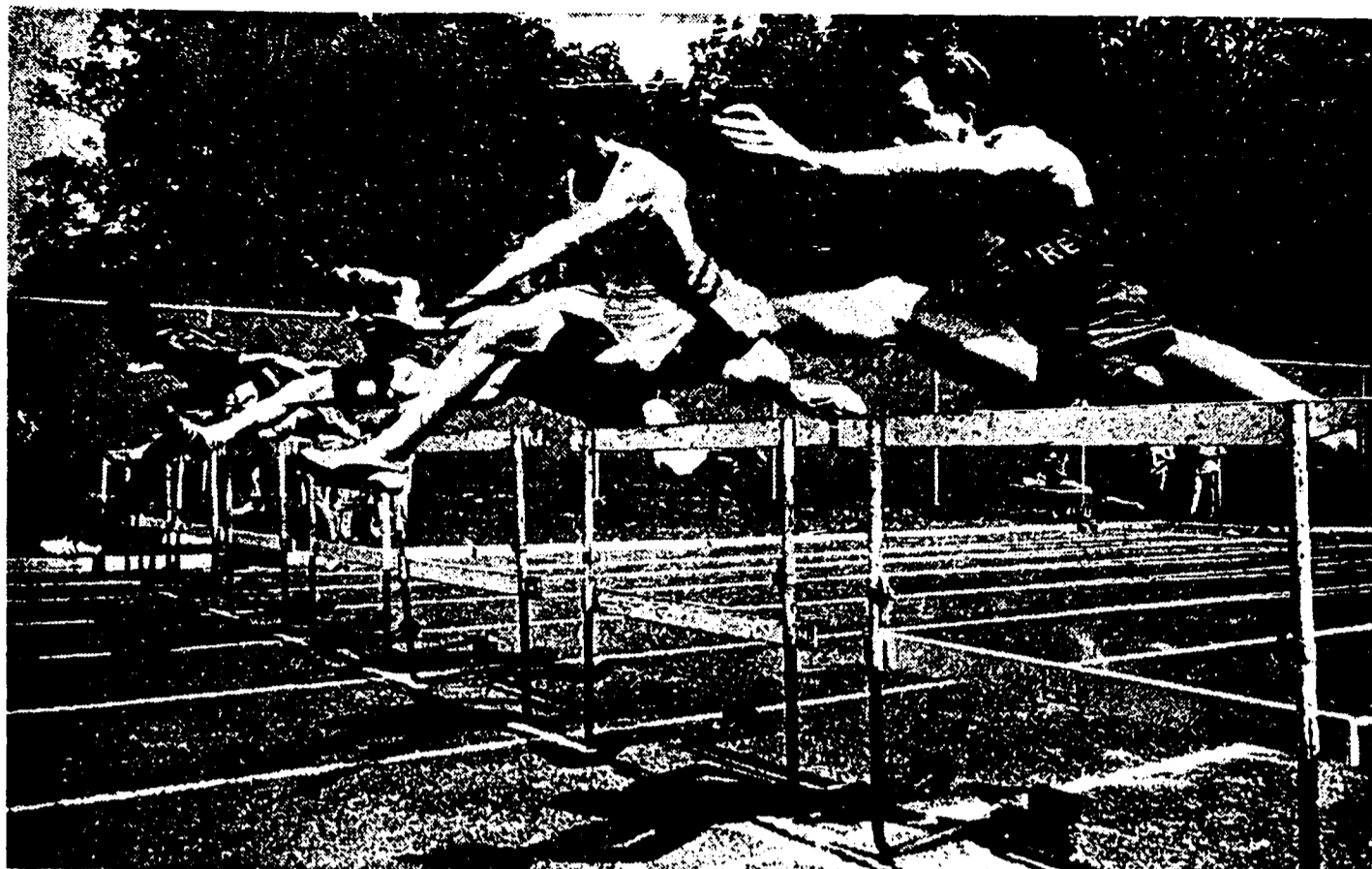

Euell and Hall to Golden West

Hartford Wins CIAC Track Title

NEW BRITAIN — Hartford Public's overpowering track team easily captured top honors in the 42nd Annual CIAC Track meet Monday afternoon at Central Connecticut's Arute Field. With first place efforts from Pablo Franco in the 100 yard dash, Charlie Vann in the 220, Ted Rush in the triple jump and the 880 relay team, Hartford piled up a total of 39 points in a field of the state's best track competitors. Windsor was second with 19 points.

Two Marks Set, One Tied

There were two meet records set and one tied. Pulaski's gigantic javelin thrower, Jackie Ham, ripped off a 238'8" heave beating his brothers' 1968 record by 18 feet.

"My new pole helped me a lot," the 225 pound 6'5" Hall said. "It's heavier than my other one and added 20 feet to my throw," Hall said who will be going to the 11th annual Golden West Track and Field championships June 20th in Sacramento, Calif., where the average throws are 240 feet.

"That doesn't scare me," Hall said. "I need that kind of Competition. But I've got to work on my speed. I've been throwing on brute strength and I need more speed in my approach."

Another record maker was Jim Euell the flashy miler from Norwich who tied an eight year old record set by Richie Bright of Woodrow Wilson. Euell zipped around in 4:10.8

Won by 12 Seconds

"I've been doing mostly 280, 440 workouts for my speed," Euell said moments after his lopsided win, 12 seconds over Wheeler of Staples, which qualified him for the Golden West Track meet along with Hall. "I had built up my endurance but I needed the speed work," Euell said who will be going to Mesa Community College in Mesa Arizona in the fall on a track scholarship. Euell was the 880 champ in New England last year and has been unbeaten in

cross country and track in his 3:31 for the record senior year.

Pulaski's mile relay team established a mark in the new husky Louis Allen grabbed a event. John Marino, Ed Luther, first in the long jump and Rich Heslin and Bob Kania ran

snatched two second positions, in the 220 dash and 100 dash. Allen, a 6' 180 senior will be going to UConn in the fall and will be playing football.
