Hartford Public High School is the second oldest high school in America founded as Thomas Hooker's Latin School in 1638. The name was changed to HPHS in 1847. The oldest high school in America is *Boston Latin* founded in 1635 in Boston, Massachusetts. HPHS is located near the Harriet Beecher Stowe House and the Mark Twain House. For those of you who are not familiar with the above, Farmington Ave is the nearest main street.



BASKETBALL

This article is not about any of the above. Missing from this listing is the central figure in this story. *Enter Fred Ware, Class of 1934.* Fred Ware was an outstanding basketball and baseball player at HPHS making the varsity basketball team as freshman in 1930. This story is about Fred and Willie Ware (Weaver) who were not only outstanding athletes but made a valuable contribution to the Greater Hartford Area in general and the Hartford Recreational Department, in particular. Hundreds of boys and girls were the direct and vicarious beneficiary of their excellent work, high moral character and commitment to excellence.

Fred and Willie Ware collectively gave almost a century of active service to the Hartford Parks and Recreation Department. Beginning in 1937, they coached youth teams and maintained community playgrounds all over the City of Hartford. In Hartford's North End a playground on Windsor Street is named for Willie Ware. In 1996, the Urban League named an annual program for community athletic competition after Fred Ware.

Fred Ware played 4 years of basketball at HPHS from 1930-34. *He was selected All-City every year and Connecticut All-State as a junior and senior.* Also, Fred has the distinction of being the first African-American elected captain of the basketball team. He lettered in baseball 4 years and played both second base and outfield. With all due respect to the athlete's listed above only a few can match Fred Ware's achievements as a high school athlete. After high school Fred played semi-pro basketball as a forward for the Chicago Colored Clowns, the precursor to the Harlem Globetrotters. Fred Ware was the bellwether of every team he played on. *He also played for the "jewel" of the City of Hartford, Bill Savitt's Gems.* For you hip-hop readers Bill Savitt owned a jewelry store in Hartford and gave banquets, watches and other gifts to athletes and teams for their outstanding achievements. Bill Savitt was extraordinary man and known as "Mr. *Community.*"

WIREMOLD

Wiremold is a privately held company formerly owned by D. H. Murphy and family located at 60 Woodlawn St., in West Hartford, Connecticut. Insiders referred to it as "Waremold" because Richard "Buster" Ware is the first member of his family to join the company in 1922. Buster's brother, Walter joined the company in 1924. Walter's sons Fred & Willie joined the company in 1936 and 1941 respectively. Fred and Willie were highly regarded and well respected employees by co-workers and by the Murphy family. Fred retired as Safety Director after 41 years in 1978 and Willie retired after 40 years of service in 1981.

The Wiremold Company's basketball team was associated with the Hartford Industrial League. In 1946-1947, they were the Division B Champions. The team consisted of **Fred Ware**, Willie Ware, James Griffin, Armand DesRoberts, Thomas Begley, Thomas Connors, Albert Nelson and Arthur Hill.

Fred's children Ferne, Gary and Bradley all attended college. Ferne and Bradley graduated from Tufts University in Medford, Massachusetts. Tufts is rated by Forbes at number 32 out of 650 colleges and universities in America. Ferne is retired from International Business Machines (IBM) and was employed in the Hartford and Washington, D.C. offices. Bradley a UConn Law School graduate is retired from the U. S. Department of Justice. Gary recently passed away and has joined his father, mother and uncle in a better place.

The Wiremold Company's basketball team was associated with the Hartford Industrial League. They were frequent league champions.

In 1984, three years after Willie's retirement and six years after Fred's, the company paid special tribute to the Wares in a *Wiremeold World* article. *In 2003 Fred Ware was inducted into the Hartford High School Athletic Hall of Fame.* The 2003 inductees included such illustrious members as Hank Giardi (Football), Joe Kubachka (Coach), Joella Marshall (Coach), Stan Poole (Basketball), Dwight Tolliver (Basketball) and many others.

CONCLUSION

Fred and Willie Ware remind me of a professional boxer who is shadowboxing. Shadowboxing is a term used to describe a boxer sparring with his shadow. However, the difference is that Fred and Willie's shadows are slightly larger than their image. When this happens you can rest assure they are not contenders. *They are CHAMPIONS*. This is how I see Fred and Willie Ware.
