Hartford Gives Coach Gift Class LL Track Crown

WEST HARTFORD -The Hartford Public boys track team had waited since Saturday to present its birthday gift to head coach Lindy Remigino. However, the delay was worth it, as the Owls captured the Class LL Track and Field Team Championship Monday at Hall High School. h O

'Coach Remigino had his birthday on Saturday," said 5-foot-8-inch Mike LLewis, who finished second in the 440-yard run for Hartford. "We were ready to give coach his present on Saturday, but we got rained out. However, I think hestilliked the team title, even if we did give it to him two days late."

Hartford collected 56 points to outdistance the 40team field. New Britain came in second (41), while Norwich (38.3) and Westhill (38) followed.
