SUISMAN SHINES IN EVERY PLAY.

Forward Passes Are Biggest Factors in Locals' Win.

In a thrilling and spectacular game yesterday at Trinity Field, the Hartford Public High School football team defeated the heavier New Haven High team, 19 to 0, and thus kept up its record of not being scored upon this season. A large crowd turned out at the game and everybody had their fill of thrills. The New Haven team was unable to check the local's onslaughts, although at first it looked as if Hartford would have to work hard for its points. The visitors' offensive was very weak, with the exception of one back, who piked out the holes well. The locals' defensive was never better and the men nabbed nearly every play before it had time to work.

Hartford's offensive was very successful, although nimbleness and dodging brought more than line-bucking. Forward passing for the locals was used to excellent advantage and was the means of getting the first touchdown. The visitors used the air-line very little, except in the final quarter when they tried a great many times successively. Hartford had occasion to kick only two or three times, and then the punts were mediocre, as were the numerous punts of the opposing side. Penalties were few and far between, but when they did happen they were large.

Everybody seemed to stay for the locals, but Sam Suisman, the brainy quarter, took the lead. His timely gains, cool judgment and nerve were what made Hartford win the game. The boy's ability to pick holes and dodge gained the team many yards, and his quickness of judgment and action terrified New Haven. The visitors' lone star was Halfback McPartland, who made several large gains. Captain Dunn of the locals was unable to play on account of injuries and the loss of him was felt in the line.

Hartford kicked off in the first quarter and, after unsuccessful attempts to gain, New Haven punted. The locals' backs gained rapidly to the visitors' twenty-yard line, but finally fumbled and New Haven again punted. Hartford rushed the ball to their opponents' six-yard line, but New Haven intercepted a pass and then gained steadily up to their thirty-yard line and the quarter ended.

In the second quarter, after vain attempts to gain, New Haven kicked and Hartford advanced to the visitors' thirty-yard line. Here Goetz, a local end, attempted a field goal from the forty-yard line, but missed it by a foot to one side, and it was New Haven's ball on her twenty-yard line. Things looked black for the locals with a large penalty and several gains, until Goetz intercepted a pass. Then Layland secured a pass on New Haven's twenty-yard line and on the next play Suisman threw a long pass to Herbert, who was behind the goal, and the first touchdown for Hartford was scored. Herbert missed the goal and the half was over.

New Haven kicked off and the locals finally punted for the second time and the third quarter was over. Hartford got the ball on a fumble and finally rushed it to the visitor's two-inch line and Davis made the third touchdown. Herbert missed the goal. The rest of the quarter was a back and forth game, until after three unsuccessful passes, and two good ones, New Haven started up the field, but the whistle blew before they had time to do any damage.
