was not over thirty minutes from the time I took my pen to write the words before two friends with Webster and myself were singing the hymn.

I had a middle school principal once, early on in my teaching career that used to walk down the hall exclaiming in a loud voice, "hallelujah, there's a better day a-comin'." It was his way of supporting the teachers as much or more than the students, implying that suffering in this life is temporary; heaven is eternal. Although singing didn't cure the suffering, it often made it bearable; especially while singing with a group of like-minded people. There was comfort in knowing that one day the suffering would end; that all of God's people would be together in their heavenly home. The text speaks of the place that God prepares for God's children. The days will be filled with singing and praise.

As with many gospel style hymns, "In the Sweet By and By," uses a call and response refrain at the end of each stanza. The melody sings the beginning of the phrase, "In the sweet," followed by the harmony voices and piano repeating, "In the sweet." The same effect follows on the text, "by and by." The voices then come together with, "we shall meet on that beautiful shore." The effect in the congregation is one of mutual support and encouragement. Here is the text:

- 1. There's a land that is fairer than day, and by faith we can see it afar, For the Father waits over the way, to prepare us a dwelling place there. In the sweet by and by we shall meet on that beautiful shore. In the sweet by and by we shall meet on that beautiful shore.
- 2.We shall sing on that beautiful shore the melodious songs of the blest. And our spirits shall sorrow no more, not a sigh for the blessing of rest. In the sweet by and by we shall meet on that beautiful shore.
- 3.To our bountiful Father above we will offer our tribute of praise. For the glorious gift of His love and the blessings that hallow our days. In the sweet by and by we shall meet on that beautiful shore. In the sweet by and by we shall meet on that beautiful shore.

Stranger to Neighbor - Puerto Rico Mission Team

In one of our last Puerto Rico Team meetings, I shared about a book I bought at APCE. I ventured around the PCUSA bookstore a few times. After the third time of stopping at this book, I knew I had to buy it. More Than Enough: Living Abundantly in a Culture of Excess, written by Lee Hull Moses, is a challenging, yet truth-filled book reminding us that we truly have more than enough.

As I read this book on my plane ride from Houston to Charlotte, one chapter stuck out to me more than any other - Ch. 9 "Stranger to Neighbor: Go and Do Likewise." In this chapter, she shares the story of "The Good Samaritan," this concept of "us" vs. "them," and this article by Dr. Samuel Wells looking at "rethinking service."

So often, we find ourselves referring to people in need as "them." "We are going to help them." "We are doing this for them." This language can be problematic. When we do something *for* someone, we don't have to get emotionally attached. We don't have to build relationships. Like Hull-Moses says in her book, "with is harder than for." When we work "with" someone, we get to know their story, their life, and we go out and join Christ who's already at work (see my Tom Long quote below).

I challenged our mission team to see this mission trip as a chance for us to work *with* the people we meet in Puerto Rico. Whether it's painting a house or cleaning up debris, they are going to work *with* them, not *for* them. They are going in action, to love and serve with them, so that we can become neighbors across the ocean.

I want to challenge us as a congregation - we have such a thriving Missions ministry here at Rumple - Blowing Rock Cares, Pennies for Hunger, and Habitat for Humanity to name a few. These are wonderful organizations that support those in need. While we are preparing boxes for families or putting coins in the baskets each month, let us not look at this as an opportunity to serve "them." My prayer is that we seek to build relationships with people, get to know their story, hear their hearts. We don't serve for them - let's serve with them instead and see what a difference we can make in this community and beyond. -Holly
