End-of-the-year notables in the world of high school sports:

Bonny Lynch, a 17-year-old Farmington High senior, won the 1978 "Supersport of the Year Award," sponsored by Burlington Socks and Teen Magazine.

The four-letter standout was selected from among 15,000 entries nationally for outstanding athletic achievement in organized school competition and outside activities. Three winners were singled out each month for editorial recognition with Miss Lynch (May 1978) selected as the overall winner.

Miss Lynch, who received a \$1,000 college scholarship and a trophy at a special assembly Wednesday, played basketball, volleyball, softball for four years, track in her freshman year and earned All-State honors in basketball the last two years. She captained the basketball, volleyball and softball teams to Northwest Conference titles this year. She will attend High Point College in North Carolina this fall.
