Seven Meet Records Fall

Curry, Hartford Star in State Open Track

records in 42.6 seconds. Curry narrowly beat Man-chester senior Jeff Lampkin in the 100 final when his in the 100 final when his blocks slipped out from under him at the start. He won the race in 9.8, the same time as Lumpkin, and later took the 220 in a meet tying record of 21.7 seconds.

Curry was the lone double

Hartford Public turned in steady performances to down favored New Britain and defending champion Xavier of Middletown to snare the team title. The Owls lost the Class A title to New Britain last week but used a record setting victory in the mile relay (their only first), three seconds, and four thirds to post 58 points. New Britain was second with 41 followed by Xavier with 38 and Bulkeley, with only five men and not having a track of its own, placed fourth with 31 points. Hartford Public turned in 31 points.

Keroack of Norwich battled a cold all week and didn't finally overcome it until just before the start of the 120 high hurdles. "I said to myself I don't want to go out sick like this. I got mad at myself and it paid off."

The William and Marybound Keroack whipped through a 14.1 race, setting meet and state records. His previous best was 14.3. He beat Seymour of New Britain who had beaten him last Saturday in the Class A meet.

Other records tied or set came from gritty two-miler Pete Fitzsimmons of E. O. Smith in Mansfield and Steve Moran of Trumbull in the 440 dash.

Fitzsimmons, the State Open cross country champion, took an early lead but fell back to third place behind junior Walt Novellis of Masuk and senior Dirk Williams of Greenwich midway through the race. He again took command with three laps to go and won by 10 sec-onds over Williams in 9:11.2. tying the outdoor state and meet record. Fitzsimmons owns the indoor two-mile re-

cord of 9:08.7.

Moran just nipped Hartford Public's Doriel Feurtado at the wire in 48.7, setting a meet record.

Fuertado also anchored the Owis' mile relay. He combined with Bob Ealey, Mike Duggan and Lou Quinones for a record 3:21.0. Quinones, the newly found half-miler in coach Lindy Remigino's arsenal, placed third. The quarter-miler was converted to the half two weeks ago. In two state races, he has placed third both times. Ealey, who led
