
Hartford Wins New England Crown

Owl Quintet in Repeat Beating Bulkeley 47-39

BOSTON-Hartford High School Saturday night staged a gallant comeback to overtake city rival Bulkeley for a fourth time this season, 455, and the third school to win the cov-, the Owls trailed, 35-32 at the third cted New England Interscholastic, turn. Basketball Tournament two

A small but noisy Boston Gar-len crowd of 6,112 looked on as he victorious Owls joined Hill-ause of New Haven (1945-46) and Meriden (1935-36) as the only schools ever to capture back-toback titles in the tourney's 37vear old history. It marked Con-necticut's 26th championship and sixth in succession.

Saturday's final also was the first between two schools from

the same city.

Stalled from the outset by Bulkeley's smart and deliberate ballcontrol game. Hartford trailed until a jump shot by the incom-parable Ed Griffin knotted the count at 35-35 with only 1:15 gone

in the fourth quarter.
But 1 0seconds later Bulkeley's Gene Reilly converted twice from the foul line to give the Maroon a slim 37-35 edge.

By this time the Hartford at-

tack realy came alive. Reserve Bill Thornton, who hit on his first five field shots, and Griffin threw in successive jumpers to accord the Owls their first lead of the night, 39-37 with just two minutes gone.

Into Semi-Freeze

Then with 4:30 remaining in the final period Harttord went into a semi-freeze offense. Griffin, fouled on a drive, converted twice to make it 41-37 with 3:20 to go. The Hartford ace, who accounted for nine of his team's final to points, followed with another free throw with 2:55 left and a driving layup which practically insured the triumph with 1:30 remaining. Hartford led 44-37 at that point.

Bulkeley failed to score a bas-

ket in the fourth period until Ted Kwash finally threw in a rebound hoop with only 20 seconds

play.

Griffin wound up with 2 points and his tournament total of 80 was just two shy of the record of 82 points held by Al Attar of Durfee High of Fall River. Mass.

Thornton, who kept the Owls in contention with his deadly shooting in the third quarter, had 12 tallies.

Jim Belliore topped the Bulkeley shooters with 16 points. Kwash had 13. Reilly was held to just nine points but continued his brilliant foul shooting with a perfect 5-for5 performance

Reilly scored a total of 58 points in three tourney games and miss-ed only three of 35 charity tosses. including four games in the Con-necticut tournament Reilly had a glittering 62-for-66 at the foul line. Hartford, in closing a highly

successful campaign with a 21-4 record, went most of the way with a man-for-man defense. The Owls were forced to switch to a 3-2 zone early in the fourth quarter when Griffin was tagged with

his fourth personal.

Bulkeley employed a 3-2 zone which proved very successful un-til the fatal fourth period when the Maroon could not buy a basket and Hartford began to exercise its strength off the boards.

Maroons Lead 9-2 Belfiore hit on the game's first shot and smartly played for the good shot. After Griffin threw in two foul shots Belliore and Reilly led a Bulkeley surge which produced a 9-2 margin until Bruce Maddox came through with the Owls' first basket with 45 seconds left in the opening quarter. A free throw by Reilly made it

10-4 at the buzzer.
With Kwash and Belfiore limiting the Hartford shooters to a solitary attempt. Bulkeley fash-ioned leads of 13-4, 15-6 and 18-11 in the second period.

It looked bad for Hartford when

Maddox was rested after picking up his third personal with 2:55 left in the first half. But John Joiner hit from the foul line, Griffin tapped in a basket and Thornton fired in a jumper to cut the Maroon edge to 18-16. But Kwash, who time and again sneaked in for easy layups, hit from under-neath to give Bulkeley a 22-18 bulge at intermission. Thornton's shooting from the

corner reduced Bulkeley's lead to 26-24 early in the third quarter. and a jumper by Griffin left the Owls trailing, 29-27. But the Maroon fought back with an easy

layup by Belfiore and two charity oses by Kwash to go out front, 33:27 with 3:55 left. It was at this point Maddox was benched again after picking up his fourth per-

> Griffin was voted the tournament's most valuable player, and was joined by teammates Len Kostek, Reilly, Belfiore and Mark Belanger, Pittsfield, Mass., on the all - tournament team se'ected by the sports writers in attendance.

> For the second straight time Hartford outshot Bulkeley from the field. The Owls were 17 for 39 (44.1 per cent) and the Maroon 13 for 33 (39.3 per cent). Hart-ford also led in rebounds, 17-14, making up a 7-1 deficit in the first half. From the foul line Bulkeley was 1 for 16 and Hartford 13 for 19.

> Bulkeley, a finalist for the first time, ended a successful season with 20 victories as against four setbacks. All four losses were to Hartford and by a combined 15

points.
