

**FOOT BALL SATURDAY.**

**Trinity Defeats Brown in a Close Score--High School Wins.**

A cold, clear day greeted the Brown and Trinity foot-ball eleven Saturday, as they lined up on the Trinity ground ready for the fight. Trinity, weakened by the loss of Graves and Thurston, was shaky behind the line, but the rushers understood their business and did their work in proper shape. Brown lined up a strong eleven, with a couple of half-backs with records of 102.5 for the hundred and a quarter-back who thoroughly understood what he was there for. At the start Brown had the ball and started in down the field with a V that was short lived. But then Trinity seemed to go to sleep and in a few minutes Dowd of Brown carried the ball across the line for a touch-down. A goal was tried for but not kicked, leaving the score 4-0.

This seemed to wake Trinity up a little, and the ball was slowly forced up the field under the persuasion of the Hubbards until Hill of Trinity got the ball and made a dash through Brown's line, securing a touch-down. From this no goal was kicked, making the score 4-4. L. Hubbard of Trinity got the ball soon after and fell over the line, securing another touch-down, from which a goal was kicked, making the score 10-4. After this goal Trinity got careless, and in a short time Linsley of Brown secured the ball and made a fine touch-down, from which a goal was kicked, again tying the score. No more scoring was done by either side during the rest of this half, which soon ended.

In the second half Thurston, the captain of the Trinity team, although suffering from a cracked collar bone, received in the Cornell game Tuesday, started in to play, taking Wilson's place at half-back. His influence was at once felt, and the ball was rapidly forced down to and over Brown's goal line, Thurston securing the touch-down, from which no goal was kicked. Score 14-10 in Trinity's favor. Soon another rank fumble of Trinity's sent Dowd, of Brown, the entire length of the field with the ball tucked under his arm and a touchdown and goal resulted, making the score 18-14 in Brown's favor. It was now getting near the end of the game and things were looking bad for Trinity, especially as the rush line had been disabled by Strong's having to retire with a dislocated shoulder. Orton took his place. Trinity formed a V in the center of the field and Hill, taking the ball, by a fine run, carried it to within a few yards of Brown's line. Here Brown held them, however, for four downs, but so close was the ball to the line when Brown obtained it that the Trinity rushers burst through, forced Brown to make a safety, making the score 18-16.

Brown started the ball from the twenty-five-yard line, and then began a furious struggle for victory, each side disputing every inch hotly. At last Thurston again broke Brown's line and secured the winning touch-down. No goal was kicked, making the score 20-16 in Trinity's favor. Time was called as soon as the ball was again started, leaving Trinity the victors. Thurston without doubt won the game for Trinity, and Hill deserves great credit for his play, as he was suffering from a sore knee and a bad ankle. For Brown Dowd, Linsley and Aldrich did the best work.

**High School 52, New Britain 0.**

The game began with lively playing on both sides and some good tackling by New Britain. It was hardly five minutes, however, before Spencer made the first touch-down and Corbin kicked the goal, giving Hartford six points. The second touch-down was also made by Spencer, the third by Taylor and the fourth by Caswell, Corbin kicking the goal every time. At the end of the first half, therefore, the score stood 24-0.

In the last half the Hartford substitutes were put on for practice. Spencer made four touch-downs in this half and Corbin made one. Hartford lost some ground by off-side playing, but all through the game the ball was kept well into New Britain's territory. King of Hartford was hurt about the head early in the game, but continued playing and did good work. There were nearly 200 spectators on the grounds.

This afternoon the High School team will play a team composed of High School alumni.
