LETTER FROM OUR MISSIONARIES IN EASTERN EUROPE

Dear friends and family,

Al and I are woefully behind in our updates, but we are trying to catch up. The last six months have been more challenging than usual, but also full of that community which carries us through.

In June, we had a unique partner visit. First Presbyterian Church in Clinton, SC brought a large intergenerational group for a visit. It was the firstvisit in many years and many wanted to participate – 17 people made the journey. Their partner church, a Baptist congregation just outside of Moscow, was not prepared to handle so many, so with FPC's pastor, Jeri Perkins, we decided to split the group (something we don't usually do). Pastor Jeri had been to Russia the year before in preparation for the visit. In addition to visiting the partner church, she had also visited Davydovo, the Orthodox community in the Yaroslavl region. Impressed with the ministry there, she was ready to have half of her group engage with their Baptist partner for an English language camp, while the other half traveled to Davydovo for the first session of the camp for families with handicapped children. The two groups had very different experiences (see photos). Al accompanied one half, while I accompanied the other. Both churches knew that the larger group was split, both knew that we were crossing denominational lines. The leaders of the two churches actually know each other, having met about four years ago when the daughter of one of the Baptist pastors was helping me as a translator in Davydovo. She called her dad to see if he would come up and meet Father Vladimir and get to know the community. That led to other pastors coming on another weekend. Impressed with the English camp experience, members of the Baptist church made the effort to come to the Russia Mission Network this fall to understand these Presbyterians a little better.

In September, for the first time in its 15-year history, the Russia Mission Network gathered in Russia – at Rodnik, the camp of Smolensk Baptist Church. We understand how daunting it is to think about traveling so far for the network meeting and are thankful for all those who made the effort. Even for Russians, it took extra effort to get to Smolensk. We had a diverse group – Russian, American, Cameroonian, Brazili-an, South African, Malagasi, and each participant contributed to the outcome. Six different partnerships were represented. Victor Ignatenkov, pastor in Smolensk, invited Father Vladimir from Davydovo to join us, having heard about the ministry in that village, and Father Vladimir sincerely tried, but he had a conflict. Andre Bezkorovaniy, the Roma pastor, was also invited and had planned to come, but his brother died a few days before. Al and I filled in for both Father Vladimir and for Pastor Andre as best we could. Moscow Protestant Chaplaincy was well represented, with the director of Social Ministry, a young intern and the church council chair. We had a lay preacher from the Evangelical Lutheran Church of Russia as well. After many years of hearing comments such as, "you can't work with the Orthodox" and "Roma, what for?" our hearts are warmed by the efforts our Russian colleagues are making to get to know one another across the lines. Our friends do not necessarily agree, but they engage in friendly, interesting conversations that whittle away at prejudices.

In sharing about the ministry with the handicapped in Davydovo, many questions arose from our Russian colleagues. One pastor shared about a family that has come to their church with an autistic child. The child can become overstimulated and is often emotional. The grandmothers of the church were giving in-appropriate, even harsh advice to the parents. The church realized that they needed a congregational meeting, to teach people about this family's needs. It has changed the atmosphere there. Colleagues who are engaged in orphanage ministry had many questions. They know oforphanages for children with special needs, but they have not known how to engage. The conversation sparked their interest and they asked if we might organize a seminar for them, so that they might better understand the needs of these special children and find good ways of working with them.

As the director of Social Ministry at MPC shared about their work with refugees, more questions arose. These were doors that our Russian brothers and sisters did not know about. It is a blessing to gather together and hear how God is at work in new ways. We are convinced that He wants us to join in community across the lines to find common ground and common purpose.

We are now in need of a church that will host the Russia Mission Network next year. I hope that we will begin to find a pattern that gathers us in Russia on a regular basis, but for 2020, the plan is to be back in the U.S. Would your congregation be interested? You don't have to be a part of the Twinning Program or already engaged in Russia in another way. You can do a new thing.

As we approach Thanksgiving, may we wish you all the blessings of gathering together.

Hymn for DECEMBER by Dave McCollum

As we find ourselves at the beginning of the Christian year with our focus once again on the Advent season, it's appropriate to set our attention on an advent hymn. "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," is rich in its musical and historical significance of the church. The text finds its origin from c. 12th century Latin although it wasn't translated into English until the 19th century by John M. Neale (1818-1866). The tune is based on plainsong/chant from c. 13th century and is entitled "Veni Emmanuel," meaning "Come God With Us." The tune, as with all plainchant, is through-composed, meaning each phrase is independent of the others with no repetition. Most hymns use repeated notes and rhythms to aid in learning and singing (ex: Amazing grace uses the same five notes and rhythm on three out of four phrases): making it all the more remarkable this hymn has survived and thrived throughout history.

"O Come, O Come, Emmanuel," finds its origin in the medieval Roman Church. It began as a series of Antiphons - short statement sung at the beginning of a Psalm or of the Magnificat at Vespers during the Advent season. Vespers is the Evening praver time, about 6 pm, of the Breviary or Divine Office; a series of prayers marking the hours of each day and sanctifying them with prayer. Each of the Antiphons greets the Savior with one of the many titles ascribed to Him in the Scriptures. Since each of these antiphons begins with the letter O, they are referred to as the "O" antiphons.

"Advent, beginning four Sundays before Christmas, is the season of the church year that emphasizes the anticipation of the first come of Christ to this earth. His coming as the Messiah was first prophesied in the sixth century B.C. when the Jews were captive in Babylon. For centuries there-after faithful Hebrews looked for their Messiah with great longing and expectation, echoing the praver that He would 'ransom captive Israel.' He did come 'unto His own' to establish a spiritual kingdom of both redeemed Jew and Gentile, 'but His own received Him not...."

While most hymnals include five stanzas, our "Glory to God," hymnal includes seven, allowing a stanza to be sung each day of the week leading up to Christmas. There are instructions at the bottom of the page assigning a stanza to a particular day. Here is the text.

- 1 O come, O come, Emmanuel, and ransom captive Israel, that mourns in lonely exile here until the Son of God appear. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
- 2 O come, thou Wisdom from on high, who ordered all things mightily: to us the path of knowledge show; and teach us in her ways to go, Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
- 3 O come, O come, thou Lord of might, who to thy tribes on Sinai's height in ancient times didst give the law in cloud and majesty and awe. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
- 4 O come, thou Root of Jesse, free thine own from Satan's tyranny; from depths of hell thy people save and give them victory o'er the grave. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
- 5 O come, thou Key of David, come, and open wide our heavenly home; make safe the way that leads on high, and close the path to misery. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
- 6 O come, thou Dayspring, come and cheer our spirits by thine advent here; disperse the gloomy clouds of night, and death's dark shadows put to flight. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.
- 7 O come, Desire of nations, bind all peoples in one heart and mind; bid envy, strife, and discord cease; fill the whole world with heaven's peace. Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel shall come to thee, O Israel.

Kenneth W. Osbeck, 101 Hymn Stories: The Inspiring True Stories Behind 101 Favorite Hymns (Kregel Publications, Grand Rapids, MI, 1982) 177-179.

"Emmanuel" - Deliverer. God's people now separated from heaven are here compared to Israel, during its Babylonian exile, being separated from God's holy temple in Jerusalem.

"Lord of Might." This is addressed to Almighty Jehovah, the One who first gave the Law at Mount Sinai to the awesome accompaniment of lightning and thunder (Exodus 19:16).

"Rod of Jesse." This is a reference to Isaiah 11:1; "and there shall come forth a rod out of the stem of Jesse, and a Branch shall grow out of his roots." This prophecy was perfectly fulfilled with the birth of Christ, who came from the kingly line of David, the son of Jesse.

"Thou Key of David." This expression is first recorded in Isaiah 22:22: "And the key of the house of David will I lay upon His shoulder." The well-known verse from Isaiah 9:6 also confirms this royal authority of Christ: "and the government shall be upon His shoulder..."

"Day-Spring." This address to the Messiah means literally "sun-rising." This prophetic reference was re=echoed by the priest Zacharias in these words upon hearing of Christ's birth: "The day-spring from on high has visited us, to give light to them that sit in darkness and in the shadow of death" (Luke 1:79b, 79a).

Haggai 2:7: "And I will shake all nations, and the desire of all nations shall come. And I will fill this house with glory saith the Lord of hosts

"Who's In The Pews"

Called to Worship-Empowered to Serve-A Missional Church-Inspiring Disciples- Creating Community

There are thirteen words in the Rumple Vision statement...taken individually they are just words but linked together, a compelling impact. Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church has a wealth of individuals that live this vision. Each month will feature a group or individual within the church that is inspired to carry out God's wish for us. This month we feature Kent Leonard.

Kent was born in Fort Myers, Fl. and moved to Boone when he was five years old. His wife Emily, part of our outstanding choir, is the child of a preacher that moved around North Carolina in her formative years. The two met after Emily's graduation from Western Carolina University, married and are now blessed with their first child, Rose. Rose is a child of Rumple, four years old, full of energy and comfortable in many situations.

For those of you unaware, Kent operates our sanctuary sound system. I asked him how long he has attended Rumple and some background and his service to our church.

"I started to go to Rumple in 2007. Emily and I were married in 2009 and I started to work on the sound system in 2008 when it was up in the staircase to the choir loft. The choir members used to have to queue about what was happening so I could turn on the right microphone. Several years later Josh Curtis, Sean Printz and I started to update the sound system including installing new speakers and moving the soundboard."

I asked Kent for a ballpark figure on how many services he has operated the sound system? "52 weeks a year x 10. Over 500. That does not count the double services, Christmas Eve and other special services.

No doubt you have been part of MANY surprises during the course of your volunteering. "I don't like surprises when running the sound system. Surprises mean something has broke or run out of batteries. I have definitely run batteries to people while the choir sings. The people I work with are professionals and tend to quickly adapt to changing conditions. The beauty is that the church was built before microphones and speakers and a person that projects their voice can be heard across the church."

I asked, "What special enjoyment do you receive from giving back?" "I love to hear the choir sing. I think being in the back of the church on Christmas Eve as the candles are lit is a rare gift."

You and Emily have been a couple that has sacrificed a large amount of time giving your gifts back to Rumple. How is it meaningful to the two of you, now three? "Emily and I come from a background that helping the church and giving to the church is the way that we do church. We both come from church backgrounds where we played a part in either the youth or other aspects of the church and we're actually able to help the church grow and survive. This is how we do church, if we just sit in the pew it feels weird. I also like having an assigned seat on Christmas and Easter when the church is filled to the gills."

"We are moving to Mooresville, N.C. so I can be closer to work and so Emily can start a new design and drafting business. The move is more a technical and time issue. We know its going to happen but we now have to make it happen". To quote Smokey and the Bandit "We got a long way to go and a short time to get there".

The Leonard's are a couple making a difference, like so many. Kent's technical ability and Emily's vocal gifts will be missed at Rumple Memorial Presbyterian Church but we are blessed knowing those gifts will be shared with a whole new congregation.
