Franco, a Hartford Public sophomore who was one of only sophomore who was one of only two double winners, ripped through a 9.6 clocking in the 100-yard dash which ties the state mark set in 1933 by William McNulfy, of Hillhouse, and Anding, a Staples senior, flipped over the pole vault bar at 13' 8" to establish a new state standard to highlight the annual 17 ard to highlight the annual 17—event competition involving 39 high schools.

Hartford Public, which won six first place positions, posted the high team score of 44 points while Weaver and Rippowam fied for second with 19 points each. It was the fourth straight Class A championship for Hartford Public and the 11th title under the reign of Coach Lindy Remigino and the 22nd title in the history of the school.

The other meet double winner was Ken Wright of Rippowam who won the long jump and triple jump.
