Today we celebrate the Sacrament of the Lord's Supper. The communion table is an open table. All who trust in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior are welcome to share in the meal. We will celebrate Communion by intinction today. Please come forward to a communion station, take a piece of bread and dip it in the cup. If you are unable to come forward, the elders will come and serve you in your seat.

The flowers for our Holy Week services were designed by Jean Baskin and are very symbolic ... *The palm branches* denote honor and triumph over death; *the red rose*, Christ and the blood He shed for our sins; a crown of thorns, placed on the head of Christ to mock and cause Him pain; *the cross*, the crucifixion of Jesus the Christ; *the candles*, Christ the light of the world; *the color purple*, noble or royal birth; *the bible*, which we as Christians believe to be inspired by the Word of God.

A Nursery is provided tonight for infants through five years old in the Keys Church Nursery area on the downstairs level of the education building. Please ask an usher to direct you to the nursery.

On Maundy Thursday we remember the last evening Jesus shared with his disciples in the upper room before his arrest and crucifixion. Maundy Thursday marks three key events in Jesus' last week: his washing of his disciples' feet, his institution of the Lord's Supper, and his new commandment to love one another. This service begins the Triduum, the three-day period from sunset on Thursday to sunrise on Easter Day. The name "Maundy Thursday" comes from the Latin mandatum novum, referring to the "new commandment" Jesus taught his disciples (John 13:34). In other words, this is "new commandment Thursday." Maundy Thursday worship typically features the Lord's Supper and, in some traditions, an act of foot washing or another sign of mutual love and dedication.

Holy Week worship continues tomorrow with the commemoration of Good Friday. Rumple will share in hosting a Good Friday worship service at noon, with First Presbyterian Church of Boone, at FPC, 131 Big Valley Street, in Boone.
