

Naugatuck Shares Swim Title With Hartford, Crosby

New Haven, March 7.—(AP.)—
The Connecticut High School
Swimming Association announced
tonight the designation of Hart-
ford, Crosby and Naugatuck as co-
champions of the 1947-1948 sea-
son.

Each of the three teams, which
had lost only one meet apiece, will
receive championship plaques.
Middletown, which came through
the season with no defeats, was
awarded fourth place on the
grounds that it had not met the
associations's requirements re-
garding meetings top teams.

The standings were decided at
the annual meeting of coaches
held between sessions of the state-
interscholastic swimming cham-
pionships at Yale Saturday.

Other standings were assigned
in the following order: Manches-
ter, fifth, with .666 Bristol, sixth,
with .600; New Haven, seventh,
with .500; Hamden eight, with
.460; Warren Harding, .444; Hart-
ford Bulkeley, .428; East Haven,
.385; Sacred Heart, .333; West
Haven, .181; Bridgeport Central,
.166; and Meriden with no wins.

The coaches also elected offi-
cers naming Ed Tamashumas of
Warren Harding, president; Gerry
Jermaln of West Haven, vice-pre-
sident; and Bill Dyckes of Ham-
den, secretary-treasurer. Al Gray
has retired as president after
serving as officer in various capa-
cities for 11 of the association's 13
years in existence.

Among business on the agenda
was discussion of the New England
Intercholastic Swimming cham-
pionships, the first ever held, to
be held in Amherst on March 13.
About three-quarters of the Con-
necticut teams are sending re-
presentatives with Hamden send-
ing five and Hillhouse two.
