
# Hartford Wins Hoop Crown

BOSTON, Mass.-Mighty Hartford High School Saturday night turned in a stunning 68-62 upset victory over defending champion Wilbur Cross of New Haven in the championship game of the 36th annual New England Interscholastic Baskethall tournament before an expected small crowd of 8,837 at the Boston Garden.

It was the first New England title ever for Hartford, the second oldest high school in the country and making its maiden visit to the annual schoolboy classic.

It was sweet revenge for the classy Owls who dropped two dein three meetings during the season, including a setback in the recent Connecticut state tourney finale.

Actually, Cross looking for its second consecutive New England crown and third in four years, led only once in the hectic contest and that was 3-1 when Lubie Harper scored the night's first basket with two minutes gone in the opening period.

Cross suffered a tough blow when standout Dave Hicks was forced to the sidelines after being tagged with his fourth personcisions to the strong Governors al with still three minutes to go in the second period and the Governors trailing, 25-17. Only three long jump shots by reserve Fred Di Napoli and six points by little Ralph Buccini kept the defending titlists in contention.

DiNapoli and Buccini accounted for 12 of Cross' 15 points in the period.

Griffin, who scored 21 points and grabbed 16 solo rebounds in another sterling performance, hit rebounding the Governors by a three times on jumpers as the racy Owls shot into another 10-point lead, 29-19, before settling for their 31-23 bulge at halftime.

But Kubachka quickly sent Griffin back into the game when the stubborn Governors rallied to slice the Owls' lead to just seven points, 61-54. With Griffin cap-ably directing the offense, the Owls were safely ahead 63 56 when Kostek fouled out with 1:45 to play. It was 66-58 in favor of ions raced to a 23-13. advantage Hartford when Buccini committed his fifth personal with 1:10 remaining. Hartford was still up 68-61 when Kubachka inserted his reserves with only 30 seconds showing on the huge electric scoreboard clock.

In addition to Griffin, three other Hartford starters scored in double figures. Burke had 14. Kostek 13 and Poole 12. Kostek converted seven straight times before missing his eighth attempt from the frul line. As a unit Hartford was 18-for-26 from the 15-foot line as against Cross' 14-for-24. Hartford led 25-24 in baskets.

### Excel Off Boards

But it was off the boards where the smaller Owls excelled, outsolid 50-38 margin. Hicks hauled in 17 rebounds for the losers but Phil Brooks was held to a surprising low of nine.

Buccini, one of the tourney's most popular players, led the Cross shooters with 21 points. Hicks ended with 16 markers and DiNapoli had 11.

Hartford's victory marked the 25th time in 36 years that Connecticut has produced the New England champion. Actually since 1950 only Durfee of Fall River, Mass., in 1956 managed to break Connecticut's stranglehold on the tournament.

The Owls closed out their greatest season over with a final 23-2 overall record. The setback was only the fifth (including three forfeit defeats) in 22 games against scholastic competition for Cross.

Orono High School of Orono, Maine defeated Kennett High School of Conway, N.H., 57-47, in the preliminary game which fea-tured Class B champions from the respective states.
