

RUMPLE OFFERS SUNDAY SCHOOL OPTIONS FOR ADULTS EACH SUNDAY MORNING FROM 9:45-10:45AM. Everyone is welcome to attend these classes! 

Hymn for September by Dave McCollum

Sometimes the job of a hymn is to put an idea within a simple musical expression that will allow a subject or even a thought to be expressed in worship. The music, the melody, harmony, and rhythm create a host that combines the text in a way that expresses the meaning and essence of the text. For example, the African American Spiritual, "Every Time I Feel the Spirit," describes an experience of actually feeling the Spirit of God. The melody starts on a high note symbolizing excitement and descends to a low note that could represent the realization or decision to "pray" (Every time I feel the Spirit moving in my heart I will pray). The rhythm is very syncopated, again to express the excitement of encountering the Spirit of God. All of the musical elements have been chosen to deliberately express the feeling of the hymn text. The marriage of text and tune perfectly expresses a single sentiment for a congregation to sing.

But what about the hymns that express multiple sentiments or multiple texts? What about the hymns that tell God's story in Scripture, or that describes God's attributes, or that set up our shortcomings in hope that God will intervene? Surely we would get lost in such a hymn not able to contemplate a single thought due to the bombardment of multiple subjects. Yes, that is often the case. The text goes by quickly and we can't possibly latch on to everything. In this case, the hymn writer hopes that something will catch your eye, or rather catch your ear; a phrase will stick or an idea will jump out with which you can relate. I sometimes relate understanding a hymn like this to communally reciting the Prayer of Confession in worship. Individually, I certainly am not guilty of every shortcoming expressed in the prayer but I'm probably guilty of one or two. And those are the ones I remember and express in the moment of silence following the communal prayer. As I sing a hymn I try to pay attention to a phrase that jumps out, that stays with me after the hymn is over.

I am writing this a couple of days after I introduced a new hymn in worship. I shared the hope that the new hymn would be embraced as a familiar hymn in our congregation through the coming years. I am committed to programing the hymn a few times a year as a means to that end. The hymn, "God the Sculptor of the Mountains," presents a text that is choked full of God's story, God's attributes, and our shortcomings followed by an invitation for God to be with us. I thought it might be helpful to share the hymn's structure as a way of better understanding the text.

The stanza begins by telling God's story throughout Scripture. Here is the beginning of stanza one: "God the sculptor of the mountains, God the miller of the sand, God the jeweler of the heavens, God the potter of the land." The text then relates God to creation: "you are womb of all creation." And finally the text turns to our need for God and an invitation for God to be with us: "we are formless, shape us now." Now, was there something in that stanza that spoke to you? If you are an artist, could you relate to God Sculpting the universe? If you work with your hands, could you relate to God as a "potter" of creation? Or perhaps our feeling of helplessness when we want God to shape and form us? The remaining stanzas take the same form of Scripture references, God's attributes and finally our need for God.

Here are the remaining stanzas for the hymn. I hope you will enjoy this new hymn as it becomes more familiar. Stanza 2: God the nuisance of the Pharaoh, God the cleaver of the sea, God the pillar in the darkness, God the beacon of the free: you are fount of all deliverance; we are aimless; lead us now. Stanza 3: God the dresser of the vineyard, God the planter of the wheat, God the reaper of the harvest, God the source of all we eat: you are host at every table; we are hungry; feed us now. Stanza 4: God the unexpected infant, God the calm, determined youth, God the table-turning prophet, God the resurrected truth: you are present every moment; we are searching; meet us now.

There are thirteen words in the Rumple Vision statement...taken individually they are just words but linked together, a compelling impact. Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church has a wealth of individuals that live this mission. Each month we will feature a group or individual within the church that is inspired to carry out God's wish for us. This month we feature the Rumple Finance Committee.

The Committee is responsible of recommending church financial policies to the Session and monitoring performance in the areas of financial operations, budgeting, investments, fundraising and risk management. The current Rumple Finance Committee is comprised of **Jim Clabough**-Chairman, **Cullie Tarleton**-Session Liaison, **Kathy Beach**-Pastor, **Mike Steele**, **Mike Capristo, Wayne Holliday, Maurice Ewing, David Baskin, Jennie Derby, Ed Cummer, Bill Cuthill, Billy Worsham,** and **Jeff Stewart**-Recording Secretary. Each of these individuals possess an impressive background in the principles of finance. Several have served on this committee many years and take the responsibility of Rumple finances personally as well as spiritually.

I asked three members to share some background on themselves and the responsibility of serving:

Wayne Holliday-Wayne graduated with an accounting degree and spent his entire career as a Certified Public Accountant. Asked what brought him and wife Kathryn to the High Country he said "beautiful mountains and cool breezes". I asked Wayne what his life experiences bring to the finance committee, "my gifts are knowledge of accounting, finance and business operations. Hopefully I provide the skills to help keep the Church on a strong financial footing". I noted to Wayne that budget time is the most difficult decision-making time of the year. I asked him his thoughts going into it. "First, we need to cover fixed operating and maintenance costs. Then we make sure the employees are adequately enumerated. Only then can we focus on the things that are most rewarding to the church and its individual members... missions, service to the mankind through Jesus Christ and Christian fellowship."

Bill Cuthill-A native of Washington, DC, a graduate in accounting from the Univ. of Florida, Bill and his wife Rene vacationed several times in the High Country before buying and enjoying life here as a summer resident. Bill is a retired CPA and CFE and has worked on finance committees in every church he has been a member of. His strong suits are knowing the PCU-SA and organizational skills. I asked Bill about the committee fellowship and synergy, "Good group of pragmatic decision makers." This group rarely makes a decision which is not well discussed and thoughtful". Bill also noted, "I feel privileged as an affiliate member to be given such responsibility."

Maurice Ewing-Maurice hails from Augusta, Ga., spent 10 years in banking and 35 as an Economic Development Business Recruiter in the Charlotte area. As a lifetime summer resident, he and Bonnie always planned to retire in Blowing Rock and live in the Laurel Park house his aunt bought in 1942. Asked what inspired him to join Rumple he noted "I attended Rumple as a child (I remember Mrs. Cannon's Good News Club). I am a lifelong Presbyterian and Elder. Rumple was a logical almost predestined choice of churches when we moved to Blowing Rock permanently." I asked Maurice his thoughts on the inner workings of the committee, "Fortunately, the Finance Committee is composed of several highly skilled and career oriented financial experts. Rarely is there a discussion about the direction in which the church should go. Rather the typical, or sometimes lengthy discussions center on clarification of the issue and developing a comprehensive understanding of the consequences inherent to every option. Ultimate decisions are usually harmonious and unanimous, but hardly ever without robust discussion."
