# **DAVE'S MONTHLY HYMN ARTICLE**

It is often looking back that we see the natural progression of our lives. Life choices of jobs, life partners, homes, friends, etc., are all part of our search for happiness. As we are searching, if we are lucky, we often seek out council from our elders. The advice is often at odds with our self-made spirit of independence. We think we know what's best for our lives. But the lens of experience often conflicts with our ego. Perhaps this is the wisdom of our elders, a wisdom that cannot be rushed, a wisdom that comes from life experience. Our ultimate realization of this wisdom, no doubt, is the fact that we are not the master of our fate. Although taught independence in our youth, we eventually come around to the fact that we have little control over our ultimate well-being. It is God that is in control. And when we can turn over our life choices to be led by God's love shown to us in the life of Jesus, our choices become more in line with Jesus' boundless love to us.

Paul Gerhardt (1607-1676), the author of our text for this month's hymn, "Jesus, Thy Boundless Love to Me," "had been an angry young man, a student and teacher whose plans had been put on hold by the Thirty Years' War. As a young man, he had passionately argued the finer points of Lutheran theology, but with age he mellowed. His passion turned to the overwhelming love of God. He was a wandering preacher, without a parish and without a home. At thirty-five, he became a tutor in the home of a Berlin attorney and fell in love with the attorney's daughter. At the age of forty-four he took a position as pastor of a small village church. Four years later, he married his sweetheart and began publishing his hymns, including this one."[1]

John Wesley learned the original German hymn from the Moravians during his time in Savannah, Georgia, and translated all sixteen stanzas.[2] Yes, the original hymn was sixteen stanzas long! Hymnal editors determine which stanzas appear in any given hymnal. The tune, named for a 4<sup>th</sup>-century martyr, comes out of the Roman Catholic revival movement of the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century.

We will look at the three stanzas chosen for our Glory to God, hymnal. Stanza one is divided into three thoughts: a proclamation, a request, and a resolution. Here is the text: Jesus, thy boundless love to me no thought can reach, no tongue declare; O knit my thankful heart to thee, and reign without a rival there! Thine wholly, thine alone, I'd live; myself to thee entirely give.

Stanza two uses all three sections to request that Jesus' love take complete sway with our life and life choices. Here is the stanza: O grant that nothing in my soul may dwell, but thy pure love alone; O may thy love possess me whole, my joy, my treasure, and my crown! All coldness from my heart remove; may every act, word, thought be love.

Stanza three highlights our human shortcomings that often get in the way of our ability to follow Christ. It lists these elements: fear, care, anguish, and sorrow. Here is the text: O Love, how gracious is thy way! All fear before thy presence flies; care, anguish, sorrow melt away wher-e'er thy healing beams arise. O Jesus, nothing may I see, nothing desire, or seek, but thee.

Jesus, Thy Boundless Love to Me, is a hymn that speaks to us from one that has wrestled with life. Wisdom has been the byproduct of a life-long struggle. Answers have not come easy or quickly. But the ultimate realization has rung true. Jesus' love is our ultimate truth. And while our feeble attempts often fail, his love endures. We are invited this new day to invite the love of Jesus into our hearts and claim the love of Jesus once again.

Ps. Here is one more stanza that doesn't appear in our hymnal. It speaks of our end-of-life moment: In suffering be Thy love my peace; In weakness be Thy love my power; And when the storms of life shall cease, O Jesus, in that solemn hour, In death as life be Thou my guide, And save me, who for me hast died.

# **RUMPLE ON A MISSION**

**February 2nd - Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. FIRST SUNDAY COLLECTION -** We will continue our support of Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. in 2020 with First Sunday collections. Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. is a food bank that helps provide basic non-perishable food to families and individuals in Watauga County. The Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. food pantry is open for clients on Mondays from 9 am to noon right here at Rumple. The February items of need for Blowing Rock C.A.R.E.S. are canned pineapple, canned tomatoes, oatmeal (round cardboard container),



pancake/waffle mix, syrup, pudding/gelatin mix, and toilet tissue. Please bring your items on February 2nd or anytime during the month of February and leave them in the shopping cart in the church lobby.

**February 23 - Pennies for Hunger Offering -** Rumple collects the Pennies for Hunger "Two Cents a Meal" offering the last Sunday of every month. The offering supports the Salem Presbytery Hunger Ministry. Since 1989 Salem Presbytery has distributed more than THREE MILLION DOLLARS to feed hungry people locally and around the world!

**March 29th - Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event -** Rumple is partnering with St. Mary's of the Hills and Appalachian State University Presbyterian Episcopal Campus Ministry for our 3rd annual Rise Against Hunger meal packaging event. The event will be from 2 to 4pm at the Blowing Rock School. Many volunteers will be needed to help with this project and we will provide opportunities to sign up after our Sunday services in March. Rise Against Hunger is an international hunger relief organization based in Raleigh, NC. The packaged meals are used primarily to support school feeding programs in developing countries, including countries in Asia and Sub-Saharan Africa, and not only address hunger but also the related challenges of poverty, disease, education, and the welfare of women and children.

**March 30th - Hospitality House** Dinner - Rumple Missions will also continue our work with Hospitality House in 2020. We will cook and serve dinner every 5th Monday at the Hospitality House in Boone. Rumple's first Monday in 2020 will be March 30th.
